Why Dip Challah in Salt?

The reason is that your table is compared to an altar, and since sacrifices brought on the altar all had salt, so too your bread should.

Based on Kabbalah, it is done because bread represents divine kindness, whereas salt represents strict divine judgment. And, we want kindness to overpower strict judgment. It is done three times because, again based on Kabbalah, bread (\Box n in Hebrew) has the numerical value of 78, the name of G-d (\Box n in Hebrew) has the value of 26, and 26 x 3 = 78 (26 is the value of G-d's name, and 3 is the 3 times we dip). This reminds us that we don't only live from the bread we eat; but, also the blessing of G-d in our food. \Diamond

Each plaque is accompanied by its own light, which is switched on for both yahrzeit dates and on Yom Kippur; names are also read aloud in memory from the bimah each yahrzeit and are published annually in our Yizkor Book. The cost for eternal synagogue memory is \$400.

And the Winner is...

Geraldine Brroks, Jewish author of many best-selling novels, many inspired by events in Jewish history, has been awarded the prestigious Library of Congress's 2025 American Fiction Award. Brooks is the author of "People of the Book," which chronicles the preservation of the famed Sarajevo Haggadah, and "The Secret Chord," a novel exploring the life and times of King David. A former foreign correspondent for the Wall Street Journal, Brooks won the 2006 Pulitzer Prize for fiction for her novel "March," a reimagining of "Little Women" from the father's perspective.

The award comes at a time where the Library of Congress is embroiled in controversy with the Trump administration's overhaul of government institutions to advance its ideological agenda. In August, the library drew controversy after some sections of the online version of the United States Constitution were briefly deleted due to what was explained as a "coding error." And in May, Donald Trump fired Carla Hayden, the Librarian of Congress, over her alleged "pursuit of DEI and putting inappropriate books in the library for children," cutting short her ten year term. Hayden's acting replacement, Robert Randolph Newlen, said of Brooks's award, "One of the reasons we invited Brooks to become the next Library of Congress Prize for American Fiction winner is how she makes readers feel. "I am honored by this wonderful prize from America's greatest library." Brooks said. "As a writer inspired by history, it is moving to be connected by the Library of Congress Prize for American Fiction to the institution created by John Adams for the very first Congress, saved by Thomas Jefferson after the conflagration of 1812, and carried into the present by visionary librarians who value inclusion, free expression and truth."

In 1984, Brooks married Jewish author and journalist Anthony Horowitz and converted to

Judaism. Her latest book is "Memorial Day," a memoir about the sudden death of her husband in 2019.

Last year's winner of the American fiction award went to James McBride, who also infused his Jewish background into his books, including "The Heaven& Earth Grocery Store." Previous Jewish winners include E.L. Doctorow, Philip Roth and the prize's very first honoree, Herman Wouk for his novel "Marjorie Morningstar." (www.jta.org, 8-27-25)

A Sign Causes International Outrage

In the northern German town of Flensburg, an antisemitic sign was seen in a shop window and went viral, causing international outrage. Passersby spotted a sign in the window of a used bookstore printed on white paper and reading, "Jews are banned from entering here! Nothing personal, not even antisemitism. I just can't stand vou." The 60-year-old-shop owner, Hans Velten Reisch, told German media that he put up the poster himself, out of anger over the war in Gaza. He was surprised over the public outcry. Photos of the sign drew outrage not only from Jewish leaders but also from politicians and public officials who said the message "smacked of the Holocaust." Even Israeli opposition leader Yair Lapid threatened to sue the shopkeeper "for every cent her owns" on behalf of his late father, journalist Tomislav Lempl. (Lempl survived the Budapest ghetto under the Nazis and later reported on the 1961 trial in Ierusalem of Nazi war criminal Adolf Eichmann.)

"This is a reminder of the darkest chapters of Germany's history and has absolutely no place in this city," said Fabian Geyer, mayor of Flensburg, a city of almost 100,000 near the Danish border. The shop owner said police ordered him to remove the sign from the front door which he did. But local media reported that the sign was still

visible inside the store.

The incident comes as both antisemitic incidents and anti-Israel protests have been on the rise in Germany. The board of the Orthodox Rabbinical Conference of Germany said that German Jews were becoming "collateral damage" in a conflict unfolding 1,500 miles away. "The war in Gaza must never be used as a pretext for outright hatred against Jews in Germany. Yet that is precisely what is happening: people who have nothing to do with this war are becoming collateral damage," the rabbis' statement said. "We make it clear: Jews in Germany are not responsible for Gaza." (www. forward.com, 9-19-25)

An Honor in Tenafly

In September, the street sign outside Tenafly (NJ) Borough Hall was renamed "Edan Alexander Way" in tribute to the 21-year-old American Israel Defense Forces (IDF) soldier of the Golani Brigade who survived 584 days in Hamas captivity. Alexander, 21, joined the IDF after graduating from high school in Jew Jersey. He was captured near the Gaza border during the barbaric Hamas attack of October 7th, 2023. He was one of 251 people kidnapped and was held underground in tunnels never seeing daylight. Following his release, he returned to his family in Tenafly. He was the only remaining U.S. citizen among the hostages still alive in Gaza.

