### Moving Forward Together in Unity, Healing, and Hope: Handling Confrontation with Care

Hey Antioch Family,

As we continue moving forward together in unity, healing, and hope, I've been thinking a lot about how we handle challenges, especially when it comes to confrontation. It's never easy, but James gives us some great advice on how to navigate tough situations with grace. He reminds us that real wisdom is peace-loving, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy (James 3:17). That sounds like the kind of wisdom that can help us grow stronger together, even when we don't see eye to eye.

I believe our **C.A.R.E.S.** values can really guide us through these moments. Here's how we can put them into practice:

- **Charity**: Charity isn't just about giving—it's about leading with love. In difficult conversations, let's show each other grace and understanding, even when things feel tense. It's amazing what love can do to diffuse a situation.
- Adapts: Change is constant, and we must be flexible. James tells us to be quick to listen and slow to speak (James 1:19), which is a great reminder to stay open and humble. When we adapt our approach, we allow room for growth and better understanding.
- Relationally Warm: At the heart of it all, we're a family, and we
  want our interactions to feel like that. Let's keep things warm,
  even when conversations are hard. A little kindness and patience go a long way in keeping our relationships strong.
- Evangelism: Everything we do, including how we resolve conflicts, speaks to others about who we are and what we believe. Our actions are a witness to the world, so let's be mindful of how we treat one another, even when we disagree.
- Service: Lastly, when things get tough, let's look for ways to serve each other. Putting someone else's needs ahead of our own can shift the dynamic and bring about healing in unexpected ways.

Antioch, as we continue "Shifting for Greater," I'm excited about how far we've come and for where we're headed. Let's not be afraid to have those tough conversations, as Paul did with John Mark, but let's approach them with love, flexibility, kindness, and a heart for service. We're all in this together, and I know that with God's wisdom, we can come out stronger on the other side.

#### OCTOBER IS BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

Every one of us has been touched by breast cancer, whether we know it or not. Perhaps someone in your circle—a friend, colleague, loved one, or maybe even you yourself— has received a breast cancer diagnosis. In 2024, an estimated 310,270 new cases of invasive breast cancer will be diagnosed in women in the United States, according to the National Breast Cancer Foundation, Inc. One in eight women will develop breast cancer in her lifetime, and an estimated 2,800 men will be diagnosed with the disease. Black women are particularly at risk. Our cancer death rates are 40% higher than white women.

But there is hope: According to the Foundation, there are over four million breast cancer survivors in the country. Advancements in early detection methods and support continue to increase the chances of survival. When the disease is caught in its earliest, localized stages, the five-year relative survival rate of breast cancer is 99%. For believers, there is hope in Jesus Christ. "Beloved, I pray that all may go well with you and that you may be in good health, as it goes well with your soul." 3 John 1:2 ESV

Knowing the facts around breast cancer can help you prioritize your breast health or support a loved one on their breast health journey. Here are some tips that may help reduce the risk of breast cancer:

- Maintain a healthy weight. Weight gain as an adult, or being overweight, is linked to an increased risk of breast cancer after menopause.
- Be physically active. Moderate to vigorous physical activity is linked to a lower risk of breast cancer.
- Eat healthy. Eat brightly colored or strongly flavored fruits and vegetables, and limit red and processed meats, sugary drinks, and processed foods.
- Limit alcohol. Alcohol increases the risk of breast cancer, so it's best to drink little or no alcohol.
- Avoid smoking. Smoking is linked to an increased risk of breast cancer, and quitting can help reduce that risk.
- Get regular mammograms. Women with an average risk of breast cancer should start getting annual mammograms at age 40.
- Breastfeed. Breastfeeding for at least one year is associated with a decreased risk of breast cancer.
- Know your body. Check yourself regularly for changes in your breasts including lumps, nipple pain, discharge, or changes in size or shape.
- Manage stress. Reducing stress levels can benefit overall health, and practices like deep breathing and meditation can help.

