## Willow Weaving Workshop – Saturday 25th January

Dominic Parrette is a Sussex based basket maker, willow grower and teacher specialising in traditional frame baskets, organically woven willow forms and beautiful strong plant supports. He sources willow, sweet chestnut and hazel from local coppice woodlands and willow beds and is committed to sustainable woodland management. Dominic makes woven products for small gardens and allotments as well as taking on commissions for clients such as The National Trust and Kew at Wakehurst.

If you went to the Plant Fair at Hush Heath Winery last year you may have seen his fantastic creations. Really unusual and beautiful. The photos below show examples of his work.

He will be running two classes for us in Egerton Millennium Hall; one in the morning and one in the afternoon. Each class is limited to 12 people and for £22 you will be given all the materials you need and with his expert guidance will make a plant support to take home.

## Talk by Maureen Rainey from The Kent Wildlife Trust - Thursday 20th February

#### "Encouraging Wildlife into Your Garden"

Maureen Rainey runs lots of events for The Kent Wildlife Trust and is keen to encourage us all to make our gardens more wildlife friendly. Now the birds have started to sing again as the days lengthen, the talk will be a timely reminder of what we can each do to make our gardens welcoming to the many birds and animals that are struggling in the wider environment. Given the significant decline in so many species over recent years, gardens have become much more important as refuges and feeding grounds for so many creatures. Maureen will hopefully inspire us to do more this year whatever size garden we have.

## First Garden Visit of the Year - Thursday 12th March Trip to Copton Ash - Hellebores and Flowering Shrubs

The garden at Copton Ash near Faversham was initially started in 1978 on 1.5 acres of former cherry orchard by Tim and his mother Nancy Ingram and is now run by Tim and his wife Gillian. Tim was brought up with a keen interest in plants, his first patch was a raised rock garden as a teenager. He spent his early adulthood in academia working on plant hormones, six months of this were spent in Tasmania where he took the opportunity to explore the wilds. He then started a nursery at Copton Ash where he grew a wide range of plants including those from the Southern Hemisphere, but became known for his interest in Umbellifers. Tim has been a member of the Alpine Garden Society most of his gardening life and is an active member of the East Kent and the Mid Kent Alpine Garden groups. Tim is also a keen member of the local Kent Group of the Hardy Plant Society.

At Copton Ash Tim and Gillian have been responsible for developing the garden into a woodland and alpine garden showcasing their love of these plants. The season starts with the snowdrops followed by hellebores which continue for months, then a flood of woodland species like anemones, hepaticas and trilliums. Later as summer approaches, umbellifers and plants which thrive in hot summers take over. The garden was featured in The English Garden Magazine in January 2017 and also in the RHS 'The Garden' in March 2018. Hopefully there will be lots for us to enjoy.

If you don't know where to start and would like to have a go, take a look at the hints and tips on notes you can download from our website. Viewing is from 2.45pm with a raffle, tea and homemade cakes and a chance to catch up with other members. The awards are presented at approximately 3.30pm.

#### Garden Trip to see the Magnolias – Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> April

We have organised a trip to see the beautiful magnolias at Sandling Park near Hythe. Sandling Park is a Grade 2 Listed Park and Garden whose original house was destroyed by enemy action in WW2. The park is planted with beautiful acid loving woodland plants and has a stunning collection of Magnolia Trees. The gardens are now sadly rather unkempt and usually only open to the public for one day a year however we have been given the opportunity to visit this year and will be shown round by a horticultural tree expert.

Cost £4 to cover the minibus. Pick up from outside The Black Horse, Pluckley at 10am. There are no facilities at the garden so we will take a comfort break and coffee at nearby Brockhill Country Park near Saltwood afterwards. Please phone Sue to book a place on the minibus.

#### Garden Trip to Leonardslee – Thursday 14th May

Leonardslee Gardens are Grade 1 Listed Gardens near Horsham. The historic garden was begun in 1801 to complement nearby Leonardslee House but they became famous when Sir Edmund Loder bought the property from his parents in law in 1889 and filled the park and gardens with exotic and rare species brought to Britain by the plant collectors of the time.

In 2010 the gardens closed to the public and left to go wild. There followed years of uncertainty about their future until in 2017 the property was bought by Penny Streeter (OBE) and she decided to restore them. They reopened to the public in 2019 and have received much acclaim in the national press. In May they should be filled with rhododendrons and magnolias for us to enjoy. Some of the rhododendrons are approaching 200 years old and have grown into substantial trees and are now some of the largest specimens outside their native habitats. There are 240 acres of grounds to explore including seven lakes and nearly 10 miles of garden paths and woodland walks if you want!

This is a subsidised trip with a cost to members of only £11. To secure a place on the coach Sue will need your booking form and payment before 29<sup>th</sup> April.

Please note for security reasons Leonardslee is a cash free zone. Pick up will be at 9am from outside Pluckley Black Horse.

As the head gardener since 2005 Steve Edney has restored the garden, laying out borders in the original positions and framing the same views but then allowing the planting to develop creatively and spontaneously. The effect is both eclectic and imaginative. The gardens included something for everyone and we had plenty of time to wander and enjoy the various garden rooms.

Many of us had looked forward to lunch in the hotel but sadly it didn't prove to be a quite the experience we had hoped, though the tea and cakes in the café certainly made up for it.

On our return home we paid a visit to Steve Edney and his partner's private garden where we explored his impressively even more jungly back garden.

# Sue & Mary's Late Winter Gardening Tips

All the gardening magazines are advising us to start sowing veg and flower seeds, but beware getting too excited and overdoing it. Make sure you have enough space in your greenhouse or cold frame to keep seedlings protected until after frosts have finished.

When tidying up the garden, don't cut back penstemons or deadhead hydrangeas until spring. Leaves and old flower heads help protect the plants and new growth from frost.

However, do trim hellebore leaves down to the ground, it not only helps to show off the lovely hellebore flowers but allows air to circulate and prevent Black Spot.

Gloomy January days are good for sitting down with seed and bulb catalogues and planning what you would like to grow in the coming year.

Start off your sweet peas if you haven't already done so. When 2 pairs of leaves show, put them outside in a cold frame or sheltered spot.
