The people in these positions can be really isolated. Some diocesan Catholic school offices are only an executive and secretary tasked with ensuring that schools in their care are living the evangelizing mission of the Church. Success Story: St. Stan's

In early 2023, St. Stanislaus School in Chicopee, MA, encountered a major transition. The Franciscan Sisters of St. Joseph in Hamburg, New York, who ran St. Stan's school for 125 years, needed to return to their motherhouse and place the leadership of the school in someone else's hands. Former principal Sister Ceil Haier, FSSJ, and St. Stan's pastor Fr. Brad Milunski, OFM Conv., turned to Dr. Daniel Baillargeon of Mission Driven Catholic to help.

Dan worked with Sr. Ceil as her mentor in creating a long-range strategic plan for the school that would protect the school's Franciscan nature during and after the change to a lay principal. He also worked closely with Fr. Brad in making sure that the strategic plan was aligned with the Franciscan charism of the OFM Conv.

Dan then assisted St. Stan's by conducting a leadership search to find a new principal who would not only be able to excel in the necessary administrative duties, but who could also keep the continuity of the Catholic, and particularly Franciscan, identity of the school.

When he first heard the term "principal search," Fr. Brad was anxious about having "meeting after meeting and volumes of paper flying everywhere," but instead, "Dan made it effortless. He was very good at meeting with us and talking things through about what kind of candidate we were looking for. He reached out through his own resources to help us find candidates, he set up the interviews, and he helped us through the interviews. It really was an easy thing to do. He helped us discern how to choose what would be the best candidate for us. It was a great process."

To facilitate finding the best candidate, Dan helped St.
Stan's form a full hiring committee, a committee of
teachers, and a committee of parents. The new principal
Mrs. Katie Rorrio and the other candidates interviewed with
each group, which she says "really did allow for everyone in

the community to have a say in the process," and "it was well-organized and a great process."

Katie also recommends the ease of working with Dan during the leadership search: "He was always available if I had any questions or concerns. He was that one constant for me during the whole process."

Dan has continued to work with Katie in a mentor capacity since she was hired. Mission Driven Catholic's principal mentor program focuses on guiding mentees through the four critical areas of Catholic school leadership (instructional, organizational, entrepreneurial, and spiritual leadership), with the aim of helping them to make mission-driven decisions.

Katie says that Dan is "the type of mentor that sits and listens and gives advice, but he can also read people; he knows how much we can handle at a time, and he distributes the advice in short increments that's not overwhelming. He's very good at what he does. He may have his own opinions on how he would do things or how he thinks I should, but he lets me come to the decisions in my own time...he lets the leaders in his mentorship program find their own way to figure out the problem with his guidance," and "That really built my confidence to know I could come to the right decision. He guides you by what you say to make your own decisions."

One of the things that makes Mission Driven Catholic different is the focus on presence and relationality; once Dan and Mission Driven Catholic are involved with a school, they continue to provide constant support. That's one of Katie's favorite things about the experience. She explains, "Dan is literally there whenever I need him," and "He's helped me tremendously: he's there when I call, he reaches out to check on me, he sends messages that he's praying for me and my school, and that means a lot."



Along with mentoring Katie, Dan continues to be present as St. Stan's enacts their strategic plan. Fr. Brad explains that "He helped us formulate the strategic plan for the school, which has really formed the heart of the work of the school board. He continued to help us flesh out all of the concrete particulars, the action plans, and the committees that would need to be responsible and set up. He checks in with us, and we're very grateful for that."

In all aspects of the work, keeping the school's Catholic and Franciscan mission is always front and center. While planning, conducting the leadership search, and continuing to mentor, every decision gets viewed through the lens of its effect on the mission.

"Being mission driven is what [Dan] does; he teaches us how to be mission driven and why it's so important. Once you get that, you can't go back. When you're focused on your mission, everything else just falls into place. It just becomes part of who you are," Katie explains.

Message From Mike Schafer

Greetings in Christ! I am honored and excited to be part of Mission Driven Catholic and its goal of making Catholic schools centers of evangelization for students and their families.

When I was a child, on non-school days my mother would send my siblings and I outside to play. She told us that, if we ever got hurt or in trouble, we could knock on the door of any house on our street for help. Mom and Dad knew our neighbors and trusted them. While not all Catholic, certainly, they were collectively a like-minded community.

For many decades, the prevailing culture of the United States could be described as Judeo-Christian, with broadly shared beliefs about God and what constitutes virtue and what constitutes evil. The past couple decades, however, has seen the aggressive growth of a godless culture promoting such narratives as: there is no objective

truth; faith and science conflict with each other and science should be our guidepost; we are not created male and female in the image and likeness of God but rather can make of ourselves whatever we choose; and human life at the



beginning and end should be gauged by its utility and/or the inconvenience it causes.

The call to teach, and particularly the call to be a Catholic school teacher, is a sacred one. In this era, it is also a uniquely challenging one! A prevailing worldview devoid of God, hostile to Christian belief and practice, significantly increases the difficulty of passing on the Catholic faith in our homes and schools. Our Catholic school teachers and leaders need encouragement, support and formation to fulfill their God-given vocation of collaborating with parents in the education of their children, particularly in matters of the Faith.

Christ has commissioned all of us to proclaim the Gospel and make disciples (cf. Mt. 28:18-20). Catholic schools, when fully living their mission, are uniquely positioned to do this and, in so doing, revitalize the Catholic Church and our broader culture. That is exactly what Mission Driven Catholic aims to do. I invite you to join us in this glorious endeavor!

Take a look at our new logo! We're thrilled to keep growing and improving in all ways at Mission Driven Catholic, including updating our branding. The symbolism for our logo was carefully chosen to represent what we do:

The blue lettering and M at the bottom are in honor of Mary and a reminder that she leads our actions through Christ; everything we do is in Christ through Mary. Dan and Megan both have a strong devotion to St. John Paul II, and even met him. His papal motto was Totus Tuus, which means "totally yours" and references devotion to Our Lady.

The arrow is red for the blood from the heart of Christ, and it comes out from center of the Eucharist to signify that our work is an outflow from Christ Himself.

The monstrance is our central image because of our devotion to the Eucharist, because everything we do is centered on Jesus, because Christ is present to us in the Blessed Sacrament, and because we want to be present to others and allow Christ to be present to them through us.
