I am so grateful to be here, and that all of you are here, to help us mark 25 years of dedicated community building and leadership development led by Black LGBTQ+ individuals for our Queer interracial, interdenominational, and intergenerational community in Atlanta and beyond. We are also grateful for the support of our straight allies. To God be the Glory for the things she/he has done!

The Rustin/Lorde Breakfast has served as a valuable platform for activists and other concerned individuals, to fellowship together, be inspired, and foster change. Over the past 25 years, this community has shown consistent care and support for individuals affected by HIV/AIDS and other health challenges, including mental health. We have advocated against institutional racism and hatred, supported victims of violence, formed coalitions, promoted voter registration, and marched in the ML King Day March. We have also been inclusive of the faith community, the arts and culture, which we view as important to our community's well-being.

Although the Rustin/Lorde Breakfast started with only a dozen or so committed individuals in the basement of the old United Methodist building, it's grown to close to 400 participants annually. Along the way, we have seen many of our youth, some who accompanied their parents to the Breakfast as children, become scholars, politicians, teachers, writers, and more—each contributing to our collective progress. We even receive acknowledgement of our community work through letters of support from elected officials.

However, all that we have achieved is under threat by racists and homophobic individuals, especially those in government and other institutions and businesses. They want to turn the clock back by promoting and tolerating acts of intimidation, outright racism,


Greetings,

Lisa Cunningham is an Atlanta-based filmmaker and health equity strategist whose work blends cultural storytelling with community impact. She began her career in the entertainment industry, directing and producing more than a thousand music videos and visual projects. Over time, she felt called to use her creative skillset in service of health advocacy, shifting her work toward narratives that uplift and protect underrepresented communities.

Lisa has created LGBTQ health content for organizations including ViiV Healthcare and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Her transition into public health storytelling deepened her commitment to advancing equity through media, strategy, and lived experience.

Today, Lisa serves as Executive Vice President of Marketing and Communications at the Black Women's Health Imperative, where she leads innovative campaigns and national initiatives that center the voices and needs of Black women and girls. She directed content for the award-winning "I Am HIV Possible" campaign with Gilead Sciences and has partnered with cultural icons like Ciara and Mary J. Blige to elevate issues spanning breast and cervical cancer, diabetes prevention, and menopause awareness.

Lisa also directed *Me Period*, a BWHI documentary featuring Sheryl Lee Ralph and Tabitha Brown, which won the Audience Award for Best Documentary at the 2024 Essence Film Festival. Her work on the film earned her Best Director of a Documentary at the 2025 Urbanworld Film Festival, and the project continues to inspire intergenerational conversations about health, identity, and empowerment.

A passionate LGBTQ+ advocate, Lisa also serves on Atlanta Mayor Andre Dickens' LGBTQ Advisory Board, championing equity, visibility, and community-driven change.





SISTA DOCTA: ALEXIS PAULINE GUMBS



Alexis Pauline Gumbs is a Queer Black Feminist Love Evangelist and an aspirational favorite cousin to all life. Her most recent book *Survival is a Promise: The Eternal Life of Audre Lorde* revolutionizes the scale of life writing. Her award-winning meditation *Undrowned: Black Feminist Lessons from Marine Mammals* offers the critical interspecies love song. She is the founder of Brilliance Remastered, an online network and series of retreats and online intensives serving community accountable intellectuals and artists in the legacies of Audre Lorde's profound statement in "The Master's Tools Will Never Dismantle the Master's House."

Alexis is currently a Monument Lab Fellow and a Loss and Damage Collaborative Commissioned Author creating ceremony in honor

of the wisdom of climate catastrophe survivors in the legacy of Audre Lorde. Over the past 16 years, Alexis and her primary collaborator, Sangodare, have nurtured the Mobile Homecoming Project, an experiential archive amplifying generations of Black LGBTQ Brilliance. Sangodare and Alexis are also the co-founders of Black Feminist Film School, an initiative to screen, study and produce films with a Black feminist ethic.

Alexis was honored by the Anguilla Literary Festival as "The Pride of Anguilla," a small country where her grandparents Jeremiah and Lydia Gumbs played key roles in the 1967 revolution. She identifies proudly as a queer Caribbean author and scholar in the tradition of Audre Lorde, June Jordan, M. Jacqui Alexander, Dionne Brand and

MARCUS LEE


Marcus Lee is an Assistant Professor in the Department of African American Studies at Princeton University. He earned a BA in Sociology at Morehouse College and a PhD in Political Science at the University of Chicago. Broadly construed, his research concerns histories and historical representations of black gay/lesbian politics. I hope you will leave here today inspired to courageously stand against injustice, to commit to caring for our community and all humanity, and create the change that we want to see. I leave you with the words of another Black lesbian

poet, activist and friend to Audre Lorde, Pat Parker, which seems fitting for the historical moment we are in: Take the strength that you may, Wage a long battle. Take the pride that you can Never stand small. Take the rage that you can Never settle for less.

