Annual Report by Rev. Craig S. Miller

Indian novelist, Arundhati Roy, reflecting on the global pandemic and our desire to return to our old lives, to what we experienced as "normal" before the pandemic, reminded us at the outset of this global virus that, "historically, pandemics have forced humans to break with the past and imagine their world anew. This [pandemic] is no different. It is a portal, a gateway between one world and the next." Writing from India, she advised, "We can choose to walk through it, dragging the carcasses of our prejudice and hatred, our avarice, our data banks and dead ideas, our dead rivers and smoky skies behind us. Or we can walk through lightly, with little luggage, ready to imagine another world. And ready to fight for it."

You know the challenges that we faced as a community of faith during 2020. While we longed to meet face to face, and those who are not comfortable with technology felt isolated, the pandemic forced us to get out of the building and into a virtual space that extended our ability to be community beyond Brandon.

Folks from rural Manitoba, other provinces, and even viewers from outside of Canada, joined our Livestream worship celebrations. There were over 440 views of both the Easter and Christmas Eve celebrations on our Youtube channel. And some of you connected from the lake this summer. Who says miracles don't happen!

We heard from people that had never entered a Christian sanctuary for worship but were willing to join us from the comfort of their own home. Multiple individuals have shared with us that they want to become a part of our community once we resume in-person engagements.

We heard from United Church members in rural communities, where no ministry personnel are currently serving, thankful for the opportunity to join with a UCC community during such a challenging time. Some of them sent financial donations, with notes of gratitude.

Others watched while they were hospitalized or receiving treatment.

Our Livestream team enjoyed a wonderful camaraderie, and I want to especially thank Jane, Mindy, and Bernie for their commitment, skill, and creativity. It's quite challenging to stare at a camera in an empty room and connect with a virtual audience. I could not have done it without them.

Our Hootenanny Sing-Alongs on Zoom, Soul Cafe offerings on Facebook and Youtube, and our Holiday concerts on Youtube also engaged folks outside of Brandon.

Over 600 people viewed one of Quentin and Madelyn Robinson's songs on our Facebook page in the spring.

And what a joy to sing again with Donna Kormillo, joining us from Winnipeg, and meeting family members living in other provinces.

We also celebrated our first Christmas pageant in 9 years, An Ugly Christmas Sweater Christmas Pageant. Everyone got in on the action. What fun!

Our youth director, Antoinette Gravel Ouellette, stayed connected with our youth on Zoom, Facebook, Instagram, and TikTok. Talk about a steep learning curve! There were scavenger hunts, games, and opportunities for reflection. Signs of Hope were created during Pride week and over the New Year and posted on our lawn. We hosted an outdoor game day in October, and they shared a story during our pageant.

Spirit Kids' Club continued on Zoom, and what a time we had together. It was enlightening to see and hear from our children joining us from the comfort of their own homes, a very different environment from sitting together on the chancel steps. We shared many laughs, and our leaders were so creative and engaging, even delivering at-home activity kits this fall and winter. We hosted, at the request of the children, an Easter season dance party. And we enjoyed our races at the bike park.

Knox is known for actively engaging in justice initiatives, and we didn't let the pandemic stop us.

Once again, we took some flack in the Brandon Sun for a message on our sign. It read, "Jesus was a Protestor, Speak Out Against Racism."

In response, Knox hosted an outdoor gathering in June at the request of youth from our local high schools involved in the Black Lives Matter movement. Youth and adults gathered in the green space to hear from a diverse group of speakers.

Youth, young adults, and Knox members supported the Fridays for Future Climate Strikes at noon on Fridays. Shoe strikes were organized for times when we needed to follow restrictions on the size of outdoor groups.

Members of our committees promoted and participated in online gatherings that explored diverse topics, including reconciliation, renewable agriculture, transgender rights, affirming ministry, and eco-justice.

In November, we held our first virtual congregational meeting. It was gratifying to have new participants and at least as many present, if not more, as when we meet in person. As a result of this meeting, two new projects received approval, the Tipi Legacy Project and the Livestream Equipment Enhancement Project. Both are cutting edge and will serve us well into the future.

