Standing for Hashem's Honor

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Hi, our names are Max, Pinny and David and this is our Dvar Torah on Parshat Emor. A Kohen represents B'nai Yisroel in their avodah to Hashem. A Kohen is required to protect their purity. One way they do this is by not coming near a dead body. The Sforno writes that this is done because the Kohen stands for Hashem's honor. This selflessness towards the protection of Hashem's honor should be done by us as well. When thinking of our actions, are they a Kiddush Hashem or a Chillul Hashem? Are our behaviors serving Hashem or are they serving us?
