The Coming of Christ: Advent

Dear Antioch Family,

As we enter the Advent season, we embark on a journey of reflection and preparation. Advent is more than a count-down to Christmas; it is an invitation to pause and consider what Christ's coming meant—and continues to mean—for humanity.

Each week, we will explore a theme that captures the profound gift of Christ's birth: **Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love.** These themes will guide our sermons and offer opportunities to deepen our understanding of God's plan for redemption through His Son.

On December 1, we will begin with **Hope**, the promise fulfilled in Christ. His birth assures us that no matter how dark the night, the light of God's faithfulness prevails. On December 8, we will turn to **Peace**, the reconciliation brought by Christ, healing the divide between God and humanity.

December 15 will focus on **Joy**, the resounding celebration of God's salvation that surpasses life's circumstances. Finally, on December 22, we will reflect on **Love**, the unshakable truth that Christ's coming is the ultimate expression of God's boundless love for us.

This Advent season, let us also reflect on Antioch's mission of Loving God and Loving Others. What does it mean to live this out during Advent? How can we show hope, peace, joy, and love to those around us in a way that reflects the heart of Christ?

I encourage you to take time to consider these questions. Through prayer, worship, and acts of service, may we live as people transformed by the miracle of Christ's birth.

I leave you with one final question: What does Christ's coming mean to you?

Reflecting on the Advent Season

As the days grow shorter and the air turns crisp, the Christian community is entering the season of Advent— a time of expectant waiting and reflection leading up to Christmas. This special season of preparation invites us to reflect on the birth of Jesus the Christ in His first coming and the anticipation of Christ the King in His second coming.

Advent is a four-week season in the church calendar dedicated to anticipating the "arrival" or "coming" of Jesus of Nazareth, the long-awaited Messiah and King. The focus of the season is two-fold: the past and the present. Advent symbolizes the spiritual journey of individuals and a congregation as we affirm that Christ has come, that He is present, and that He will come again. It is a season of preparation with a profound sense that we live "between the time" and that we are called to be faithful stewards of what is entrusted to us as God's people.

There is an important connection between Jesus' birth and death. The nativity, the Incarnation, cannot be separated from the crucifixion. The purpose of Jesus' coming into the world and dwelling among us is to reveal God and His grace to the world through Jesus' life and teaching but also through his suffering, death, and resurrection. To reflect this emphasis, Advent originally was a time of penitence and fasting, much like the Season of Lent. Today Advent is much more celebrated as a time of joy and happiness as we await the coming of the King.

Advent is a time of preparation that is marked by prayer and reflection – reflections on hope, peace, joy, and love. Advent is symbolized by the lighting of candles in an Advent wreath, or circle, with each candle representing a different virtue:

Hope: The first candle is known as the candle of Expectation or the Prophecy Candle.

Peace: The second candle, known as the Bethlehem Candle, reminds us of Mary's journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem before Mary gave birth to Jesus.

Joy: The third candle, also known as the Shepherd's Candle, represents the joy Jesus brought to the world.

Love: The fourth candle, also known as the Angel's Candle, symbolizes the message of God's love that the Angels announced at Christ's birth.

(Some include a Candle in the middle to represent Jesus Christ)

The beginning of Advent is a time for hanging green— decorating with evergreen wreaths, boughs, or trees that help to symbolize the new and everlasting life brought through Jesus Christ.

For 2024, Advent starts on Sunday, December 1st, continues for four Sundays concluding on December 24th, Christmas Eve, with a joyous celebration of Christ's birth, Christmas Day.

He didn't give us His best so we could have a sense of failure, condemnation, or even unworthiness.



From an Early Age, God Was Preparing Him For More!



We wanted to know what made our Senior Pastor the man he is today, so we asked Lady Leona for the scoop. She, in turn, posed the question to her mother-in-law, Mrs. Mary Taylor, who chuckled and said, "Girl, I don't think anybody saw him becoming the man he is today." She then proceeded to share a few key experiences that shaped Pastor Taylor's life and, ultimately, foreshadowed his future:

Kevin B. Taylor

As a young boy, he enjoyed going to church and Sunday school. At 8, during a Sunday night revival, she believes he was touched by the Holy Spirit for the first time. She remembered him crying nonstop and saying that he felt "different" and wanted to be

baptized. Reluctantly, she advised him to wait; back then they weren't baptizing children that young in age. Plus, he looked even younger than he actually was.

As a teenager, he was always motivated and excited to participate in the fundraising efforts their church would organize to take youth on various trips. He would assist with making cold cuts, cupcakes, or whatever else they were preparing at the time. She said it was during this time that he stressed how much he did not like public speaking.

It was also during this time that he shared with his mom that he no longer cared for going to their home church where he grew up. She thinks it was partly because his older brothers had gone off — one to college and the other just on his own way. Furthermore, many of his friends' parents weren't making them go, so he didn't want to be forced to attend either. She told him that was fine as long as he was attending somewhere that would make him happy. That's when he started attending his paternal grandfather's church, First Elizabeth Baptist Church.

When he got to college, she found out that he, along with his best friend at the time, Clarence Jackson, had organized a program to help prepare high school males for college. They advised them on what they could expect, what to do, and — most importantly — what not to do. She remembers him telling her, and I quote, "Mama, if some of these parents knew what their kids were doing on campus, they would disown them!"

On one of his breaks from college, his mom noticed that he was different. She told him that she dreamed that he was going to become a preacher, but he brushed it off. Later that same day, he visited his maternal grandmother, and she told him he had a certain glow about him and how she dreamed he was anointed to preach. He was in disbelief, but deep down, they think he also knew.

At the age of 22, he delivered a powerful eulogy for his grandfather. This was the major turning point in his public speaking. After fighting the call for a number of years, he finally submitted. And now we are all blessed to have the Rev. Dr. Kevin. B. Taylor, Senior Pastor, Teacher Extraordinaire, Man of God! 
