Call to Order: 6:30 pm

Opening Worship:

On behalf of Ministry & Personnel, Coleen Wall read "A Prayer During Times of COVID-19" by the Right Rev. Richard Bott. She then offered prayers for those affected by the mass killings that took place in Nova Scotia during the past weekend.

Business Arising from the Minutes/Old Business:

a. COVID-19/contingency plans update

The Knox building remains closed. The minister and office manager continue to work from home, occasionally going to the office as necessary to conduct business. The caretaker has been coming in for cleaning and sanitizing the building, and some other projects. This will continue till we hear from the province/ public health allowing us to reopen. Worship services continue on line.

Nursery school staff occasionally go into the building as necessary.

Council agreed by consensus that the Genealogy Society can also access their library as required.

b. Security Systems/Quotes

Coleen Wall briefly highlighted the costs involved with the Triple AAA (Bell MTS) quote received after the last council meeting. After brief discussion, it was decided by consensus that this project be tabled till the fall due to the COVID-19 closure and its effects on operations and finances.

Coleen was thanked for her work on obtaining quotes.

Wayne Clayton has contacted our insurance broker regarding premium discounts for such a system, but has not yet had a reply.

Protelec has changed ownership, and a quote from them was not pursued.

Financial Report: presented by Shelley Tataryn

Discussion:

- -We are behind budget but ahead of last month.
- -Compared to last year, expenses are a bit higher, but mainly because UCC assessment was paid up front this year.
- -M&S givings are ahead of the same period last year.

Motion: Shelley Tataryn/Roger Bright Carried That the March 2020 Financial Report be accepted as presented.

Council was advised Vivian Mitchell has been given information to carry out the review of our books.

Committee Reports:

- 1) Ministry & Personnel (M&P): verbal report by Coleen Wall
 - -The committee met, and basically will keep in line with recommendations from UCC during this time.
 - -Liaisons were asked to keep in touch with staff.
 - -The caretaker is working roughly every other day. He has a project to do in conjunction with Roger Bright on the basement washrooms, and will begin cleaning up the yard and gardens.
 - -Call forwarding is being added to the office telephone so that callers can talk to a live person rather than just leaving a message.
 - -no hours have been reduced at this time.
- 2) Property: Roger Bright
 - -Our caretaker has painted the baseboards in the auditorium.
 - -Sharon Chrismas advised that Pro Coffee will be cleaning and updating the coffee makers. She will meet with the representative to give him access to the machines.
- 3) Minister's Report: Attached

Discussion:

- -Council felt the stats showing our "viewership" confirm that people like what is being done at Knox, and speak well to what Craig Miller is doing.
- -Craig reports that feedback has all been positive for both services and sing-alongs, and the youtube option allowing people to view services in their own time.
- -Spirit Kids Club on zoom has been a positive experience, with kids getting lots of opportunity to contribute.
- -Equipment to allow livestreaming came to approx. \$450. There is no cost for livestreaming or using youtube, and necessary software is free.

- -We will need to look at continuing livestreaming worship after we are back to church. Craig advised we would probably want to look at purchasing a better-quality camera, mics, etc. These are not available in Brandon. We should get input from someone who does this professionally.
- -Al Moulin mentioned that one can support Youtube by purchasing a membership for \$5/month (see the new "join" button on youtube).
- -There was a brief discussion regarding the service fee charged by CanadaHelps. It was suggested this fee be mentioned in the "Ways to Give" announcement. E-transfer is also an option, and is listed in "Ways to Give."
- 4) Worship: verbal report by Diane Shepherd
 - -The committee has not met, and there is nothing coming up at this time.
 - -They will need to look at decorating the sanctuary once we are back at church.
 - -Craig suggested that once we can have groups of over 50 people again, it would be good to do something festive in celebration.
 - -It was noted that Bernie Whetter has done a lot to enhance the sanctuary, providing plants and garden decorations.

It was asked if there is a contingency plan if staff get sick (COVID-19). Coleen Wall responded that M&P would follow the usual procedures for obtaining Pulpit Supply or Office Relief. We would need to get someone do to Caretaker Relief as required.

- Congregational Care and Membership: verbal report by David Barrows -Congregational Care have continued contacting the congregation to see how they are doing and letting them know we care. So far, they have contacted about 75 different households. Many of the people have been thankful for the contact, and have expressed appreciation to Craig Miller for providing the online services.
 - -Craig Miller has received feedback from various people that it was wonderful to have David Barrows call to check on them.
 - -With April 22 being Administrative Professionals Day, on behalf of the committee and all of Knox, David Barrows thanked Sharon McIntosh for her work at Knox. Many council members added thanks.
 - -The Inbetweeners have been checking in with their group membership by e-mail.
 - -Craig Miller advised people who were not churchgoers have found the on-line worship has been a good starting point to see what Knox does.
- 6) Vice Chair: verbal report by Debby Dandy
 - -She has been in conversation with community members regarding housing (homeless) people during COVID-19.
 - -The newsletter is on hold until events to report on are actually happening.

