THE PREAMBLE

In order that all things may be done harmoniously and in order that we may help one another in our Christian service, and to the end that this body may be governed in an orderly manner, for the purpose of preserving the liberties and corresponding responsibilities inherent in each individual member of this church, to set forth the relationship of this body to the Tar River Baptist Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention, we do declare and establish this constitution.

Article I: Name

This body shall be known as the Mountain Grove Baptist Church, Franklin County, North Carolina.

Article II: Purpose

The purpose of this body shall be to provide opportunities for Christian worship and service, to propagate the gospel at home and throughout the rest of the world in cooperation with other churches of like faith through the State and Southern Baptist Convention; to practice the ordinances, doctrines, stewardship, and ethics <u>as set forth in</u> <u>the New Testament</u> by our Lord Jesus Christ; to nurture its members through a program of Christian education and in all of those matters to encourage one another to strive earnestly to glorify Christ by personal and public devotion through the leadership of His Holy Spirit.

Article III: Articles of Faith

I. Of the Scriptures

"We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspire; and is a perfect treasurer of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without mixture of error for it matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions shall be tried."

II. Of the True God

"We believe that there is one, and only one living and true God, an infinite, intelligent Spirit, whose name is JEHOVAH, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of heaven and

earth; inexpressibly glorious in holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence, and love; that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit; equal in every divine perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption."

III. Of the Fall of Man

voluntarily transgression fell from the holy and happy state; in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the Law of God, positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse."

IV. Of the Way of Salvation

"We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, through the mediatorial office of the Son of God; who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by His personal obedience. and by His death made a full atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, He is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in His wonderful person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is in every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and all-sufficient Savior."

V. Of Justification

"We believe that the great gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in him is justification; that justification included the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principle of righteousness; that is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through faith in the Redeemer's blood; by virtue of which faith his perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every brother, blessing needful for time eternity."

VI. Of the Freeness of Salvation

"We believe that the blessings of salvation are made to all by the gospel; that is the duty of all to accept them by a cordial, penitent, and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the gospel; which rejection involves him in an aggravated condemnation."

VII. Of Grace in Regeneration

"We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy spirit, in connection with divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life."

VIII. Of Repentance and Faith

"We believe that repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces, wrought in our soul by the regeneration Spirit of God whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger, and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time-heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Briest, and King, and relying

IX. Of God's Purpose and Grace

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"We believe that election is the eternal purpose of God, according to which he graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, being infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, and trust in God and active imitation of his free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effect in all who truly believe the gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and to ascertain it with regard to ourselves, demands and deserves the utmost diligence."

X. Of Sanctification

"We believe that sanctification is the process by which, according to the will of God, we are made partakers of His holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer, and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means -- especially, the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness, and prayer."

XI. Of the Perseverance of Saints

"We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special providence watches over their welfare, and that they are kept by the power of God throughout faith unto salvation."

XII. Of the Harmony of the Law and the Gospel

"We believe that the law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of moral government; that is holy, just, and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precept, arises entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the holy law, is the one great end of the gospel, and of the means of grace connected with the establishment of the visible church."

XIII. Of a Gospel Church

"We believe that a visible church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers,

associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ; governed by his laws, and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His word; that its only Scriptural officers are bishops or pastors, and deacons, whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles of Timothy and Titus."

XIV. Of Baptism and the Lord's Supper "Werbelieve that Christian Baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the name of the Father, And Son, and Holy Ghost: to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Savior, with its effect, our death to sin resurrection to a new life; that it is a prerequisite to the privileges of church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of this church by the sacred use of bread and wine [fruit of the vine], are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-evaluation."

XV. Of the Christian Sabbath

"We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from secular labor and sinful recreation, by the devout observance of all the means of grace both private and public; and by the preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God."

XVI. Of Civil Government

"We believe that civil government is of divine appointment for the interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed, except only in things opposed to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is the only Lord of the conscience and the Prince of the kings of the earth."

XVII. Of the Righteousness and the Wicked

"We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of our God, are truly righteous in his esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked, and under distinction holds among men, both in and after death."

XVIII. Of the World to Come

"We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that in the last day Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be judged to endless punishment; and the righteous to endless joy; and that this Judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness."
