A weekend of music, food, family fun — and a rallying call to "SOS: Save Our Shrimpers."

New Orleans, LA (October 14, 2025) — With just days to go before the Second Annual Louisiana Shrimp Festival & Shrimp Aid, excitement is building for a weekend packed with live music, local food, art, and community. Taking place Saturday and Sunday, October 18–19, 2025 at The Broadside (600 N. Broad Street, Mid-City New Orleans), this year's festival promises to be both a celebration and a call to action to support Louisiana's wild-caught shrimpers and coastal communities.

Live Music All Weekend

The stage will be alive with Louisiana sound and soul, featuring a diverse lineup of local and regional favorites including:

Why "SOS: Save Our Shrimpers"

Imported, farm-raised shrimp continue to flood U.S. markets, driving dock prices down to unsustainable levels—some as low as **45–65 cents per pound**. At these prices, many shrimpers can no longer operate, threatening a centuries-old livelihood and Louisiana's coastal identity.

In 2000, Louisiana had **over 11,000 shrimping vessels**; today, that number has dropped to around **2,900**. The festival's mission is to rally public awareness and support for those who feed us, protect our waters, and embody Louisiana's cultural heritage.

The Louisiana Shrimp Festival & Shrimp Aid is organized by Shrimp Aid, a nonprofit dedicated to protecting Gulf Coast and domestic shrimpers and the communities they sustain. Through advocacy, education, and celebration, Shrimp Aid connects consumers, chefs, and policymakers to the people and ecosystems behind America's seafood.

Together with local partners, the festival aims to **ensure the survival of our domestic shrimpers** and protect Louisiana's working waterfronts for generations to come.