Early Screening and Diagnosis is One of the Paths to a Better Prognosis by Leonard and Renee Toyer Generally, October is observed as Breast cancer awareness month. However, this year at Antioch, we are encouraging members to pursue early prevention and screening measures for all types of cancer. According to the American Cancer Society (ACS), cancer is the second leading cause of death in the United States, second to heart disease. The ACS has published prevention guidelines for diet and physical activity. Your healthcare provider can schedule you for screenings and counsel you on prevention strategies. Early ≥ screening can often identify cancer in its earliest stages and facilitate better treatment outcomes. Neglecting to pursue annual screenings can limit or change your treatment options. The ACS states that a lifestyle that

includes healthy eating habits and exercise may help to prevent cancer. Approximately 18% of all cancers diagnosed in the US are related to excess weight, physical inactivity, excess alcohol consumption, and/or poor nutritional habits. ### **Minister Kevin Tann Answers the Call to Ministry**

On Sunday, September 8<sup>th</sup>, Minister Kevin Tann delivered his first, official sermon titled, "Who Is Your Shepherd?" from Psalm 23:1-6 ESV. In his thought-provoking message, he shared that King David used twenty-eight personal pronouns when he pinned Psalm 23:1-6, making this scripture very personal. King David boldly proclaimed that the Lord is his shepherd. His writings indicate that he clearly understood God's provisions. Minister Tann suggested that the world would have us to believe that we are the masters of our own



fates and the captains of our own souls, but that line of thinking leads us to a life filled with sin (wants). Sin makes us restless, leads us beside troubled waters and down paths of unrighteousness. In sin, ultimately, we will dwell in the house of the lost - forever. Supported by his loving family, friends, clergy and ABC leadership, Minister Tann received his Certificate of Licensing to preach the Gospel from our Senior Pastor, Rev. Dr. Kevin B. Taylor.

In 2004, Minister Tann fully surrendered his life to Christ. Since that time, his dedication to studying God's Word has continued to grow. The foundational scripture which guides his life is Matthew 6:33, "But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added unto to you." Since joining Antioch in 2015, Minister Tann has faithfully and diligently served in the Ushers Ministry, Men's Ministry, Golf Ministry, Justice Empowerment Ministry, Feed the Homeless Ministry, and as a Deacon.

Minister Tann leads a team of Legislative Affairs professionals within the Federal Government and manages congressional matters with the United States Congress. He served for 22 years in the U.S. military in the Intelligence field and was also a UH-60 Blackhawk Helicopter Pilot. He flew several combat operations in Iraq.

Minister Tann holds a Master of Professional Studies in Legislative Affairs from The George Washington University, Washington, D.C., a Master of Public Administration and Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice from Florida International University, Miami, Florida. He is a 2019 graduate of the Antioch Bible Institute. He is currently pursuing his Master of Divinity at the Samuel Dewitt Proctor School of Theology at Virginia Union University, Richmond, Virginia. Minister Tann is married to the lovely Deacon Joi Tann. They have a gifted, classically trained and talented son, Kevin-Joseph who played a special tribute of *Amazing Grace* for his father during the ceremony.

#### **Antioch: Safe and Secure**

"But we prayed to our God and posted a guard day and night to meet this threat." Nehemiah 4:9 NIV

In early 2000, an article in Christianity Today spoke about crime being on the rise and called for churches to have a plan in place before one is needed. This fact prompted leaders at Antioch to examine the Church's safety measures to ensure members could participate in worship services and programs without fear. During that time, the Ministry took root with several volunteers.

Brother Harold Brangman and Deacon Arvin Nelson, both long time Antioch and Security Ministry members, recall events such as "True Love Waits" at NOVA Community College, the ABC Teen Lock-Ins (overnight in the sanctuary), and the Fall Festivals being the primary drivers for seeking volunteers to help ensure the safety of our members and young people. At these events, the volunteers would coordinate with the Parking Ministry, walk the grounds, and keep watch over the campus. As a result, the Security Ministry was formalized, and monitoring the Antioch campus became a cornerstone for ensuring Antioch is always safe and secure. Brother James Paul, a former ministry member, said "Members should be able to pray and worship in peace."

Antioch has been blessed by the vision and "watchful eyes" of early innovators including Melvin Wilbon, James Paul, Don Smith, and others. Over the years and with the guidance of Trustee RC Gamble, the Security Ministry grew to include rotating teams of fifteen plus members. These members were screened, trained, and assigned duties within the Ministry. This year, Antioch enhanced our security services adding EGS Security Solutions as our contracted security service provider. This team has been a welcome addition—often going beyond the call of duty. However, having faithful Antioch members remain involved as volunteers provides the best of both worlds.