Rental and fundraising revenue was impacted severely by the pandemic; however, the community responded, and we finished the year with a surplus. The generosity of our community went above and beyond once again. And how about those lunches hosted by the In-Betweeners in June and October. Over two hundred meals served at each event. Our new treasurer, Shelley Tataryn, participated in multiple meetings with our General Counsel and assisted us with applying for federal subsidies and grants. Her work was of significant benefit to our community, and there may be more funds to come to help us during this challenging time.

Our Council outdid itself, offering guidance and leadership on multiple fronts with good humour and much wisdom. The group developed a new emergency action plan. The Executive and our Office Administrator, updated rental guidelines. The Council reviewed and made recommendations on multiple projects. And we applied for several new grants that may assist us with security equipment and operating funds.

I am grateful for the work of our staff during this very challenging time. Sharon adapted to public health guidelines and kept us up to date on provincial mandates. Charles worked with the M&P committee to follow best practices and flexed his schedule to assist with the nursery school and the before and after school programs. I've already mentioned Bernie, Jane, and Antoinette's contributions. We're fortunate to have a great team of people.

Thank you for your support and encouragement over the past year. It made all the difference during this challenging time. We're better together. — Craig

Chaplain's Report to Knox 2020 From Joe Ball

Jan. 5.2021

Dear Friends in Christ,

My, what a year it has been. Among the many losses has been the fellowship of faith, as we have not been able to safely gather for worship since March of last year. I foresee that we will continue to be apart from each other until at least March of this year, and likely, for many months more. However, I am comforted in the faith that reminds us of G-d's presence with us always, through the Spirit of Christ.

My work in the Spiritual Care Department at the Brandon Hospital has been coloured by the crisis of COVID-19, but if anything, my work has brought me into contact with even more people than usual. What has changed is the uniform, which is no longer limited to a suit jacket – and maybe one of Wayne Clayton's old ties. Now, I'm often doffing those to don a yellow gown and blue gloves. And always, everywhere, a blue mask and a big pair of plastic lenses.

Over the year, I note that I made about 1050 visits, and spent just shy of 800 hours in direct delivery of Spiritual Care to patients and families. I was also available after hours for a further 1,600 hours in 2020. My notes say that I presided at 12 funerals, but only one wedding, as this year saw many weddings postponed. I don't keep track of the hours spent in meetings, but believe me, there were many more of those, mostly connected to pandemic planning.

On a personal note, my thanks for the many from Knox who sent condolences following my mother's death in July. She was in care for the last years of her life, and the pandemic limited our visits with her in her last months of life. Thankfully, just three days prior to her death, I was able to take my father in for a visit in the garden at Misericordia Place. It was a comfort to both of us to have seen her so soon before her sudden death after a long illness. Her funeral, like so many, has been delayed by the pandemic restrictions. I have used the time to build a box for her ashes, which has provided opportunity for reflection and remembrance.

As the vaccines become available to Manitobans, there is hope that we will all be able at some point in this new year to look back in reflection and remembrance. As Churchill once said, "This is not the end, not even the beginning of the end; but it is perhaps the end of the beginning." Certainly, the arrival of the vaccines provides a tool that we can use, beyond our social engineering, to combat the COVID.

From this point in the pandemic, I can only be grateful for the incredible privilege of ministry in the midst of things. I want to thank the Knox community for your continued prayer for our patients and the staff who serve here, in the thick of things.

While the loss of our corporate worship and fellowship are difficult for us, they are a sacrifice and offering that helps to keep our community safe during this pandemic. During Passover, our Jewish sisters and brothers give voice to their hope and steadfast faith when they pledge, "Next year in Jerusalem." That same faith in G-d's steadfast love inspires my hope that we will see the other side of this time of sickness; and may there be joy when we are gathered together, and soon.

Christian Education Committee Report

Spirit Kid's Club

Three groups are offered each Sunday, following the Seasons of the Spirit curriculum; Wigglin 'Worship Room (infant – preschool), Junior (K – Grade 5), Intermediate and Senior (Grade 6 +), dependent on activities and numbers. Weekly Sunday gatherings continued successfully until March when public health restrictions caused the closure of the church and limited in person gatherings.

