THE CHURCH TRANSFORMATION COHORT

In the end of 2019, our lease for Suite 2 comes to an end. That precipitates a set of decisions that we must make in the coming months. More than simply the decision about what building we will meet in for Sunday morning worship, this is a decision that will shape our ministry for years to come.

Here are a few things we can see about Road to Emmaus:

- > Road to Emmaus may be only four years old, but it has inherited the habits, culture and expectations that come from the history that leads up to our formation.
- > We have made some good progress and we are 'fighting above our weight.' We are well on the trajectory that we set for ourselves in our Vision, Values and Mission statement.
- > While we have enjoyed our time as a congregation, our numeric growth has barely matched our loss.
- > Given that we have little in terms of financial flexibility, we must maximize what is entrusted to us to do what God is calling us to be and do. There is much at stake and little room for error.

Who is the Church Transformation Cohort?

Our denomination is offering us help to see how to move forward. The emphasis in ECO is that the ministry of local congregations would be healthy and flourish. ECO is sort of like the slogan of Home Depot: "You can do it, we can help."

ECO has secured the help of Paul Borden and his group called the Church Transformation Cohort. Paul was as an executive for the western region of the American Baptist Church. His work with local congregations in that context enabled a radical shift. Eighty percent of those churches were in plateau or decline, but 10 years later 72% of them were growing again. That is a great track record!

Paul Borden has trained a number of people in ECO to partner with him and work on the same kind of transformation among ECO churches. Among the cohorts that have begun among ECO churches, the early results look good.

How does the Church Transformation Cohort work?

There are three components.

Pastoral Learning Community. Pastors meet for two days, three times a year over the course of two years. They meet for prayer support, fellowship and accountability. There is a study component regarding things like evangelism, time management, governance, worship, retention of visitors, etc.

Congregational Consultation. There is a four day on-site consultation that includes a pastoral interview, interviews with leaders and session, a lay leader training event and a final report that includes five strengths, five concerns and five prescriptions. Our 'Consultation Weekend' will be April 25-28.

Pastor and congregational coaching. There is an 18 month period of ongoing guidance, encouragement and accountability for moving forward. This will include additional resources and prayer. (continued on page 2, upper right column)

FINANCIAL UPDATE

January tithes and offerings were \$8,809. Because of the bad weather which caused us to miss a Sunday, the budget was off approximately \$3,000. At the end of January. "The Road to the Future" building fund had \$24,074 in it.

It is the most widely known of his compositions, used for evangelistic meetings before being added to church hymnals. Its popularity continues today with many contemporary performers including Pat Boone, Amy Grant, Kelly Clarkson, Carrie Underwood, Willie Nelson and Johnny Cash.
