ELECTION RESULTS

Once more, the mantra "Big Rock votes" wasn't just lip service. Of the 1256 registered voters in the township, 828 cast a ballot, a combined average of 65.92% between the two precincts. County-wide numbers were only at 53% turnout, but even there a majority of those able to do so cast a ballot. There were only 47 of 292 precincts in Kane County that had a higher turnout than our average.

The township board recently approved the 2022 property tax levy (payable in 2023) for the township and road district. The township is subject to a property tax cap that links increases in the tax levy to inflation measured by the national Consumer Price Index (CPI). With inflation increasing the CPI to over 7% in the last year, the maximum increase for most local governments is capped at 5%,

Big Rock Township remains in excellent financial shape and has sufficient reserves to support our current township activities, maintain our two cemeteries, operate and improve the township hall, and fund other approved projects for next year. Because of these strong finances, the 2022

township tax levy will not increase next year, with only a small increase (\$1,250) in the separate Mental Health fund. The township has not increased our tax levy for 3 of the past 4 years.

The Big Rock Road District also has strong financial reserves, but the Permanent Road Fund levy needed to be increased to continue the multi-year project to tar-and-chip additional township gravel roads and maintain other roads. To fund an increase in the Permanent Road Fund, the levy for other road funds remains flat (0%) and the Bridge Fund levy will decrease. The total road levy will increase 2%, well under the maximum permitted.

Your township board remains committed to providing quality services while doing our part to help address the property taxes paid by our residents.

Due to scheduling conflicts, beginning in January, the Township Board will hold its 2023 regular meetings on the 2nd THURSDAY of every month.

The Ojibwe Indians lived in upper Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan, and in to Canada. The past Northwoods Ojibwe found the birch tree provided a great deal of the items they needed to maintain life: fuel, transportation, shelter,

containers, buckets, medicine, entertainment, and more. If you're familiar with Shel Silverstein's Giving Tree, the birch tree was the Native American equivalent of a tree that gave its all.

In the gallery room of the library are numerous Native birchbark artifacts on loan from the Ray Miller collection. See firsthand how this building material lends itself to flexible, durable, lightweight, and a wide variety of items. You will be amazed by the creativity and ingenious uses of birchbark. Take our personal challenge to learn one new fact about birches or their products.

Hinckley-Big Rock provides screenings for children birth to 5 who may be delayed in developmental milestones (communication, fine/gross motor, problem-solving, and personal-social). If you have concerns about your child's development, please contact Dr. Sonntag at 815-286-7576 or jsonntag@hbr429.org to set up a screening appointment.

These screenings are conducted by a team of District Educators and Specialists and are available to families living within the HBR School District. The screening will take approximately 30 minutes to complete. Afterwards, parents will have the opportunity to discuss the results of the screening as well as any concerns about their child, with a member of the screening team.

Children 2-5 years old will participate in the screening with our team.

Children birth to 2 years old may be referred by our screening team for an Early Intervention evaluation.


