

WEEK 2: ISRAEL'S STORY DEUTERONOMY 1-3

THE SETTING

- "East of the Jordan"—about to enter the Promised Land.
- "In the fortieth year"—40 as a number of fulfillment.

THE STORY

- 1—Leaders and Rebels
 - o God's command to leave Horeb/Sinai and enter Promised Land (1:6-8)
 - Moses delegates leadership to the tribes (1:9-18)
 - Mistrust—spies sent out, refusal to enter, defeat in illegitimate battle (1:19-46)
- 2—Wandering and First Victory
 - o Finding hospitality among distant relatives (2:1-23)
 - o Let's try this again: 2nd command to attack Amorites (2:24-25)
 - o First decisive victory over Sihon King of Heshbon (2:26-37)
- 3—Second Victory, Division of Land, Moses' Vista
 - Defeat of Og King of Bashan (3:1-11)
 - o Division of land east of the Jordan (3:12-20)
 - Moses allowed to see the Promised Land from on high (3:21-29)

THE SIGNIFICANCE

- Rehearsal of history for a new generation (history matters!)
- God's character and power can be known through history.
- Depending on the hospitality of others is part of our identity. Hospitality is who
 we are.
- Deuteronomic Doctrine of Warfare:
 - Victory is God's gift
 - o Israel's wars were justified by:

- God's promise and election (the land was promised by God's choice alone)
- The hostility of Israel's enemies (Sihon rejected the offer of peace, and Og came out ready for battle)
- Israel was required to have <u>faith</u> and <u>courage</u>. These are the weapons of total victory even today.
