

Flag Day History

When the American
Revolution broke out in 1775,
the colonists weren't fighting
united under a single flag.
Instead, most regiments
participating in the war for
independence against the
British fought under their own
flags. In June of 1775, the
Second Continental

Congress
met in Philadelphia to
create the Continental
Army—a unified
colonial fighting force—
with the hopes of a more
organized battle against its
colonial oppressors. This led to
the creation of what was,
essentially, the first "American"
flag, the Continental Colors.

For some, this flag, which was comprised of 13 red and white alternating stripes and a Union Jack in the corner, was too similar to that of the British.

George Washington soon realized that flying a flag that

George Washington soon realized that flying a flag that was even remotely close to the British flag was not a great confidence-builder for the revolutionary effort, so he turned his efforts towards creating a new symbol of freedom for the soon-to-be fledgling nation.

On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress took a break from writing the Articles of Confederation and passed a resolution stating that "the flag of the United States be 13 stripes, alternate red and white," and that "the union be 13 stars, white in a blue field, representing a new

constellation."
Over 100 years
later, in
1916, President
Woodrow
Wilson marked

the anniversary of that decree by officially establishing June 14 as Flag Day. As you celebrate the anniversary of the Stars and Stripes, here are some fast facts about "Old Glory."

Bernard Cigrand, a small-town Wisconsin teacher, originated the idea for an annual flag day, to be celebrated across the country every June 14, in 1885. That year, he led his school in the first formal observance of the holiday. Cigrand, who later changed careers and practiced dentistry in Illinois, continued to promote his concept and advocate respect for the flag throughout his life.

CARL MAXWELL

Carl grew up between Hickory and Morganton N.C. and graduated from Hildebran High School in 1965. He was very active in sports and even played semi-pro baseball for two years before he really became a high flyer. He joined the U.S. Air Force and served for four years on active duty (1966-1970). He launched into the wild blue vonder and landed in the great state of Texas for his basic training at Lackland Air Force Base (AFB). Upon completion of his basic training, he took off to aircraft maintenance school and arrived in Amarillo by the early morning light. He was later stationed at Charleston AFB for the duration of his career except for Temporary Duty (TDY'S) at various locations. Upon his promotion to Sergeant, Carl became a crew chief on the awesome C-141. During his assignment at Charleston Air Base, there were 56, C-141 assigned to the base and 85% of their missions was in support of the Vietnam war. Carl states that he was most fortunate to attend engine run school; since there were only two personnel per shift qualified in that area. Carl states that it was a thrilling experience, beyond imagination, to be sitting in the pilot's seat

running the engines at take-off rated thrust speed (TRT). Carl states that the C-141 was a fairly easy aircraft to maintain; especially with the highly skilled crew: he worked with. Carl and two other crew chiefs were promoted to E-5 six months early; if you recall the Air Force used a quota system for promotion; and this was in the middle of the war (what was the Air Force thinking in those days?). Carl states that he would have re-enlisted, but the Air Force planned to transfer him from his beloved C-141 to Dover AFB to perform his magic on the mighty C-5's, but he chose to land and begin a new phase in his career. Carl attended Piedmont Aerospace Institute and earned his FAA A&P license. He worked general aviation aircraft for six years and then made a career change and began working at Dupont performing industrial maintenance. Nothing, however, has brought to him the thrilling experience and fun as working with aircraft! Carl retired from Dupont after 27 years of faithful service and moved from Charleston to the beautiful mountains around Hayesville. Carl serves as the Post Chaplain leading us in caring for veterans and their families, as

well as being involved in numerous other Post project. He especially enjoys working with the Veterans Mission Council and coordinating the care for Veterans and their families in Clav. Cherokee. Graham. Towns, and Union counties. Carl states that the Post and Mission Council has been successful because "we have kept God at the fore front of our endeavors". Carl reveals that he has one other goal and that is the construction a housing facility for homeless veterans in our area of Western Carolina. Carl states that there are grants available if land was available.

Carl's family certainly has a military heritage, his father served in the Army Air Corps and was on Tinian Island when the Enola Gay launched to bomb Japan. His Dad's older brother was a B-17 pilot. Both his uncles, on his mother's side of the family, also served in WW II, one in the Navy and one in the Army infantry in Germany. Carl and Susan continue to serve God and Country; we are honored to serve with you in Post 532. You are a real high flyer. "OFF WE GO INTO THE WILD BLUE YONDER"

It's time to help members understand the cost of being an American

Legion Post. A Post is composed of individual members paying annual "dues" to the Post, Department and National organization. TODAY, the annual dues are

\$32.00. Your \$32.00 dues are divided in these amounts:

National \$18.50 NC Department \$9.00 Post 532 \$4.50 TOTAL \$32.00

During the June 2022 Convention of the American Legion Department of North Carolina the delegates will vote on an increase of \$5.00 in the Department dues. That will increase the Department to \$14.00. That makes the TOTAL \$32.50 for National and Department. That means that Post 532 would not receive anything from your dues. This was discussed during the March Post meeting and a recommendation was made to increase annual Post Dues to \$40.00 effective with the 2023 renewals. The new breakdown of your annual dues will look like this:

Clay County Memorial Work

We've all seen cemeteries that are run down and look abandoned. That is not the case with the Veteran's Memorial on the Hayesville square.