"It's not just my name on a sign. It's a reminder of how powerful a community can be that refuses to give up," Alexander said. "I never felt completely alone. I knew my family and my town and so many people were fighting for me, keeping my name alive, pushing for my return. That gave me strength." Rabbi Mordecai Shain of Chabad of Tenafly said Alexander committed to putting on tefillin every day. "The idea is that you put it on every day to connect your heart and your mind to God," Shain said. "He did it with his whole heart." (www.cbsnews.com, 9-29-25)

More About Edan

Freed hostage Edan Alexander from Tenafly, New Jersey, announced that after 584 days in Hamas captivity he plans to return to serve in the Israel Defense Forces (IDF). "...I will once again put on the IDF uniform, and I will proudly serve alongside my brothers," he said at a Friends of the Israel Defense Forces (FIDF) gala event in September. My story does not end with survival – it continues with service." (His appearance at the gala comes

amid turmoil of the fundraising group with recent allegations of "internal financial mismanagement, cronyism and a toxic workplace culture." Two top leaders of the FIDF recently resigned which claims it has raised \$306 million to support Israeli soldiers since October 7th, 2023.)

At least one other Israeli soldier taken hostage on that day has returned to service. Ori Megidish, who was rescued by Israeli forces three weeks after her abduction, rejoined the military and was assigned to an intelligence unit. (www.forward.com, 9-19-25)

Turning Dreams into Reality

A team of researchers from Tel Aviv University (TAU) has achieved a global breakthrough: the development of a human engineered spinal cord from stem cells, which may restore the ability for paralyzed individuals to be able to walk again. Following remarkable success in animal trials where over 80 percent regained the ability to walk, the Israeli Ministry of Health has approved moving on to human trials. Within about a year, the first Israeli patient is expected to undergo this historic and extraordinary surgery.

Behind the breakthrough is Professor Tal Dvir and his team, who developed pioneering technology based on the patient's own cells, ensuring the body will not reject the implant, envisioning a three-dimensional spinal cord tissue implant allowing electrical signals to flow again through the body. "We decided that the first patient will be Israeli because we believe in our medical system and in Israeli capabilities," Professor Dvir said.

The achievement reflects Israel's unique ability of a small country with great scientists, offering hope to thousands of paralyzed people in Israel and around the world showing how the Israeli spirit knows how to push the boundaries of science. (www.instagram.com/israelgood_newsonly, 8-25-25)

An Important Victory

Canadian director Barry Avrich's "The Road Between Us: The Ultimate Rescue," has won the People's Choice Documentary Award at the Toronto International Film Festival (TIFF) after much controversy. The film is a riveting account of one family's fight for survival during the October 7th, 2023 terrorist attack on Israel by Hamas. The film follows retired Israeli general Noam Tibon as he races across his country under siege to rescue his son, journalist Amir Tibon, and his family from

terrorists who infiltrated their home in Kibbutz Nahal Oz near the Gaza border. Avrich used interviews with both men, a walk-through of the places Noam visited, dashcam and Israeli army footage, as well as bodycam video live streamed by Hamas "with a raw urgency of a survival film," the TIFF wrote in a press release.

Originally, TIFF organizers pulled the documentary from the schedule in August, citing "failure to meet legal clearance for all footage." That call was swiftly met with backlash from Canadian politicians and a consortium of Hollywood celebrities - including Amy Schumer, Howie Mandel, Debra Messing and Mayim Bialik - who wrote a letter condemning the move. The letter claimed that the attempt to silence Israeli and Jewish creativity is becoming too common since the Hamas attack. "The deliberate effort to marginalize and silence Jewish voices in the arts worldwide is intolerable, and it cannot be allowed to persist," the letter read.

Soon after, TIFF reinstated the film and CEO Cameron Bailey apologized. He did so again at the sold-out premier in Toronto. "I want to apologize, especially to the Jewish community, for mistakes I made in the lead-up to this day. In an environment of rising antisemitism, I want to apologize."

