#### Thought From Pastor Wayne:

A man walked into a little grocery story and asked, "Do you sell salt?"

"You bet!" said the proprietor. "Do we sell salt? Just look!" and he showed the customer an entire wall of shelves stocked with nothing but salt: Morton salt, iodized salt, kosher salt, sea salt, rock salt, garlic salt—every kind of salt you could think of.

"Wow!" said the customer.

"That's nothing. Come look." And the shop keeper led the customer to a back room filled with shelves and bins and cartons and barrels and boxes of salt. "Do we sell salt?!" he said.

"Unbelievable!" said the customer.

"Hold on. I'll show you salt!" And the customer was led down steps into a huge basement, five times as large as the back room. It was filled, floor to celling, with every imaginable form of salt– even ten-pound salt licks for cows.

"Incredible!" said the customer. "You really do sell salt."

"That's just the problem." said the shop keeper. "We never sell salt. But that salt salesman- he sells salt!"

Our Fall sermon series is called "What's the Difference?" It will be examining the difference that Jesus Christ makes in a person's life. To describe that difference, Jesus uses the analogy of salt. In Matthew 5:13, Jesus said, "You are the salt of the earth, but if salt has lost its taste, how shall its saltiness be restored?"

Salt was a precious commodity in the days of Jesus. It certainly was a food seasoning, just as it is today. In the days before refrigeration, salt was critical for preserving meats and therefore critical to making sure there was food for tomorrow.

That seems simple enough, but there is a twist here. We should pause to consider who this salt in us is for. Jesus said that it is not for us. We are salt for the world. It's provision and flavor and not meant for us. We certainly enjoy this provision and flavor, but it must not be kept for ourselves.

Could it be said that the American church has become like the story told above? Are our shelves stocked with salt that never leaves the store or carried home with someone? As we think about the flavor and provision that Christian faith brings to our lives, may that salt fly off the shelves!

"Blessed Assurance", found on page 341 of the blue hymnal, is an old praise song of Jesus's glory. It was written by Fanny J. Crosby, 1820—1905. This is considered gospel hymnody and captures the spirit of the American gospel song movement. It is estimated that Fanny Crosby wrote more than 8,000 gospel songs. The tune was composed by Phoebe P. Knapp, 1839–1908. Ms. Knapp was also a song writer and published more than 500 gospel songs.
