OBCA BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

from the desk of Board Chair, Brad Butler

Summer is coming to a close! A few cooler days here and there are certainly welcome. OBCA had a busy month in August.

We appointed Adil Ahmed to our vacant board seat. Adil and his young family live in the Hopewell neighborhood. Having worked with him for a bit more than a month now, I'm confident that Adil is a valuable addition to our Board and the broader OBCA community of volunteers. If you or a neighbor are interested in volunteering in the community, please reach out. There are multiple great opportunities!

We discussed and approved several routine actions, including items where the village collaborates with the Columbia Association. We closed a case with CA's Architectural Resource Committee. We do this when a homeowner who had previously been referred to CA has addressed their maintenance or other architectural issues.

CA notified us that they plan to replace the checkers/chess tables at the Lake Elkhorn dock with metal tables that are slightly larger, but still provide a chess board in the center. The current tables are reaching end-of-life. The number of tables and number of seats will remain the same. We endorsed CA's plan. We also sent a thank you note to CA for installing a shade structure above the Tot Lot behind our community center.

You may have noticed a lower water level in Lake Elkhorn. CA temporarily lowered the lake level to facilitate scheduled maintenance on the dam. With the lower water level, you can see the impact of sediment build-up in several places around the lake. CA periodically hires a dredging company to remove this sediment, but the next dredging operation is not yet scheduled. Preventing sediment by building rain gardens and other stormwater best practices upstream of the lake is far less costly over the long run than regular dredging, however much of the upstream land is owned by homeowners and HOAs, not CA. If you're interested in doing your part to manage runoff on your property, CA and Howard County both have resources that can help.

The Owen Brown CARES group supports several environmental and open space goals in the village through a combination of advocacy and volunteer work in the village. Linda provided the Board an update on CARES activities, including adopt-a-spot weeding, an update on grant funding for a rain garden, and a walkthrough of potential tree planting locations with CA. CARES is doing good work, and is looking for additional volunteers!

We continue to work with CA and the other villages to reach a new contract agreement with CA. This process is on track, with plans to reach an agreement around the end of this year with an effective date of May 1, 2025.

Have a great last few weeks of summer! I look forward to providing another update next month.

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CA SEEKS COMMUNITY INPUT TO INFORM ITS BUDGET DECISIONS

The Columbia Association Board of Directors held a regular meeting on July 25 at CA headquarters. Like all open board meetings, this meeting was streamed and is available for viewing on YouTube. The Board took several actions and discussed multiple topics.

The Board approved three separate easements in downtown Columbia. Granting these easements was simply a formality that codified agreements CA made as part of the downtown Columbia Master Plan ten years ago. The easements are limited to allowing a property owner and the Maryland Department of the Environment the ability to conduct routine maintenance and won't result in any noticeable change. The Board also approved timelines to complete both CA's new strategic plan as well as next fiscal year's budget. As always, CA will be soliciting input from the community to inform its budget decisions. I will share those solicitations here but please be on the lookout on CA and Owen Brown's social media accounts for announcements later this summer and fall. Please keep in mind that there is no lack of ideas for new services or other ways for CA to spend money and that input on what services CA should deprioritize or cut is just as valuable.

The Board reviewed and discussed draft annual objectives for CA's new president and CEO. These objectives can be found in the "packet" for the meeting (https://columbiaassociation.org/wp-content/uploads/07252024-Packet-for-Posting-1.pdf) and will be formalized at the next

Board meeting. In addition to the objectives listed in the packet, the Board largely agreed that maintaining high levels of service to residents should be explicitly included as an objective.

Finally, the Board reviewed the 4th quarter financials from last fiscal year. Though not immune from pressures from inflation and the tight labor market, CA is in solid financial health. The "post-pandemic normal" as it relates to paying CA memberships is still unclear but notably, revenue from memberships now exceeds revenue from the annual charge for the first time since the pandemic.

At the end of the meeting, CA's President shared some recent highlights. A few of those were:

The *Hooked on Fishing* events at Columbia's lakes A recent grant to fund the design of a walkable pollinator and rain garden at Lake Elkhorn

Efforts to remove invasive species

The successful July 4th celebration

The Capital Improvements team working extended hours during a heat wave to quickly install new bridges and ensure paths remain accessible
