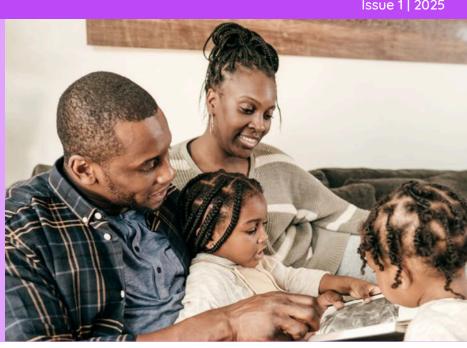

Prroject ASSERT: Did You Know?

Project ASSERT (Alcohol & Substance Abuse Services, Education, and Referral to Treatment) is a pioneering initiative that integrates Wellness Advocates into hospital settings to address substance use issues directly within emergency departments (EDs). Established at Boston Medical Center, the program employs Health Promotion Advocates (HPAs) who conduct screenings, provide brief interventions, and facilitate referrals to specialized treatment facilities for patients exhibiting unhealthy alcohol and drug use.

Importance of the Mission

This approach bridges the gap between emergency care and sustained recovery, ensuring that patients receive immediate, nonjudgmental support. Wellness Advocates address underlying issues of substance use, offering a pathway to recovery while reducing strain on emergency services.

Potential Risks Avoided by Having Wellness Advocates in Hospitals

Reduction in Repeat Emergency Visits: Patients with substance use disorders often experience a "revolving door" phenomenon, repeatedly visiting EDs without accessing long-term care. Wellness Advocates intervene by connecting these patients to ongoing treatment, thereby reducing repeat visits and alleviating the burden on emergency services.

Overdose Prevention: By providing education on overdose recognition and distributing naloxone rescue kits, Wellness Advocates play a crucial role in preventing fatal overdoses among high-risk populations.

Addressing Social Determinants of Health: Substance use disorders are frequently intertwined with factors such as homelessness, unemployment, and trauma. Wellness Advocates help patients navigate these challenges by linking them to comprehensive support services, mitigating risks associated with untreated substance use and unstable living conditions.

Combating Stigma: The presence of Wellness Advocates fosters a more compassionate healthcare environment, encouraging patients to seek help without fear of judgment. This shift can lead to earlier interventions and better health outcomes.

Facilitating Access to Treatment: Direct, facilitated referrals by Wellness Advocates significantly increase the likelihood of patients enrolling in specialized treatment programs, promoting sustained recovery and reducing the risks associated with untreated substance use disorders.

Incorporating Wellness Advocates into hospital settings through programs like Project ASSERT has proven to be a vital strategy in addressing substance use disorders effectively. By providing immediate support, facilitating access to treatment, and addressing broader social determinants of health, these advocates help mitigate numerous risks, ultimately contributing to healthier communities.
