#### WHAT'S THE BEST WAY TO LANDSCAPE MY SLOPE?

We have had some questions and concerns this month regarding the best way to care for a slope, a challenge for many of our homeowners. In researching this subject, I found the San Diego County Water Authority's <u>Sustainable Landscape SD Guide</u> (link on our website at <u>bonitahighlands.org</u> or <u>watersmartsd.org</u>) to be most helpful. This guidebook is put together for homeowners facing the challenge of landscaping in San Diego. Topics covered include everything from plant selection to irrigation. Online instruction, led by a professional landscape architect or designer, to help homeowners with landscaping their properties is available through the program at no cost. Visit the website to see if one of their classes fits your needs.

Another valuable website is <u>calscape.org</u>. This website is maintained by the *California Native Plant Society*. It is easy to use and offers an organized selection of native plants. Color photographs of each plant are posted as well as uses, sizes, and water requirements. The San Diego Chapter usually has a plant sale in Balboa Park. However, this year, they will offer an online preorder sale starting September 1st (it will run until 180 orders are taken), with

pickup in late October. Why October? It is the best time to plant natives. The soil is still warm, and the amount of watering is reduced by winter rains. Keep in mind though, a plant is only "drought tolerant" once established. This means, once you put them in the ground, they must be watered until they get used to being in the ground. After they are established, the water may be cut back.

If you have a slope that requires attention, please visit these websites before you try to tackle the slope on your own. Their recommendations for the best way to address a slope includes the use of specific plants of varying root structures and sizes, and by irrigating the slope in a specific manner. They will offer suggestions on terracing and materials that can be used for mulching.

Saturday, September 12th from 8-11 a.m.


Where: At the top of Upper Horse Ring Road.