March 1 was the first intergenerational event of the year at the now annual Knox Family Fun Event at Kemnay Recreational Centre featuring skating, board games, snowmobile rides and food. 60 people joined and enjoyed the activities and fun contests. This popular event gives our children and youth a chance to gather outside of Sunday mornings at church; with each other, friends and others in the church. It is a significant part of building our Knox Community.

December 22 was the second intergenerational event of the year and our first online pageant, An Ugly Christmas Sweater Christmas Pageant. All children and youth had a chance to speak a part and all congregation members had a chance to sing well known Christmas Carols. For many, this was the first time to see one another since we were last together in person for church in March. It was a well-received event!

Between March 1 and December 6, the two younger groups began to meet online twice per month to make a craft, hear a story and sing songs based on a combination of the curriculum and seasonal themes. When public health restrictions eased in May, there were two in person gatherings at the bicycle park.

In September, the Junior group met at the Brandon Hills Conservation Area, with Madelyn Robinson leading a lesson and songs with Quentin. Six children and their families enjoyed the nature hike in G_d's creation.

Three sets of "SKC at Home" kits were prepared and distributed for 14 children in the age 3 to Grade 5 age group. The kits are available on request as promoted in the Friday announcement emails. Thanks to Peggy Wojnarski for sewing the bags for the kits – Leanne donated Christmas fabric and children were encouraged to use the bags for wrapping Christmas gifts...part of caring for creation!

Knox Youth

Last year was, for sure, a first for all of us with COVID-19 happening and the church's closing.

In the first part of the year Antoinette led a youth games night in January with eight youth participating. In March an overnight retreat for the youth was planned and needed to be postponed due to Covid.

Antoinette and Julia Schettler are alternating leading the Intermediate/Senior group on Sunday morning. This leaves time for Antoinette to lead youth activities outside of Sunday morning. This took place in the first part of the year.

Once we needed to move to a new way of connecting, the older youth started to meet on line for SKC and for activities.

For Pride Week in June the youth made signs that were posted on the front lawn of Knox.

Coming back in the fall Antoinette and Craig had an outdoor event with games and snacks at The Riverbank Discovery Centre and had 13 youth in attendance.

Moving back into COVID-19 restrictions, the older youth wanted to meet weekly and are doing leadership training by Zoom. This has been well attended and the youth are creating and engaged. SKC is meeting twice a month with the older youth starting to take on some of the leadership roles.

The older youth have created an Instagram page where they are responsible for posting "good news" and have called it Knox_Knews. They post weekly news items that are local, world and inspirational. Recently they put together signs to encourage people around COVID-19 and have them tied to the trees in the front of Knox.

We are hoping to be able to meet again in person soon and will continue with the plan that was made last year.

Adult CE

The committee partnered with the Green Team to host six sessions (before the lock down) of "One Strange Rock." The National Geographic documentary is narrated by astronauts (including Canada's remarkable Chris Hadfield) and explores our planet's unique place in the solar system. Craig made connections between faith and science and we discussed each episode together over popcorn.

A fall six session study via Zoom; 'Why are We Here?' by Mary Jo Leddy on Monday mornings at 10:00 am and Tuesday evenings at 7:00 pm. There were 13 folks who participated. Craig was hoping that by offering a morning and evening session we would have greater participation but that was not the case. Some folks may not be interested or able to gather on Zoom.

The Broadview Reading Club, initiated by Laura Crookshanks and Debby Dandy, engaged some new folks in conversation and is a great way to promote the excellent journalism in the magazine. The first one was 29 October, at 10 am and continued over winter.

As I write this Annual Report I am thinking about how thankful/grateful I am for a lot of things. I am grateful for the committee members I have working with myself and staff, I am incredibly grateful for all our staff and how they have managed to continue to inspire me working through this pandemic, I am grateful for our church council, how we have worked together also through the pandemic, and I am grateful for our congregation that have been supportive of all the workings that have been going on with our church.

This year started off with a meeting in January, then we did not have a meeting till April as the worry of the pandemic started to unravel. In March we saw our fearless leaders take to Live Streaming our worship services. I am sure behind the scenes that we all do not see there was a sense of pandemonium! Live Streaming has had it hiccups but for the most part it has been well received by our congregation. Stewardship Committee Report

Committee: Alan Moulin, Chair (2012 to present), Vern Gilbertson (2013 to present), Duncan Waddell (2013 to present), David Paul (2016 to present), Vivian Mitchell (Fundraising 2018 to present), James Cornett (2018 to November 2020).