She was the first scholar to research in the papers of Audre Lorde at Spelman College, June Jordan at Harvard University and Lucille Clifton at Emory University during her research for her PhD in English, African and African American Studies and Women and Gender Studies from Duke University.

Alexis is published in dozens of edited collections and academic journals on topics ranging from black coding practices to queer Caribbean poetics, to mothering in hip hop culture. Her poetry and fiction appear in many creative journals, and she has been honored with inclusion in Best American Experimental Writing, a Pushcart Prize nomination, and honors from the Lucille Clifton Poetry Prize and the Firefly Ridge Women



BISHOP LAVOR KENTE TROY SANDERS

Bishop Troy Sanders was a visionary pastor, professor, and spiritual leader whose life embodied radical inclusion, courageous love, and unwavering faith. Raised in Denmark, South Carolina, and nurtured at Honey Ford Baptist Church, he answered the call to ministry at a young age and grew into a powerful preacher and shepherd committed to making room for all.

He was the Founder and Senior Pastor of Rehoboth Fellowship Atlanta (United Church of Christ) and served as Episcopal Assistant to Presiding Prelate Bishop Yvette A. Flunder of The Fellowship of Affirming Ministries (TFAM). Consecrated as Bishop in July 2023, he was inducted in May 2024 into Morehouse College's Perpetual Love, Light & Power: 13 Board of Preachers, one of the few openly gay clergy to receive this honor.

Bishop Sanders' ministry affirmed the divine worth of the marginalized and inspired generations to choose love, justice, and spiritual integrity. As Bishop Flunder reflected, his was a ministry that "made room for all."

Bishop Troy transitioned to eternal life on April 19, 2025. His legacy lives on through Rehoboth Fellowship Atlanta, which celebrated its 10-year anniversary in November 2025, and through all who continue to walk in love, light, and truth.

A life well lived. A job well done. Rest in peace and power.

Her life and her legacy will long be remembered, and we will always reserve an honorary seat for her at the Rustin/Lorde Breakfast table.

INTERVIEW WITH LORRAINE FONTANA: LONG TIME SUPPORTER OF THE RUSTIN/LORDE BREAKFAST

SS Lorraine, thank you so much for taking the time for this interview, and congratulations on being the recipient of the 2026 Rustin/Lorde Legacy Award! You are so deserving. You've been at practically every Breakfast, and were the first person to take photographs to document the event.

LF I enjoy helping to share the event and ongoing history with my photos and posts.

SS Anything else motivates you to attend?

LF The importance of this happening on MLK Day since 2005 for the Black queer community to say (in part), "We were there during the Civil Rights Movement, and we need to be recognized as part of our community too...all parts of us!" Also, seeing so many friends I don't get to see too often and hearing from, and giving thanks, to old and new activists in our POC communities.

SS Have there been any particular speakers/experiences at the Breakfast that stand out for you?

LF Way too many great speakers to pick one, or even a few. I DO love seeing the children come up and show us their work and speak! Hearing music and songs always lifts me.

SS You've had a long history of activism going back to the 60s. What were your motivations for getting involved back then?

LF Mostly the Civil Rights Movement on the evening news as I grew up. Also, the reading I started doing because of it, and the Black Empowerment movement, and anti-colonial/anti-imperialist info from people and books. A lot was because of the Vietnam war, but also anti-colonial struggles in Africa.

SS And you're not slowing down. Are there any particular organizations you are a part of today?

LF Yes, I am a member of First Existentialist Congregation of Atlanta's Social Justice Guild (SJG) and Atlanta Grandmother's for Peace. I had also, until recently, been active with Southerners on New Ground (SONG) and Democratic Socialists of America here in Atlanta, and am currently helping to form a new CodePink chapter here in ATL."

SS As we know, activism can be exhausting, and many activists burn out. Do you have a space of comfort for when events seem overwhelming? This could be a person, place or activity.

LF The Activities that I enjoy include shooting pool (am in a couple of leagues), water volleyball, working 1000-piece jigsaw puzzles, taking photos and sharing them, drawing and poster making. The Persons include, being with chosen-family members, and joining comrades in an action that is hopeful (and hopefully fun), like the Rustin/Lorde Breakfast!

My Place of comfort and rest is my apt where I can relax and stay in pjs all day if I want to...place to watch tv both for fun and learning something new...spending time on Facebook and responding to emails.

SS Wow, that sounds like a great balance and fun. Finally, do you have any suggestions or words of encouragement for young queer activists today?

LF Keep remembering that it's ALL related...it's not just being queer...or just being a woman...or just being poor or working class...or just being Black...or just being disabled. All the isms come from the same place and mindset—"we are better than them." Focus on community and cooperation, rather than competition and one-upsmanship. And have fun together as well as do serious/difficult actions!





