## How to Make Mint Extract with Dried Leaves

- 1. Use one-third to one- half the amount of dried leaves. The dried leaves will swell and rehydrate with the alcohol, be sure to have plenty of room in your jar.
- 2. Check the jar after 24 hours to see if the mint is at or above the alcohol line. If so, add more alcohol to fully submerge the mint.
