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






DARBY CHECKETTS

Some Ask: What Has Faith Got to Do with It?

Is faith merely mythology? Explanations of "disbelief" might be based on the hypotheses of the ancient Roman philosopher, **Lucretius**, whose poem, "On the Nature of Things," puts forth these ideas...

- 1) The day-to-day happenings and year-to-year events of the world can be simply explained by the occurrence of *natural phenomena* resulting from the predictable yet purposeless interactions of tiny atoms moving in space.
- 2) There is no need to fear death. It is merely the dissolution of a person's physical mind. Death is neither good nor bad for there will be an absence of sensation and thought. A dead person will not miss *being alive*.



Can You Bet Your Life on God?

Life is about examining situations, weighing possible consequences and making choices. In Vegas, it's called gambling. The odds are not in your favor.

Where God is involved, sometimes you take a *leap of faith*. You have nothing to lose and everything to gain from believing that, in the end, *the lights don't just go out*.

Where Is God?


Make me two tiny, infinitely flexible feet to provide perfect balance, to automatically increase in size, with self-healing skin to cover these most delightful living things to have and to hold.

Does it matter that you know how to find it?


In a world of distractions, what is the inner compass we need?


Are God's commandments limitations or life insurance?


Do they restrict us or free us?
