Virtual Lecture Class Format: This class is designed for students with access to a computer and the internet. The course is a virtual (Zoom) classroom format. In this online teaching and learning environment, teachers and students can present and view course materials, lessons, and engage and interact with one another. Each class will consist of prayer, lectures, readings, presentations, and possibly guest speakers.

Course Description: HERMENEUTICS - THY 315 (14-Week Course)

A thorough study and preparation for exegesis and exposition of the Scriptures.

Prerequisite: None

Course Objectives:

- 1. To familiarize the student with the science of interpretation as it relates to biblical text.
- 2. To emphasize the principles of exegesis, particularly the interpretation of Scripture, considering its historical, grammatical, and theological context.
- 3. Understand the characteristics of a good interpreter of Scripture.
- 4. Defend a position on whether a passage of Scripture can have only one or multiple meanings.
- 5. Apply an exegetical and hermeneutical process in the interpretation of the Biblical text.
- 6. To think critically about the truths of the Scriptures in their historical context, and how they relate to today's culture.

- 7. To promote a commitment to lifelong study of the Word of God and its impact on areas of life, by reflective self-analysis through personal experience and critical thinking in developing individual values.
- 8. To understand the major divisions (i.e., gospels, epistles, apocalyptic literature), origins, authorships, and design of each book in the Bible, and God's moving in and through individuals.

Course Requirements:

- Readings: Must read the required text.
- Reflections: Reflection papers are required from each section of the text and/or class presentations of the material covered. All papers are to be two (2) pages, typed, and double-spaced. Reflection papers are to be emailed to the professor before each class.
- Research Papers: Students are required to write two (2) research papers. Research
 papers must be 7-10 pages, excluding the cover sheet and the bibliography, and the
 subject is to be on any aspect covered in the course. The APA writing style is to be
 used to format quotations and bibliography. The paper must be double-spaced, in
 12-point font, with 1-inch margins.