The Stewardship Committee supported the Knox congregation with respect to projects and opportunities for service and fund raising; and provided input to council related to these activities in 2020. Our committee thanks the congregation for their generosity during 2020, which resulted in a net surplus of \$1,492.08 for Knox. This surplus occurred in the context of reduced income due to rentals, decreases in expenditures, and significant government grants.

The past year was a challenge for the Stewardship Committee, as our fundraisers were cancelled due to the covid regulations. Furthermore, the committee does not anticipate organizing a fundraiser until October 2021. The activities of the Stewardship committee will continue with respect to supporting service to Knox United Church, as budgeted expectations for donations from the congregation in 2021 will increase. This expectation is based on the premise that the church will achieve a balanced budget in 2021.

Church donations increased in 2020 due to the pledge campaign, and in response to other requests. However, the number of pledges returned to Knox was low, fallowing the fall campaign. Our committee plans to review the year-end summary of giving to the church, to assess the potential for donations and service in 2021. Members of the committee recognize the significance of bequests to the church in 2021, and the importance of planned giving.

Membership in Stewardship will change in 2021, as Vern Gilbertson will leave the committee in Spring of 2021, and James Cornett left the committee in November 2020. Vern was a long-time member of the Stewardship Committee and played a key role in many of our fund raisers, as a planner and worker. Jim was relatively new to committee; he participated in meetings and projects, and recommended new ideas for the future. We thank them both for their contribution, they will be missed. Vivian Mitchel volunteered to join the committee in 2021, based on her previous participation in our fund raisers. Current members of the committee are Alan Moulin chair, Vern Gilbertson till June or July 2021, Duncan Waddell, David Paul, Vivian Mitchell and Peggy Wojnarski. The committee welcomes Peggy who joined the committee in January 2021.

Please contact Alan Moulin, chair of Stewardship, if you have any new ideas for service and fund raising. Our church and many service organizations are rapidly adapting to new circumstances due to covid, we need new ideas and opportunities.

Outreach Committee Report

Mission and Service - Through the Mission and Service Fund, our outreach efforts join with those of other United Church communities of faith to serve those in need in Canada and around the globe. In typical times, the work of the M&S fund is highlighted through Minutes for Mission, presented verbally or through video during Sunday worship. Since March, when we moved to virtual worship services, M&S promotion can now be found in the weekly email newsletter. Our inability to gather in person for worship has not diminished Knox's commitment to M&S. Our 2020 goal of \$40,000 was surpassed with a total contribution of \$40,604.23

<u>Samaritan House Work Bee</u> *Feeding Families* - Knox, Trinity and Central decided to continue doing monthly work bees bagging flour, rice, brown and white sugar for the families accessing the food bank. Samaritan House supplied the four cup bags for us this year. Trinity hosted in January, Knox in February and plans were underway for a work bee at Central in March when co-vid brought it to a halt. Prior to the work bee, the host church checks in with Marcia Hamm-Wiebe, hamper coordinator and gives a short report on number of hampers distributed that month and most wanted items for the Food Bank. Thanks to Knox members who dropped off food and clothing items at the church during Covid. These were delivered to Samaritan House.

<u>Bear Clan Support</u> - Cyndi Price, one of the Bear Clan members alerts an Outreach Member of any specific needs and then the announcement is posted in our weekly emails to Knox members. Thanks to the Knox people who have provided muffins on a few occasions this year. Outreach also made a donation of \$200.00 from the Benevolent Fund to this group.

Benevolent Fund - Thanks to Sharon, our church manager for ordering the Sobeys Gift cards. We are able to profit from the sales of these cards. Amount earned up to December 31, 2020 is \$2,025.00. Donations of \$200 to the Bear Clan and \$500 to the 7th St. Health Access Centre were made. Balance is \$1,165.00. Thanks to members who continue to buy the Sobeys Gift cards.

