

REVEREND JEFFERY GAINES, SR. ANTIOCH'S TRANSITIONAL PASTOR

I will press forward in serving God and serving others. I will ask the tough



questions helping the church think about how best to move forward. I want to focus on what the members need during this transition. I never buy into the status quo. If it can be done better, then let's do it better now!"

The DOVE and Grief Share ministries are near and dear to Reverend G's heart. Though all ministries are important, he finds great joy in helping people who have experienced loss. He and Sister Gaines led the Grief Share ministry for almost eleven years at Antioch.

"I had to overcome a lot of negative influences throughout my early years," said Reverend G. The words of encouragement I received along the way coupled with 1 Thessalonians 5:11 "Therefore encourage one another and build one another up, just as you are doing" changed my life trajectory and inspired me to write "My Journey and Life's Lessons Along the Way". If I can help somebody along the way that's exactly what I want to do.

My beautiful wife, Brenda has been very instrumental in my walk with Christ. Brenda initially encouraged me to go to church and has been my biggest influencer, champion, and supporter. We enjoy serving together as partners in marriage and ministry.

Antioch's Feed The Homeless Ministry: Sharing the Love of Christ at Christmas and All Year Long

Christmas is a time of reflection on the birth of the Christ Child and about the love, kindness, and joy all around us. Antioch's Feed the Homeless Ministry embodies that spirit throughout the year.

The ministry, under Missions & Outreach led by Reverend Michael Coppedge, is Antioch's very first ministry. Established in 1989 by founding Pastor John Q. Gibbs, the ministry collaborated with Fairfax County's FACETS, which works closely with over one hundred faith communities to open doors for people in need, and with Shoppers Food Warehouse to secure food donations and/or discounts. In the early years, Feed the Homeless began preparing meals at the Salvation Army, then moved to Fairfax Presbyterian Church kitchen facility and as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, currently packages meals at Antioch.

Each month, on the fourth Tuesday, the ministry serves approximately 175 nutritious meals to thirty to forty people who are also picking up meals for their families in some cases.



Through your generous donations of \$2.100 during the Antioch Revival, Antioch also provided "hope bags" in December with the meals. The hope bags (backpacks) were filled with hats, gloves, neck warmers, socks, travel-size toothbrushes, toothpaste, hand sanitizers, wet wipes, fleece blankets, emergency mylar thermal blankets and other items.

With more families being impacted by inflation and rising costs, the ministry needs more servant volunteers. The ministry is open to all who have an open heart and are eager to show God's love while delivering, serving, and sharing the Gospel with the homeless.

Volunteers meet on the fourth Tuesday each month, beginning at 4:30pm. Meals are prepared in three phases – food/supply pickup, food preparation, and food delivery to two to four drop-off points/stops throughout Fairfax County. Volunteers can choose to serve in one, two, or all three phases, based on your availability. Youth can earn community service hours for school requirements. Deacon Gil McManus is the lead servant for the ministry. Earlier ministry leaders included: Sister Kim Ryals, Sister Gwen Patton, Rev. Keith Coleman, the late Rev. Emerson Ellis, Sister Kobe Owens, and Deacon Al Ruffin.

Christmas is a time for celebration of God's love for the world through the birth of Jesus Christ.