Avrich said he was humbled and overwhelmed by the premiere audience response. "And to now win the TIFF People's Choice Award validates our mission to make films for audiences and let them alone decide how they want to interpret the story, after they have actually seen the film." Avrich said he hopes schools and community organizations, regardless of their faith, see the film. "It's a story of family...there's a universal message..." (www. msn.com, 9-16-25)

In Memoriam

-Aron Bell, Holocaust survivor and last of the Bielski brothers whose brigade saved over 1,200 Jews from the Nazis, died in September. He was 98. Bell, who changed his name from Aron Bielski, was born in Stankiewicze – part of present-day Belarus – and was the youngest of ten brothers and two sisters. In 1941, when the German army arrived in Stankiewicze, the town's Jews were imprisoned in the Novogrudok ghetto. Two of Aron's siblings were murdered in the village, and his parents were killed in a mass killing there in December 1941. The older Bielski brothers – Asael, Tuvia and Alexander (known as "Zus"), escaped to the nearby forest and Aron joined

them. Together, they formed the Bielski Brigade, one of the largest rescue efforts of Jews during the Holocaust providing refuge for more than 1,200 Jews. "If you were in the company of those three brothers, you felt like you had a whole army behind you, you were fearless," Bell said in his 1996 testimony to Steven Spielberg's USC Shoah Foundation.

In the forest settlement, the group established workshops, a bakery, a school and a hospital. Aron was only eleven or twelve at the time, but he played a key role in sneaking into the nearby ghetto to encourage fellow Jews to escape. "It is Aron who brings life into the community. He finds other survivors and introduces them to our district," Aron's brother Tuvia wrote in his diary.

Following the war, Bell immigrated to British Mandate Palestine and served in the army during Israel's War of Independence in 1948. In 1954, he moved to the United States where he married his first wife, Judith, with whom he had three children. He spent decades living in Palm Beach, Florida and frequently spoke to school children about his experience during the Holocaust. He wrote two books – "Forest Scout: Reminiscences" and "Between Hitler and Stalin."

In 2007, Bell and his second wife, Henryka, were charged with exploitation of the elderly, theft, and scheming to defraud after they convinced a 93 year-old Catholic Holocaust survivor to give them power of attorney and began withdrawing her money. The charges were dropped a year later after the couple agreed to repay the woman \$260,000 in stolen funds.

Aron Bell was the last surviving brother of the brigade. The brothers' story of defiance inspired several book adaptations of their story and one of them, Nechama Tec's tale "Defiance: The Bielski Partisans" was made into the 2008 film "Defiance" with actor George MacKay playing Aron Bell. 

## From the Committee for Israel About Leket Israel: Let All Who Are Hungry Come Now and Eat

eket serves as a major food bank for Israel. Its name means "gleanings." It seeks to rescue food which would otherwise be discarded and serve it to those at risk of hunger. Our Torah commands farmers to let the poor gather - glean -- from the corners of their crops and anything that falls to the ground during the harvest. Think of Ruth gathering food from the fields of Boaz, whom we know by the way that she married and who together were ancestors of David, In the words of our Passover Haggadah, we call all who are hungry to come and eat. During the High Holidays we bring food for the local food bank. Imagine now a food bank that feeds 415,000 people through the help of 95,000 volunteers supported by a staff of 160. Families, children and seniors at senior centers or homes, who would otherwise go hungry do not because of these "gleanings." An estimated 2.6 million tons of quality food were discarded in 2023 and early 2024; it is estimated that half of this food could have been served to people in need. Leket secures surplus food or food that would have been discarded and delivers it to 300 different nonprofits for distribution. Through their partners they coordinate the distribution of nutritious food as well as the preparation of healthy meals. In addition, they offer Nutrition Education Workshops.

Leket, based in Ra'anana in central Israel, began in 2003 as Table to Table, through the motivation, imagination, and efforts of Joseph Gitler, who moved from California to Israel in 2000. It has sponsorships from over 100 organizations including Mastercard, El Al, Samsung, Israel Discount Bank, Chevron, McDonalds, Perrigo (generic drug manufacturer), Microsoft, and Intel. With support from both companies and people around the world, it has branches in at least three countries, with Leket USA, Leket UK, and Leket Canada. In addition, it has a 4-star rating from Charity Navigator. While I can not confirm it, I seem to recall that it also has a relationship with Federation.

The need for Leket and organizations like it persists; hunger always needs to be addressed. Meeting this need is in harmony with our heritage to feed the hungry, help the poor (hopefully to become self-sufficient), to improve or to heal the world around us. Food, medical advancement, and philanthropy are central to who we are. The "gleanings" of Leket fulfill a most basic part of the mission of our heritage. Hopefully it will one day not be needed, but as the day seems far in the future, there is Leket to give sustenance to those who would otherwise go hungry.