<u>Support to incarcerated people leaving BCI</u> - Linda Johnston, Community and Institutional Programs Coordinator at the John Howard Society presented at a brown bag lunch at Knox in November 2019. She explained how individuals leaving the Brandon Correctional Institute often have no personal supplies to get started in a new living situation. The support services in the community require details like an address, can't start until after an orientation is scheduled, or require references, etc. This means that men are required to find shelter as best they can, and make do without the items which would facilitate a positive interface with the community. In early 2020 Outreach members explored the possibility of working with John Howard to prepare backpacks for men leaving BCI. These backpacks were to contain hygiene items, information about accessing resources, basic clothing items, etc. With the Covid lockdown this initiative was put on hold until we can start meeting in person.

<u>Chaplaincy Art Contest</u> - Each year correctional chaplains ministering in Manitoba's provincial centres organize an annual art contest for adult inmates and youth residents. The contest is sponsored by the Manitoba Multifaith Council, and various faith communities financially contribute the prizes awarded for first, second and third places. Sponsoring faith communities also choose the theme to guide artists whose submissions are judged by a professional artist. This endeavour builds bridges between the community and the correctional centre, helps inmates reclaim their dignity, and creates a practical creative outlet for people who have amazing artistic abilities. Knox sponsored the contest this year with a contribution of \$450. Outreach intended on arranging a showing of the art for Knox members however Covid got in the way again. Maureen did attend a tour of the exhibition at the Art Gallery which, in spite of Covid restrictions, was very interesting. We are still hoping to arrange either an in person or virtual presentation.

<u>Sharing Circle -</u> In December, we celebrated our 4th anniversary of hosting a monthly sharing circle at Knox. Susie McPherson-Derendy continues to provide guidance and facilitation for the group. Thank you, Susie! Each time we gather we share learnings and actions that promote conciliation. Most of our circles were held on Zoom, although we were able to meet outside at the Riverbank Discovery Centre in June.

KAIROS: Kairos and other environmental justice organizations have created a three part series of facilitated conversations regarding climate change. Debby Dandy and Madelyn Robinson have participated in training to be able to offer these online discussions. They are at three different levels, and participants can register for one or all three. They are appropriate for those who feel that they need to learn more, or for those who understand the threats posed by climate change and want to talk about actions that can be taken to mitigate it. Registration information will be shared on Knox Connections.

<u>The Tipi Legacy Project</u> - Our community of faith was invited to be a host for the Tipi Tour Legacy Project of Brandon. This invitation resulted from our work on reconciliation, including hosting monthly sharing circles and providing leadership in the Brandon Indian Residential School Mobile Learning Centre. Knox is the only church included in the project, and our Outreach Committee understands that this is a significant moment and request.

The Tipi Legacy Project began when Brandon's Walking With Our Sisters (*WWOS*) committee received a grant from the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls Commemorative Fund. The Outreach Committee provided volunteers, food, and additional resources for the *WWOS* project, hosted at Brandon University.

The *WWOS* committee, along with the Brandon Urban Aboriginal Peoples' Council and the Brandon Friendship Centre, wanted to use the grant to leave a legacy in Brandon. Following the *WWOS* event and the recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, momentum grew in Brandon for acknowledging our shared history and honouring Indigenous identity, culture, and traditions.

The tipis are a platform to share knowledge and culture and commemorate past events. The tipi at the health centre will focus on Indigenous health and wellness. The tipi at BPS incorporates the Seven Sacred Teachings. The tipi at BU commemorates the WWOS project and includes artwork from students. The tipi at Stanley Park, the only red tipi in the project as all the others have the colours of the medicine wheel, commemorates missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls.

The Outreach Committee was invited by the project to consider a theme for the tipi. The committee agreed that our tipi would be a memorial to the students of the Brandon Indian Residential School and highlight the history of the school and the United Church's response.

The tipi, which is 15 feet in diameter and 13 feet in height, will stand on the green space at the intersection of 18th Street and Victoria Avenue.

The Outreach Committee recommended to Knox Council that we participate in this project. Following review of the Project by Knox Council a presentation was made to the November congregational meeting. Very good input was received regarding the Tipi message and signage. With strong support from the Congregation, Knox Council approved moving ahead with the Project.

