We're also celebrating our graduating seniors, and we're proud to say that eight of our ten graduates are young men. To God be the glory for what He's doing in the lives of the next generation.



In a world that often rushes past the quiet strength of godly men, we want to take a moment to honor the men in our lives who reflect the love of our Heavenly Father.

Scripture reminds us of the vital role fathers play in the spiritual foundation of the family. Proverbs 20:7 ESV tells us, *"The righteous who walks in his integrity; blessed are his children after him!"* A father's faith, consistency, and prayers leave an inheritance far more valuable than gold—one of character, courage, and devotion.

To the dads who rise early to provide, who teach their children to pray, who serve their families with humility and strength—we see you, and we thank God for you. Your love doesn't always make headlines, but it is the steady hand that guides the next generation.

We also recognize that Father's Day can be bittersweet. Some are mourning the loss of a father, others may have experienced fatherhood in painful or complicated ways. To those hearts, we offer comfort and the reminder that God is the perfect Father who heals, restores, and never leaves.

As a church family, let us encourage and uplift the men among us. Let us pray for the fathers who are leading their households, mentoring others, and growing in their faith. And let us celebrate with joy those who, by their example, point us to Christ.

Happy Father's Day! May God continue to bless and strengthen every father in our community.

FOCUSED FISHING: A REMINDER TO FISH

Pastor Taylor offered a message on April 27, titled "Focused Fishing: A Reminder to Fish," that reminded us of our ongoing call to evangelism — "to get your rod and reel and go fishing." This message resonates deeply with the spirit of Pentecost. Pentecost marks the moment the Holy Spirit empowered the apostles to proclaim the gospel boldly to a diverse crowd in Jerusalem. It was a day of divine outpouring — but it was also a day of "focused" action. The apostles didn't merely wait in the upper room; they stepped out, opened their mouths, and "fished."

Pentecost, the day the Holy Spirit descended upon the apostles and ignited the early church is 50 days after Easter. Pentecost is the fulfillment of Jesus' promise in Acts 1:8 ESV: *"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses..."* That same Spirit that fell on the apostles is moving in Antioch.

Each of us has been gifted — uniquely and intentionally — to fulfill Antioch's mission of "Loving God, Loving Others." Paul reminds us in 1 Corinthians 12:7 ESV that, *"to each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good."* Don't underestimate what God can do with a willing heart led by the Holy Spirit. Antioch's mission and ministry are to be a congregation that welcomes all, loves deeply, and reflects the body of Christ.

On January 1, 1863, the Emancipation Proclamation, which promised freedom to the over 3.5 million African Americans enslaved in Confederate states, went into effect. However, more than two years would pass before the news reached African Americans in Confederate states. On June 18, 1865, General Gordon Granger, along with nearly 2,000 Union soldiers marched into Galveston, Texas taking control of the Confederate state. On June 19, 1865, Granger read "General Order #3" which ended slavery in the area. Six months later, the Thirteenth



Amendment was ratified on December 6, 1865 and ended slavery throughout the entire country. On June 19, 1866, the anniversary of Granger's announcement, formerly enslaved African Americans in Texas celebrated "Jubilee Day". The day was also called "Freedom Day" and "Liberation Day" at times before "Juneteenth". In 2021, President Joseph R. Biden, signed legislation that made **Juneteenth, June 19th, a federal holiday**.

MISSION FOCUSED: STEPS OF FAITH

Antioch Walks to End Global Water Crisis: World Vison Global 6K Walk, Run, Roll

On Saturday, May 17th, 145 walkers, runners, and volunteers gathered at Burke Lake Park for Antioch's World Vision Global 6k Walk for Clean Water. Antioch raised more than \$22,000, which allowed us to rank #11 out of 504 World Vision Global 6K teams nationwide. Antioch received more than 300 registrations/donations which will provide access to clean water for 445 people.

