THE IMPACT OF OUTREACH! by Emmanuel Baskerville

When we think about outreach, it doesn't always have to mean traveling across the world. Outreach begins right where we are — in our homes, schools, and communities. Children, youth, and young adults all have the ability to make a difference, no matter how small the action may seem.



For children, it could be something as simple as sharing with a classmate, helping a friend, or praying for someone in need. Our youth can get involved by volunteering at food drives, mentoring younger kids, or serving in ministries at church. Young adults have opportunities to step into leadership — organizing service projects, giving their time to community programs, or using their skills and resources to bless others.

This October, I have the opportunity to experience outreach firsthand through the Society of Women Engineers (SWE) at Hampton University, where I serve as Mr. SWE. We've partnered with the Mary Jackson Community Center in downtown Hampton, VA, assisting with their afterschool program on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Whether it's helping kids with arts and crafts or joining in outdoor activities, it's been a reminder that small acts of service leave a lasting impact.

Every act of outreach is a reflection of Christ's love — showing compassion and hope wherever we go.

OCTOBER IS BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

In 2025, an estimated 316,950 (one in eight) women and 2,800 men will be diagnosed with invasive breast cancer, and an additional 59,080 new cases of non-invasive breast cancer will be diagnosed according to the National Cancer Foundation. Black women are particularly at risk. Our cancer death rates are 40% higher than white women. But there is hope. According to the Foundation, there are over four million breast cancer survivors in the United States. Advancements in early detection methods and support continue to increase the chances of survival. When the disease is caught in its earliest, localized stages, the five-year relative survival rate of breast cancer is 99%. For believers, there is hope in Jesus Christ. (3 John 1:2 ESV)

Knowing the facts around breast cancer can help you prioritize your breast health or support a loved one on their breast health journey. Here are some tips that may help reduce the risk of breast cancer:

- Maintain a healthy weight. Weight gain as an adult is linked to an increased risk of breast cancer after menopause.
- Be physically active. Moderate to vigorous physical activity is linked to a lower risk of breast cancer.
- Eat healthy. Eat brightly colored/strongly flavored fruits and vegetables. Limit red and processed meats, sugary drinks, and processed foods.
- Limit alcohol and avoid smoking.
- Get regular mammograms. Women with average risk of breast cancer should have annual mammograms at age 40.
- Breastfeed. Breastfeeding for at least one year is associated with a decreased risk of breast cancer.
- **Know your body.** Check yourself regularly for changes in your breasts including lumps, nipple pain, discharge, or changes in size or shape.
- Manage stress. Reduce stress levels; practicing deep breathing and meditation can help.

Minister Khanner Hancock: A Voice for Faith and the Next Generation

For Antioch's Children and Youth Choir Director, Minister Khanner Hancock, music has always been more than notes and lyrics. It has been a safe place, helping her understand and recognize the truth and presence of God in her life. In fact, she was singing long before she realized it was a calling. As a child, Minister Khanner spoke very little but would always sing during car rides. "One day, during worship at my private day school, a familiar song began to play and I began to sing out as if it was just me and my mom in the car," she said. "The worship leader put the mic in my hand, and I have been singing ever since.

Minister Khanner's love for the arts was encouraged by her grandmother, her greatest role model, who saw a remarkable future for her even when others did not. Though she initially limited her service to song, Minister Khanner began to recognize that her gift was part of a greater purpose. She knew that God had called her "to sing, teach, advocate, and stand in the gap for the next generation."

Minister Khanner said the most rewarding part of leading Antioch's youth music ministry "has been the joy of seeing our children and youth grow in their understanding of the Word through music." In this season, she's focused on "making the most of the time and blessings God has entrusted to me. My hope is to continue supporting the mission of this six-generation church that truly cares—by serving the children, youth, and young adult ministries through the gift of song."

Minister In Training, Dr. Michelle Edwards: Returned to Serve

When Dr. Michelle Edwards returned to Antioch Baptist Church, she knew it wasn't by chance. "My return to Antioch has been divine. After 17 years away, God sent me back and has positioned me to serve the senior pastor, our staff, and our church. It is not something I could have ever orchestrated on my own. Our church is not perfect, but God is. He is evolving us as we study His word, build our faith, and trust the vision of our shepherd, Pastor Taylor."



Dr. Edwards first heard God's voice clearly during a class she teaches for Black women called Selfology. As she invited the women to consider what God was birthing in their lives, God

spoke to her about what He was birthing in hers. "God is stretching me to think more biblically and spiritually about people", she said. In 2021, Dr. Edwards's lost her husband suddenly and her faith has been deepened through grief.

"On this journey, I have not walked alone. Pastor Taylor has modeled biblical leadership and patience. My mentor, Rev. Dennis Drake, pushes, supports, and encourages me. My grandmother remains my personal role model for how to live faithfully as a Christian", said Dr. Michelle.

Dr. Edwards knows her heart lies in encouraging women and those often forgotten by society but she is committed to doing God's will for her in ministry. Her advice to anyone considering ministry is: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding." (Proverbs 3:5-6) and "Seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness" (Matthew 6:33). These verses guide her as she listens, learns, and waits on God's timing.

October is breast cancer awareness month — and also Domestic Violence Awareness Month which shines a light on an urgent crisis which is often overlooked. Domestic violence is a widespread issue that affects men, women, and teens. One in 4 women

and nearly 1 in 10 men will experience sexual violence, physical violence such as slapping, hitting and pushing, or stalking by an intimate partner. Approximately 1 in 3 adolescents experience some form of dating violence, which can include physical, emotional, or sexual abuse.

Millions experience psychological aggression by an intimate partner, such as threatening, controlling, and isolation. The impacts of domestic violence are far-reaching, causing severe emotional, mental, and physical problems. Many victims suffer in silence because of fear for their children, fear of losing housing and financial support, isolation, cultural stigma, religious beliefs, and shame.
