



## Voice from the Past

Mother Teresa August 26, 1910 - September 5, 1997

What is poverty? Poverty is the state of being inferior in quality or extremely poor. Inflicted by history, poverty has become a global conflict that has caught the attention of many who are willing to help. Around 689 million people battle poverty around the world daily and the rates continue to increase with more people putting in the effort to help these people. One of these selfless and altruistic people who worked to help those living in poverty is Mother Teresa.

Mary Teresa Bojaxhiu, more commonly known as Mother Teresa, was born on August 26,1910 in Macedonia. At the age of 8, Mary lost her father and was raised by her mother from then on. Mary's

mother instilled a deep commitment to charity in her and taught her to help the destitute by inviting them to dine with her family.

Throughout her childhood, Mary was sent to convent-run primary school and a state-run public school, and she sang in the local catholic choir which allowed her to find her calling to religious life. At the age of 18 she decided she wanted to be a nun and went to Ireland to join the Sisters of Loreta group in Dublin where she adopted the name Sister Mary Teresa. After a year there she traveled to India where she made her First Profession of Vows and was sent to Calcutta to teach at Saint Mary's High School which was dedicated to teaching the girls in poor Bengali Families. After seeing the widespread poverty and struggles of these families, Sister Teresa made her Final Profession of Vows to a life of poverty, chastity and obedience and she took the title of Mother Teresa.

She became the school's principal and sought to lead the girls to a life of devotion to Christ. Later, Mother Teresa then believed she found a "call in her call" when she was on a train from Calcutta and believed she heard the voice of Jesus Christ telling her to "abandon teaching and work in the slums of Calcutta to aid the sick and poor".

In January of 1948, her request for official permission to leave was accepted and she left the Loretto Convent donning the blue and white sari which she wore in public for the rest of her life. Mother Teresa then took six months of basic medical training and ventured into Calcutta's slums with no more than her goal to "aid the unwanted, unloved, and uncared for". She then began taking concrete actions and began an open-air school and established a home for the dying destitute. As time passed, Mother Teresa impacted many lives and won many awards for her work around the world. She received the Nobel Peace Prize, the Medal of Freedom, and the Order of Merit from Queen Elizabeth. Mother Teresa lived her life as one of the world's greatest humanitarians and devoted her life to answering God's call. On September 5 of 1997, Mother Teresa went to eternal rest with God after living a life in the path he set for her.

# Humble Hearts Helping Hands

Giving with a willing heart means giving from our first fruits. God wants us to put giving at the top of our list and not just give what is leftover at the end of the month. Jesus uses the example of the poor widow. In Luke 21:1-4, Jesus observed many wealthy people giving a lot of money. However, they gave from their leftovers. Next, Jesus pointed out the poor widow. She only had two very low-value coins. She placed both into the offering. Jesus remarked on how she had very little yet given it all. That is sacrificial giving. God does not look at the *value* of the gift, but he looks at the *heart* of the giver.

In the upcoming Summer Enrichment class, you will have an opportunity to work on a mission activity. Think about how you and your friends could give gifts of your time and talents. God wants us to use all our resources for his glory!

The session started with Prayer and a singing session led by our *Achen*.


The main devotion was led by *Neetu Korah*, and she taught the children 3 catch phrases that they can use in their daily lives.