Fair Trade Faith Group - Knox United Church became a Fair Trade Faith Group in 2020. This means we support fairer conditions and better prices for people in the Global South who grow and make our products; whether it's the coffee we drink, the cocoa in our chocolate, or the cotton in our t-shirts.

It's a market-based system that uses consumer support to influence international trade practices, and is a powerful tool for change. When you buy fair trade products, farmers and workers have much more power to create a better life for themselves and their communities, and enjoy sustainable livelihoods.

The committee members of Deanna Ginn, Mindy Campbell, and Madelyn Robinson started off the year promoting Fair Trade products by participating in a worship service highlighting Fair Trade on February 2. We set up a table and took pre-orders for coffee and chocolate from Ten Thousand Villages as well as Fair Trade roses from Sobey's to help celebrate Valentine's Day. We sold \$350 worth of coffee and chocolate and made \$70 from the sale of roses that will help us to continue offering Fair Trade products.

Plans had been in place to offer something similar for Mother's Day but the Pandemic has put all that on hold. We are hoping that during this Pandemic you have been keeping fair trade in mind. Many stores in Brandon sell a few different fair trade products. Be sure to look for the label.

Refuge Brandon

Iman, Fatemah and their children, Arif(5) and Ummu(3) who all arrived in Brandon in May 2019 seem to be doing very well. They have moved to very affordable living quarters in Massey Manor and so, are very close to New Era School for Arif. It is also near Westman Immigrant Services for English classes for both Fatemah and Iman. Still a little distant for Nursery School at Knox for Ummu, however she gets a lift to and from two days a week from Madelyn.

They had an approximate \$5000 air fare bill (Kuala Lumpur to Winnipeg) to pay off to the Govt of Canada and they were able to make the last payment on it today, Jan 6th. Yeh! Neither Iman nor Fatemah growing up Rohingyan were ever allowed to go to school where they were born in Rakhine State, Myanmar or in Bangladesh to where their families had fled. So, learning to read and write English is an uphill battle when you're an adult. And now with the Covid shutdown it's a bigger challenge. Their teacher, Oksana, from Westman Immigrant Services is doing what she can on line to help them make progress.

When a need has been identified for others like for the two young fellows from Eritrea, usually one or more of the committee will take care of the request if it's something we can satisfy like furniture, bedding, clothes, or transportation for groceries or a doctor's appointment.

Our group is providing support where and when we sense it's needed without very many zoom meetings.

Trustees Report

The current trustees are Vivian Mitchell, Doug Crookshanks, Craig Miller, and Wayne Clayton. As per the UCC Manual – the Minister is automatically a member of the Trustees. Norm Brown has stepped away from the committee and we would like to thank him for his time serving as a Trustee.

Insurance for Knox

The Trustees meet annually with our insurance broker, Western Financial Group, to discuss our policy that is with Ecclesiastical Insurance. Ecclesiastical insures a number of Canadian churches.

Currently, the insurance policy for Knox (June 1/2020 to June 1/2021) includes: Replacement cost on the building \$4,927,253 Contents- \$439,931 --- same as last three years Total coverage is \$5,367,184 with building and contents

There is also a separate Accidental Death and Dismemberment Policy (CHAD) that covers church members, adherents and volunteers participating in church sponsored activities. Cost for this is \$125.00/year

Total cost for insurance was \$11,196.48, which is a significant increase from last year.

In light of the significant increase in insurance premiums for the last two years, the Trustees are in discussions with our insurance broker and are reviewing options for Knox. We hope to have an update for the AGM.

Other aspects of our insurance:

Directors and Officers (D&O) Liability Insurance – "UCC Protect" All United Church congregations and pastoral charges are covered under a national umbrella policy

With regard to COVID-19 -- there have been no changes to coverage.

Other areas where trustees were/will be involved

- Trustees were consulted regarding suggested changes to the Knox Constitution
- The Trustees had planned to conduct an inventory of all of Knox over the last year. The pandemic restrictions have had an impact on this so it has not been completed. We hope to make this happen in 2021.

- The Trustees are responsible for the Archives Committee. We hope to have a committee in place this year that can begin their work once some of the pandemic restrictions are lifted.
- A trustee attended most meetings of Council
