Holiday Events in San Diego

San Diego is full of fun and festive holiday events for everyone to enjoy all across the city and county. Below is just a short listing of some of the more common events that happen in San Diego during the holiday season. Plus there are always a myriad of new movies, various local theater performances, and neighborhoods that are all lite up for the holidays!

<u>Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas.</u> When: Nov. 6 - Dec. 31, 2024. Take a walk around Balboa Park and discover its beautiful architecture. Be sure not to miss the "Whoville" decorations in the plaza outside the Old Globe Theatre, which are on display to coincide with the theatre's annual holiday production of *Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas*!

<u>Paradise Point Tree Lighting Ceremony.</u> When: Dec. 5, 2024. Bring your family and friends over to Paradise Point in Mission Bay for a festive tree lighting ceremony where you can roast s'mores over the bonfire, enjoy caroling, eat at The Churro Addict food truck, have a holiday cocktail, and enjoy activities for kids of all ages.

<u>Coronado Holiday Parade</u>. When: Dec. 6, 2024. Join Coronado in holiday cheer from the San Diego Bay Ferry Landing, down Orange Avenue, all the way to the Hotel del Coronado for live music, local business open houses, sing-alongs, a parade, and a grand tree lighting at Rotary Park.

<u>Balboa Park December Nights</u>. **When: Dec. 6-7, 2024**. Enjoy a two-day holiday celebration filled with carolers, live music, light displays, theater and dance performances, and delicious foods from around the world at the International Cottages.

<u>La Jolla Christmas Parade and Holiday Festival</u>. When: Dec. 8, 2024. Spread some holiday cheer at the La Jolla Christmas Parade and Holiday Festival in downtown La Jolla. The event includes marching bands, community groups, drill teams, vintage vehicles, horses, and yes ~ a camel. There is also a Holiday Tree Lighting Ceremony.

Port of San Diego Bay Parade of Lights. When: Dec. 8 & 15, 2024. Enjoy the twinkling waters of the San Diego Bay and more than 80 private boats decorated with holiday lights for the annual Port of San Diego Bay Parade of Lights over these wo weekends in December. Great views are available on dry land from Shelter Island, Harbor Island, the Embarcadero, Seaport Village, the pier at Cesar Chavez Park, and Coronado's Ferry Landing.

Las Posadas: An Old Town Celebration. When: Dec. 13, 2024. There will be six stations in Heritage County Park as we follow Joseph and Mary astride a donkey. Each station features a brief narration and call-and-response verses performed by volunteers from the Mormon Battalion Historic Site. After the finale, guests are welcome at the Mormon Battalion Historic Site for refreshments.

<u>Gaslamp Pet Parade</u>. When: Dec. 14, 2024. This holiday parade presents cute dogs and their amazing owners parading in colorful fashion as they proudly promenade through the heart and soul of the Gaslamp for all the onlookers to see!

<u>Liberty Station Hanukkah and Menorah Lighting</u>. **When: Dec. 26, 2024.** Liberty Station in partnership with The Chabads of Downtown San Diego and Pacific Beach will host a public menorah lighting at Point Loma's Liberty Station's Central Promenade to commemorate the first night of Hanukkah.

<u>Port of San Diego Holiday Bowl Parade</u>. When: Dec. 27, 2024. Gaze up at the numerous balloons during the port of San Diego Holiday Bowl Parade, which is one of the country's largest balloon parades. Floats, balloons, and marching bands are just some of the offerings in this colorful holiday parade along San Diego Bay's Embarcadero in down town San Diego.

These Scams usually come from automated systems imitating charities, utility companies, packaging services (UPS, USPS, FedEx), and even banks and credit unions or credit cards!! BEWARE! Never use links provided in an email to verify any of your personal or banking information, unless you are 100% sure it's valid. I have recently received Scams from USPS, UPS, VISA/MC, Amazon, and Verzion!! Plus, with all the home delivery services, keep an eye out on your doorstep and mailbox to make sure you receive all the things you were expecting! And always remember to lock you car, especially if you have packages in it! Thankfully there are very few reported burglaries in the Highlands, but we need to be aware.

Holiday FUN Facts

MISTLETOE

In some parts of Europe the midsummer gathering of mistletoe is still associated with the burning of bonfires, a remnant of sacrificial ceremonies performed by ancient priests, the Druids. Mistletoe was once believed to have magic powers as well as medicinal properties. Later the custom developed in England (and, still later, in the United States) of kissing under the mistletoe, an action that once was believed to lead inevitably to marriage. Most mistletoes are evergreen and are easy to locate and harvest after their deciduous hosts have lost their leaves in late fall and winter; hence, the plants often are used as festive decorations at Christmas time, especially in the Northern Hemisphere.



The flowers, in compact spikes, are bisexual or unisexual and have regular symmetry. They are yellower than the leaves, appear in late winter, and soon give rise to one-seeded white berries, which when ripe are filled with a sticky semi-transparent pulp. These berries, and those of other mistletoes, contain toxic compounds poisonous to many animals and humans, so keep them hung high and out of reach of pets and children!

POINSETTIA

Indigenous to Mexico and Central America, the poinsettia was first described by Europeans in 1834. It is particularly well known for its red and green foliage and is widely used in Christmas floral displays. It derives its common English name from Joel Roberts Poinsett, (1779-1851) the first United States minister to Mexico, who is credited with introducing the plant to the U.S. in the 1820s. Wild poinsettias occur from Mexico to southern Guatemala, growing on midelevation, Pacific-facing slopes. They were cultivated by the Aztecs for use in traditional medicines. One population in the Mexican state of Guerrero is



much further inland however, and is thought to be the ancestor of most cultivated populations of today. Wild poinsettia populations are highly fragmented, as their habitat is experiencing largely unregulated deforestation. Every year in the United States, approximately 70 million poinsettias of many cultivated varieties are sold in a six-week period around October to December. Many of these poinsettias are grown by Paul Ecke Ranch in Encinitas which serves about 50% of the worldwide market and 70 percent of the U.S. market.
