Virtual Lecture Class Format: This class is designed for students with access to a computer and the internet. The course is a virtual (Zoom) classroom format. In this online teaching and learning environment, teachers and students can present and view course materials, lessons, and engage and interact with one another. Each class will consist of prayer, lectures, readings, presentations, and possibly guest speakers.

Course Description:

THEORIES OF CHRISTIAN MARRIAGE AND FAMILY COUNSELING – COU- 406

(3-Units, 7-Week Intensive Format, GRAD ONLY)

Effective Biblical teaching concerning roles within the family, with direction being given on how to counsel. Review of family therapy literature.

Prerequisite: Graduate standing, permission of the academic dean, and fits into the educational path to stay on track with the student's major.

Course Objectives:

1. Identify the **foundations of Marriage and Family Counseling**
2. Integrating **biblical theology, relational psychology, and counseling theories**.
3. Explore how forgiveness, attachment, emotional maturity, and spiritual formation shape healthy marriages and families.
4. Emphasize **pastoral application, family systems, and redemptive counseling practices** within ministry settings.

Course Requirements:

- Readings: Must read the required text.

- Reflections: Reflection papers are required each week on the topic specified in the WEEKLY ASSIGNMENT section of this syllabus. These papers are to be 1-2 pages, typed, and double-spaced. Reflection papers are to be emailed to the professor before each class.
- Final Project: Must write a Family Counseling Plan to include a Biblical foundation, theory, and pastoral application. It must be at least 5-7 pages, excluding the cover sheet and the bibliography. The APA writing style is to be used to format quotations and bibliography. The paper must be double-spaced, in 12-point font, with 1-inch margins.

Weekly Assignments/Lectures

Week 1 – Foundations & Family Systems

Assignment: Write a reflection paper on Why family patterns matter in pastoral counseling.

Week 2 – Forgiveness, Unity & Multigenerational Patterns

Assignment: Write a Case study: Family conflict and forgiveness strategies.

Week 3 – The Stages of Marriage & Family Development

Assignment: Write a reflection paper: Marriage life-cycle timeline (hypothetical or real case).

Week 4 – Attachment Theory & Emotional Bonding

Assignment: Write a reflection paper: Attachment style, self-assessment + reflection.

Week 5 – Spiritual & Adult Attachment

Assignment: Write a reflection paper: Theology and Adult Attachment in Marriage.

Week 6 – Family Therapy Models & Emotional Maturity

Assignment: Write a reflection Paper: Genogram or Emotional Maturity Assessment.

Week 7 – Speaking Blessings, Identity & Restoration

(Final Project Due Before Class)

Write a Family Counseling Plan using Biblical foundation, theory, and pastoral application. Based on your required reading from the TEXT for Week 7, integrate information also from the Topics, Theories, Biblical Integration and Ministry Focus.

Note: The instructor reserves the right to make changes to assignments, lectures, or the course schedule as he/she sees fit.
