

"For the last time, those are not our names!" Sweet Jam yelled.


She was so upset, she ran off. "No, wait! Don't leave!" Crunch called after her.

Welcome to the first edition of the Carmel Times.



### Insights on the Church, Liturgy and Sacraments

Worship: Worship is 'worth-ship', i.e., giving God His worth; God is worthy of our total self-offering. Christian worship is a corporate witness in faith of God's faithfulness.

This column will feature on The Church Building, Articles and Elements used during the Holy Qurbana.

The Mar Thoma Church or our Sanctuary is usually built in the East-West direction. The layout is divided into 'Madbaha' (Aramaic, meaning Altar) separated from the 'Haikala' (Syriac, meaning congregation hall).

**Haikala**: Haikala is the main congregational hall. In the ancient Eastern tradition, the congregation stood throughout the worship. Now there are pews or chairs provided in most places.

presence of God (Isa.6:1)xvii. The Madbaha is generally to the East. Madbaha is considered as the sanctum sanctorum (holy of the holies)

**Veila** (Syriac, meaning veil or curtain): Veil or the altar curtain separates the Madbaha from the congregational seating area. The Veil is referred to as 'Thira-ssila' in Malayalam. The Veil reminds us that the Madbaha is a place that is to be kept and observed as holy.





Azhikk-akam

**Azhikk-akam** (Malayalam, meaning inside the railing): Azhikk-akam is the place between the Veil and the congregational seating area separated by railings. Those who come for the 'Thanksgiving Prayer' and the communicants who come to receive the Holy elements kneel at the railings.

Madbaha: Madbaha or Altar reminds us of the divine

Chittola: (Syriac, meaning richly colored cloth) The altar sides are covered with a rich colored cloth representing the glory of God. It usually has three divisions signifying the Trinity and a cross in the center representing the Lord Jesus Christ. There could be embroidery work generally signifying wine, bread and the cross. The dove, if portrayed, signifies the Holy Spirit.





Darg

Darga (Syriac, meaning altar step): There is a step at the altar and this is called the 'Darga'

Thronos (Syriac, meaning Throne of God): The consecrated place in the Madbaha is called 'Thronos'. The 'Thronos' is also referred to as the 'Table of Life' because the bread and wine is placed upon it representing the body and blood of the Lord Jesus Christ. At the center of the Thronos, on the topmost region, the Cross is kept. On either side of it, candles are kept. The Thronos is generally decorated with flowers. The worshipping community including the celebrant faces the Thronos during the worship.

#### Cross:

On the middle of the altar a wooden cross is placed. The cross symbolizes the salvation event in Jesus Christ through his incarnation, public ministry, death on the cross, burial, resurrection and ascension. The Mar Thoma Church uses the cross without the crucifix. The cross without the crucifix signifies the risen Lord Jesus. Hence it is also referred to as the 'Easter-Cross' (Col.1:19- 20)xix.

## Voice from the Past

Sabina Wurmbrand July 10,1913 - August 11, 2000

If you were to ask someone about the greatest challenges our world is facing currently, what would their response be? War? Lack of equal opportunities for men and women? Racial discrimination? Well these are all problems of the real world that we face today. In the Christian world, a commonly faced problem world-wide, is persecution.

In the early 20th century, there was one woman who greatly dedicated her life to speaking out for the persecuted Christians worldwide.Born into a Jewish family on July 10,1913, Sabina Wurmbrand lived in Czernowitz, a city in the Austro-Hungarian Empire, in Eastern Europe, which became a part of Romania after the first world war and part of Ukraine after the second world war.

During second world war, the Catholic faith was enforced upon all the Nazi occupied countries and all Jews were ordered to be killed or isolated. Sabina suffered many losses in life. Her Jewish family, consisting of her parents, two sisters, and one brother, were killed in the Nazi concentration camps. Although Sabina was born and raised in a Jewish family and she married a Jewish man Richard Wurmbrand, together, Sabina and Richard converted into the Christian faith. Sabina and Richard, worked tirelessly to help Jewish children escape the ghettos that the Nazi regime had forced them to live in.

Once the war had ended, Russian troops began invading Romania bringing communism with them. As the communists attempted to control the churches for their own purposes, Sabina and Richard immediately began an "underground" ministry to minister to persecuted Christians as well as the invading Russian soldiers. Despite the risks of grave personal harm, they actively spoke to the invading Russian troops about their Christian faith.

Sabina and Richard worked tirelessly and organized Christian camps and formed an inter-denominational mission's organization called Voice of Martyrs' to serve the needs of persecuted Christians. The success of this organization angered the authorities and resulted in Richard's arrest and imprisonment. He spent 14

years behind bars in Communist prisons. Even so, in the face of her husband's incarceration, the murder of her whole family, Sabina continued her work and kept her faith in God at great personal risk to her own safety.

Not many women have had their faith tested like Sabina Wurmbrand. Though she suffered much sorrow and loss during the war and postwar years, she never gave up her faith in God. As a result of Sabina's steadfast belief in God, the Voice of the Martyrs continues to bring practical and spiritual assistance to persecuted Christians around the world even today. Sabina's story is a great example of unwavering faith in God in times of great adversity, and a testimony of how her courage continues to impact Christians around the world even today.

Andrew: At what age did you decide to become an Atchen and what were your reasons for making that decision?

Atchen: All through my life I was single minded on becoming an Atchen probably because of my upbringing. My parents used to tell me that they want to see me as an Atchen when I grow up. Thankfully they never compelled me at any point in life. The reasoning that I had to be an Atchen at different ages were different. I was born and raised as an Atchen's son and it would have been the special attire of my father that mattered most to me at my infancy. I wanted to be dressed up like my father and that would have been a reason at that time. When I was a boy of your age, I saw my father as an important person in the community because he is an Atchen. All were consulting him on important matters of life, he was the leader in the worship service and such leadership roles were so captivating and probably that was the reason why I wanted to be an Atchen during my boyhood days. During these days I also had the opportunity to be trained in the scripture and Christian values both at my home and at Church. This kept me close and fascinated with the tenets of the Holy Gospel and Christian life. Atchen: When I was three years old our parsonage in Delhi was broken into by some thieves who were in search of some valuables. Andrew: What stands out for you as the biggest difference between living in America and living in India?

Atchen: I really admire you all here in America as life in America is one big DIY action filled project wherein you pretty much will have to do everything yourself. You will in due course of time be organized for the sake of your survival. Washing, cleaning, shoveling the snow, plumbing, electric works, painting and what not.



I totally respect that most of you are pretty much independent and organized. But in India even if you are a procrastinator or a dependent person you can still survive and even have the luxury of getting somebody to help you out with your daily chores because workforce is available at a very cheap rate. I am not saying that one is better than the other, but each has its own pros and cons.

Andrew: If you could invite anyone (living or dead) to dinner and a conversation, who would it be and why?

Atchen: It would be my long-lost family members. Being in the loving embrace of one's own family is the most important thing in life. I feel that it is a great family that makes great personalities and donates to the world.

Andrew: What makes you happy?

Atchen: Being with people who have a liking for the Lord and his Church and are responsive to the opportunities for personal development to make themselves useful for the society.