- 7) Christian Education: verbal report by Leanne Sprung

 Antoinette has been meeting with youth via zoom. She has had a positive response.
 - -SKC zoom meetings are going well the kids really got into singing with Madelyn and Quentin in Jump for Joy. The next meeting's song is God's Got the Whole World in His Hands. Over the next few weeks, they will be checking on how everyone's plants are doing. The first week had 4 or 5 families participate, the second week had 3. Hopefully there will be more, but the small group also allows for lots of participation and the kids are really enjoying connecting with each other. They are following the curriculum, and each session consists of a story, conversation, and song. The half hour goes by quickly.
 - -Leanne also asked council to pass along any feedback they might hear.
- 8) Trustees: No report
 - -Wayne Clayton mentioned they still hope to do an inventory at Knox.
 - -Also, he has contacted our insurance broker with respect to premium discounts for monitoring systems, and will advise when we get a response.
- 9) Stewardship: verbal report by Alan Moulin
 -With changing times, stewardship goals are also changing. They will
 wait to see the effects of the government (subsidy) programs before
 taking any action on approaching the congregation to contribute to any
 shortfalls due to the closures.
- 10) Outreach: Attached, highlighted by Wayne Digby
 - -The committee has been meeting regularly although most activities are on hold.
 - -They decided to refer people to the Mission & Service website for Minute for Mission, rather than include the Minute during on-line worship.
 - -With increased patrols, the Brandon Bear Clan finds its needs are increasing. At the time of this meeting, the Sobeys Gift Card project has raised approximately \$800. Outreach wishes to donate \$200 of these funds to the Brandon Bear Clan.
 - -Tipi project: Craig Miller and a small group are working on signage wordings.

Discussion:

-It was asked if support required by the Bear Clan is just financial, or if they need donations of items. Toiletries can be donated. Also, a group of individuals from Knox, Trinity, Central and Forrest United Churches are making and donating muffins.

That \$200 of Sobeys funds (gift card proceeds) be given to the Bear
Clan.

Refuge Brandon:

- -Wayne Clayton advised the committee has a meeting coming up. The Rohingyan family still wishes to move to Winnipeg, but that is on hold with the COVID situation. The committee will be discussing what support they can give.
- -Wayne also mentioned much support was received for the call for household items for the foreign students moving to an apartment as their residence at the university was closed due to the COVID situation.

 - -Sharon Christmas advised city compost collection will begin on May 5.
- 12) Affirm Committee: Attached
 - -No activities are planned at this time.
 - -Southwestern Affirm cluster has registered for Zoom meetings for the cluster.

New Business:

- Annual Congregational Meeting Part 2
 The meeting will need to be postponed. The date can be set once the church is again fully open to the congregation.
- b. Government Relief programs
 - -10% wage subsidy (federal government): Procedures for obtaining this subsidy were arranged through General Counsel and ADP. ADP will calculate the amount of subsidy and put the funds back into our account. This will begin with the April payroll.
 - -The Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy: This is a 75% federal wage subsidy. To apply for this subsidy, the business must have lost 15% income for March, and 30% income for April and May due to the COVID closure. As each pastoral charge has different circumstances, it is necessary for each to apply on their own. Our treasurer did calculations and Knox does not meet the 15% requirement for March.

The government has also announced there will be a program specifically for charities. Details are not yet known.

In addition to the government subsidies, the United Church Foundation is offering a \$10,000 loan to each pastoral charge interest free until Sept 30, 2021. If it is paid back by then, they give a \$500 grant (deducted off repayment). Full details are not yet known. It will be needs based and ability based. Applications will be out next week. The Treasurer's recommendation is to apply this loan.

Motion: Shelley Tataryn/Alan Moulin That we apply for this \$10,000 loan.

Discussion:

- -Many felt that while applying for the loan may be a good business decision, it may not be a good ethical decision as we do have investments we could cash in if we find are operating funds are short.
- -Council were reminded that applying for the loan does not necessarily mean being accepted for the loan.
- -After discussion, the consensus of Council was to table this motion until the next meeting when full details should be available. In addition, by that time we may also know more about what support we will be getting through the government programs. Shelley and Alan agreed the motion be tabled.

At this point there was a discussion regarding rental payment from our ongoing and lease renters. Some payments have been received; some have not. We have not cashed any payments by cheque since the facility closure until Council could discuss. Some payments were pre-paid or paid by automatic deposit. When asked, the office advised renters the matter would be discussed at Council. In discussion, many on Council expressed the opinion that we should not be charging rent for meeting space which cannot be used because of the closure. However, a group that rents space only for storage is not really affected by it.

Motion: Roger Bright/Wayne Clayton Carried

To discontinue charging rents while the facilities are closed with the exception of storage only rentals.

Sharon McIntosh will contact renters and advise them accordingly. While not charging rent, we can advise that any group wishing to make a donation towards the building expenses at this time is welcome to do so. Also, we will offer reimbursement to those groups who pre-paid or pay by automatic deposit.

Pastoral Concerns

COVID-19 Response

We have followed recommendations from the General Council and the Prairie to Pine Region. Spiritual Care

Finances

The information has shifted from what we were first hearing and Sharon will likely need some support to review our application. I was hoping that there would be some ideas coming from GC regarding online fundraising but that has not happened yet.

It has been wonderful to work with Bernie, Mindy, and Jane during this fairly stressful time. They've adapted quickly and Bernie has provided invaluable support in creating the space for our time. Bernie also made arrangements for the special music that we had for Lent and Easter that so many of our folks have expressed appreciation for. Roger came in the first Sunday to keep an eye on things but has been able to stay home since that time.

We are hearing from many that they hope we will continue to have a live stream option after we return to our normal worship gatherings. I will be reaching out to a few folks that may be able to assist us in putting a more permanent system in with a better camera(s) and ability to patch in our sound system.