THE ONLY FLOWER IN THE FIELD

Growing Up Trans In A Small Southern Rural Town

50-year-old DonnieRae Spears, is a married, African American transwoman and teacher of Fordyce, Arkansas. Fordyce is a small rural city where people know who you are by name. DonnieRae says that she is the only transgender person in Fordyce. As a matter of fact, she states she doesn't know of any other people who are a part of the LGBTQ+ community. DonnieRae desired to leave Fordyce when she was younger, to live where it was more accepted to be a transgender person. A place where no one knew who she was in order for her to feel more comfortable in her skin. The special connection with her grandmother is what tied DonnieRae to Fordyce, keeping her from leaving. She didn't want her grandmother to go into a nursing home. DonnieRae stayed to take care of her.

In her adolescence, DonnieRae met two teachers that practically raised her into who she is today. She started her transition into a woman in high school, where she found support from the two teachers who loved and accepted DonnieRae. Her mother had a very hard time accepting who DonnieRae is. Their relationship was strained from childhood. She says that she didn't have a father. DonnieRae recalls her mother saying, "can't you be who you are without wearing makeup, eyeliner, and carrying a purse"? She realized in her thirties that her mother didn't understand how to raise her, and didn't know how to deal with the things people were saying about DonnieRae in the streets. Taking into consideration what she now understood about her mother, DonnieRae chose to reconcile with her mother. They have since rebuilt their relationship. Her mother now accepts and loves DonnieRae for the woman she is.

DonnieRae talks about how she's been in Fordyce so long, that she doesn't feel there is a place where she doesn't feel unsafe. She stated that she's shunned at times by the black community; however, she's accepted by the white community. She is okay with it because she is comfortable in who she is and she isn't going to change for anybody. DonnieRae mentioned that she had one LGBTQ+ friend who passed a few years ago. All her friends are heterosexual. She expresses that Fordyce is a slow town in which anyone who is in the LGBTQ+ community usually leaves to go elsewhere to be accepted, avoid the ridicule, and criticism. That is why she feels she is the only person in the LGBTQ+ community that lives in her home town. She doesn't get any type of mental support from an LGBTQ+ space to vent because there simply isn't a community.

The closest church that provides acceptance of her identity is located in Little Rock, Arkansas. However, DonnieRae doesn't attend. DonnieRae says that the churches in Fordyce try to convert her from identifying as a woman. Once DonnieRae finishes her bachelor's degree in special education, she plans to move to a place that is more accepting of the woman she is.





JEFF GRAHAM: EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF GEORGIA EQUALITY

Humble Beginnings. Jeff Graham, executive director of Georgia Equality, reflects on his 25-year participation with the Rustin/Lorde Breakfast. As one who has been with the Breakfast from day one, Jeff is honored with joy to watch it grow and become the powerhouse it is. He is amazed to see how it started, how it has developed, how it has resonated throughout the community, and how it got so big so fast. Now it is one of the most important traditions that exists in the Atlanta LGBTQ+ community today. What's exciting to Jeff is that there are new people who find out about the Breakfast every year.

He shares that the Breakfast is a living thing that changes with the times, grows with the community need, is important, and fun. Jeff appreciates that the Breakfast makes sure communities and people could come together across the division of race, gender, and economics to really focus on creating the reality of what Dr. King talked about, the beloved community. People coming together on King Day and doing it through a queer lens is amazing!

One of Jeff's fond memories of the Rustin/Lorde Breakfast is the first year there was programming to include the children. It was recognition of how our community was evolving and adapting to the changes of our lives with growing families. It showed a need to create a safe space for families to participate together, providing volunteers to focus on the youth during the Breakfast.

Jeff remembers that in the beginning with the partnership between AIDS Survival Project, Positive Impact, and AIDS Treatment Initiative, they leased the building where the first Breakfast was held. Jeff said they were asked to host and they gave their yes. They had the community gathering space that could hold 50-60 people. The three organizations created the space for the first two to three years of the Breakfast. The basement was renovated into a community space which restrooms were added. The Breakfast was the first big event that was held in the space. Right as people were leaving and going to the King Day march, the toilets in both bathrooms overflowed. Jeff and another person stayed behind and were mopping and keeping the water from flooding out of the bathrooms. They tried to find an emergency plumber on a federal holiday. Doing all this in such a way, that no one would know all this was going on. Jeff recalls not wanting to ruin anybody's day because it had been such a great and perfect day.

Jeff is looking forward to the emotional boost that he will get by attending the Breakfast and being with such a beautiful and diverse community to start the year off. It will be good seeing people and a community come together that he cares so much about. Jeff says the Breakfast is always an expression of joyfulness. With all the difficulties predicted for this year, the Breakfast will provide fuel and grounding needed to do this work another year.