The six-kilometer walk represents the average round trip distance that women and children in the developing world walk to collect water that, unfortunately, is often contaminated. According to World Vision, 703 million people worldwide don't have access to clean water. Antioch has partnered with World Vision for a decade to help bring people the clean water they need for daily life. Our willingness to play an active role in solving the global water crisis is just one way Antioch continues to demonstrate that we are a church that C.A.R.E.S.



A Hard Head Makes A ... by Deloris Witcher "Train up a child in the way he should go." Prov. 22:6a KJV

"Summertime and the Living is Easy," is the first line of Ella Fitzgerald's legendary song *Summertime*. As outdoor fun peaks so do bike accidents. Riding a bicycle that has not been properly inspected or riding without a helmet can be a recipe for "scrambled heads." Over 600,000 bike-related traumatic brain injuries (TBIs) happen yearly, with the highest rates among children ages 10-14 during spring and summer. Wearing a helmet reduces the risk of brain injury by up to 88%. Make sure helmets fit properly and teach children bike safety rules like riding in designated areas and following traffic laws. Parents, model this behavior yourselves. Put on a helmet or wear a halo.

June is National Alzheimer's and Brain Health Awareness Month. Take proactive steps to learn how to protect your brain health. "A mind is a terrible thing to waste."

JUNE IS CARRIBEAN HERITAGE MONTH!

In June 2005, the House of Representatives unanimously adopted H. Con. Res. 71, sponsored by Congresswoman Barbara Lee, recognizing the significance of Caribbean people and their descendants in the history and culture of the United States. On February 14, 2006, the resolution similarly passed the Senate, culminating a two-year, bipartisan and bicameral effort. The Proclamation was issued by President George W. Bush on June 6, 2006.

TOO FAR GONE? NEVER!

The Apostle Paul is Proof You're Never Too Far Gone to be Used by God

Many of us have heard of Apostle Paul. He is one of the most influential Christians of the early church. In fact, Paul's life sets the standard for how we should live as modern-day Christians. However, it is important to know that Paul was not always a model Christian. The early days of Paul's life are quite different from his latter days.

Paul, also known as Saul, was born a Jew and Roman citizen. In his 20s, Saul led the campaign for the persecution of early followers of Jesus. He also advocated for and approved the murder of Christians. He was known to drag both men and women from their homes to prison because of their Christian beliefs. Paul hoped that the persecution and death of Christians would abolish the spread of Christianity.

Although Paul was not righteous, God changed Paul's path in one of the most miraculous ways. Paul was traveling to Damascus to continue his quest of Christian persecution when a bright light appeared, and he fell to the ground. He heard a voice questioning, "Why do you persecute me?" Paul asked who was speaking and the voice answered, "I am Jesus, who you are persecuting." Jesus told Paul, "Get up and follow my instructions."

Paul stood but he could not see anything because he was blind. Three days later, God instructed his disciple Ananias to place his hands on Paul's eyes to restore his sight. This was the beginning of Paul's new life with Christ. The Holy Spirit filled Paul after his conversion to faith, giving Paul a miraculous testimony and empowering him to share the good news. God spoke to Paul, changed his hardened heart, and filled him with the Holy Spirit. What an awesome miracle Paul experienced! This testimony led to Paul's life purpose of spreading the gospel to Gentiles (non-Jews) and his missionary travel throughout the Roman empire. Paul founded 14 confirmed churches in Asia Minor and Europe, although some scholars argue it was closer to 20. He is also author of 13 books of the Bible – more than any other biblical author. Paul used his writings to encourage persecuted Christians and local churches to remain faithful. He also focused his writings on forgiveness and God's grace and mercy.

The most important thing we can learn from Paul's life is that God can choose us at any time and in any state. God chose Paul right in the middle of his quest to stop the spread of Christianity. We have all read scripture that gives evidence of how God choose a drunkard, a tax collector, a prostitute, and so many other unlikely candidates to accomplish His will or carry out His purpose. Scripture proves you are never too far gone to be chosen. God will meet you right where you are. He has the power to change your heart and to redirect your path at any time. We must have faith that God will reveal His power and design an impactful testimony for us to share with the lost.
