A special thank you to Gary Rairdon who spearheaded the drive to clean up our Elks cemetery site at Evergreen Cemetery, and to Pamela Dill who repaired and painted the Elk in front of our Lodge. Both were way overdue and now both look much better than I have ever seen before.

ELK LEGACY SCHOLARSHIPSCHILDREN, GRANDCHILDREN OF ELK MEMBERS ELIGIBLE TO APPLY

Legacy Awards are \$4,000 scholarships available to children and grandchildren of Elks members. **The 2025 contest and application IS NOW OPEN.** For the 2025 contest, any child or grandchild (or step-child.

step-grandchild, or legal ward) of a living Elk who joined the Order on or before April 1, 2022, eligible to apply. The Elk must also be a paid-up member through March 31, 2025. Great-grandchildren are not eligible.

The applicant must be a high school senior. The applicant must apply online only. **The 2025 Legacy Awards application deadline is February 3, 2025, 2:59 pm ET.**

You do not need to submit ACT and/or SAT scores. Legacy Awards may only be applied to accredited US American schools, colleges or universities.

Celebrating Our Grandparents...September 8

National Grandparents Day has more than one origin. Some people consider it to have been first proposed by Michael Goldgar in the 1970s after he visited his aunt in an Atlanta nursing home, Spending \$11,000 of his own money in lobbying efforts to have the day officially recognized, he made 17 trips to Washington DC over a seven-year span to meet with legislators.

Others consider Marian McQuade, a housewife in West Virginia, to have been the main driver for the day of observance. Throughout the 1970s McQuade worked hard to educate the people about the important contributions senior citizens made and the contributions that they would be willing to make if asked. She also urged people to adopt a grandparent, not for one day a year and not for material giving, but for a lifetime of experience.

National Grandparents Day was finally signed into law by President Jimmy Carter in 1978. Marian McQuade received a phone call from the White House to advise her of this event. Many people believe that National Grandparents Day was inspired by her efforts. A presidential proclamation made this day official – it designated Sunday, September 9, 1979, (the "first Sunday of September following Labor Day") as National Grandparents Day.



MEET OUR VOLUNTEER.....STEVE COREY

Recently I sat down with Steve Corey as he agreed to be the September volunteer feature. Having been a member of the Elks for 48 years, Steve is a wealth of knowledge. He originally joined because he "wanted to be an Elk and it was a good thing to do." I asked Steve to give me a synopsis on the history of the building and how we got where we are today.

Looking back, and unsure of the actual years, the Elks sold land to UNUM for them to build the road that currently goes back to their headquarters. Several years later, the Elks sold UNUM land so they could build their current HO3



Headquarters, for \$800,000. Due to some unfortunate finances, the money quickly dwindled and it was determined the Elks could no longer afford to stay on Congress Street. The Elks looked at buying the Keeley the Caterer facility on Warren Avenue, and Maine Eye wanted to purchase the Elks property. Unfortunately, the Maine Eye deal fell through, and the City made too many requirements for the Elks to move.

Around 2010, the current Medical Office facility next to the Elks approached the Elks to purchase all of the land and build a condo association, with the Elks being one of the tenants. The land was sold for \$1.2 million. Steve became head of the Building Committee and the process began to renovate the building in May 2017. Not only did the sale of the property allow our Lodge to get out of debt, it provided the necessary funding to start over. Because of Steve's work as an electrician and working with the City, the process went smoothly. Hardy Pond Construction was hired, along with other vendors to complete the project. Steve was on hand daily to oversee the work, help design space, do most of the electrical work himself to save costs. As he states, "we had to do, what we had to do." He met with the bartenders for their input on the design of the bar. He redesigned the men's and ladies' bathrooms, and worked continuously to stay within budget. In November 2017, Lodge 188 held a grand reopening!!

Steve's work as a master electrician began right out of high school as an apprentice at ABC Electric, followed by Marino Electric, then Shaw's. Once he gained his masters electrician license, he started his own company, Corey Electric. While he still does work for the company, his son has taken over the business. Steve also was the electrical inspector for the City of Westbrook for 39 years, and is now the electrical inspector for the City of Portland, a job he has held for the past ten years.

Steve's volunteer work includes 25 years with Windham and Westbrook Little Leagues, maintaining their field houses, and he just recently finished constructing the Scarborough Little League concession stand. For 20+ years he was the building/maintenance person at the Italian Heritage Center.

Steve is married and lives in Gorham He and his wife have two children and four grandchildren.

It has been known that when asked, Steve has helped too many Elk members to count with home projects.

Steve volunteers because he likes to; he doesn't need any recognition, and just wants to make sure that the Elks has a presence in Portland for generations to come.