### HIDDEN IN THE CANDLES OF CHANUKAH: SHORT DAYS' JOURNEY INTO LIGHT

s an avocational ethnologist, I studied world religions for years. As a practicing, enthusiastic Jew I look for answers to life's big questions in my own tribal heritage. Every early religion found powerful teachings and created ceremonies of hope. appeasement, and gratitude in the time of shortest, darkest days. How could life go on if the sun did not return to warm the earth. I have read words from contemporary rabbis linking Chanukah to winter solstice, saying that in our earliest days, sacrifices were made for eight days both before and after the shortest day of the year. Whether we are talking about bonfires or candles, it is all about light (and not just the oil or the latkas).

"Light " is a big concept. As an artist I am in love with light and the act of creation. Light against dark is what makes a painting come alive. My father, whose personal light went out 20 years ago on the eighth day of Chanukah, gifted me with light through his name. "Av" is the Hebrew word for father and "ner" means both candle and light. Every synagogue in the world has its ner tamid, or everlasting light.

The light of "viddishkeit" nearly went out when our Temple was desecrated by the Greeks of Ahashverosh's time, 2100 years



ago. Their primary goal was to assimilate if not annihilate us. Laws were passed making Torah study illegal. Disobedience was punishable by death. When the unlikely band of students warriors, the Maccabees, recaptured the temple, cleansed and restored it, they needed oil to re-dedicate it (the meaning of the word Chanukah) but to complete the dedication they needed an additional seven days in which to replace the consecrated oil that had been defiled by the Greeks. With only one "kosher" vial left, holding enough oil for just one day, they needed a miracle that would last the exact length of time of the creation.

We all know the historical events behind the "Great Miracle that Happened There." (Nes Gadol Hayah Sham). But where is the deeper meaning of the miracle? This is Judaism. There is always more.

Anyone who has ever prepared a Friday night "parshah" knows how many stories lie within each Torah portion and that within each story there are as many layers as we have time and energy to discover. It does not surprise me as I look for hidden meanings in the light of Chanukah, that I am thrown back to" B'reishit", the beginning, the creation of primordial light.

When Adam and Eve came into being in the Garden on the sixth day of creation. light stepped beyond its bounds. There were thirty-six hours of intense, limitless light says the teaching, and Adam could see from one end of the world to the other. Adam and Eve failed to do their mitzvot and were punished. The brilliant light that was visible for such a long uninterrupted time and distance was withdrawn, hidden away, saved for the righteous in the world to come. We weren't ready for it.

How does this primordial light relate to Chanukah? Let's count the candles. Not the

helper candles, or shamashim with which we light the candles, but the Chanukah candles themselves. One plus two plus three plus four plus five plus six plus seven plus eight

makes thirty-six. The twelfth century Kabbalist, Rabbi Eliezer of Worms, says that "the 36 candles on the menorah correspond to the 36 hours when Adam and Eve were bathed in The Primordial Light of creation." Today, as we kindle our lights in our own homes, he suggests we are calling forth a remembrance, if not a revelation, of that intense, now hidden light. The light was ours before the *mitzvot* were disobeyed.

The mysterious expansion of light came to Jews who were rededicating themselves and their temple to the practice of Judaism. They did not succumb to a culture that did not want them to worship their one God in their own way. What was really won was religious freedom. The myriad meanings of the number 36 could fill reams, and range from double "chai" (the Hebrew word for life) to equivalence of the names of God to the amount of years it took Jacob to transform himself on his journey to the number of righteous souls in every generation who keep alive that spark of primordial light. We talk about Chanukah as a minor holiday, and yet there is an understanding that when the messiah comes the only holidays that will still be celebrated will be Chanukah and Purim. The Sanhedrin declared it a holiday one year after the event and it has been observed with candle lighting ever since (though Hillel and Shammai did have their disagreement over whether to start

with one and go up to eight or start with eight and go down to one. Hillel's school won)

Rabbi Ozair puts it in terms of Earth school. We are here to learn, "training ourselves to reach higher levels of consciousness. The Chanukah lights serve as antennae for holiness, drawing down the energy of the 36. With every day of Chanukah that passes, the light gets stronger. We place our lit candles in the window as a beacon to all passersby to remind the world that darkness can indeed be dispelled, obscurity can be illuminated, and that it is God's Light which will prevail." Unafraid to be different, to be a minority, we put our lights and belief system on display, on the line.

In the dark of winter, we are encouraged to look within, reconnect with the light of creation by correcting behavior, observing *mitzvot*, rededicating our inner sanctuaries, and shining our light on all around us. It is not surprising that Chanukah is the favorite holiday of children and mystics. As we enjoy our traditional foods, chant our blessings, sing our songs and spin our dreidels, may we happily give and receive both presents and Presence. ♦
