I'd be remiss, if I didn't mention the great accomplishment related to those books. And that is what is affectionately known as TAGS, the girls school in honor and memory of his daughter.

It's such a worthy cause, that many of our members have traveled to Kenva to visit it, as well as donated support. It was also recognized by our Ambassador, and even Secretary of State.

Thinking back to the High Holidays, the ones he led were the best we've ever had. And though he's helped find a new leader, no one could ever take his place. Every year I looked forward to his wisdom, and his ability bring about many member opinions.

As time went on, although he remained our scholarly Rabbi, he became even more so, friend and family. I felt very comfortable around him, both in offering my thoughts. and in seeking his advice. He would answer in a simple way, that would provide both comfort and confidence.

I do not mind saying, I will miss the Aglers very much on both a religious and personal level. Thank you very much, Rabbi Agler. I wish you peace and happiness in San Diego. and with your many pursuits. Your humility and (teaching) contributions will never be forgotten. I hope you will visit in the future. >

## HOW CERTAIN CONTRIBUTIONS TO KJCC CAN INSTANTLY BECOME PERMANENT, LIVING MEMORIALS

Yahrzeit Plaques: KJCC has six special, Israeli-made boards in the sanctuary for yahrzeit memorial plaques. Each plaque is accompanied by its own light, which is switched on for both yahrzeit dates and on Yom Kippur; names are also read aloud in memory from the bimah each yahrzeit and are published annually in our Yizkor Book. The cost for eternal synagogue memory is \$400.

**Tree of Life Leaves:** We have three beautiful, six-foot Trees of Life - the world's most enduring spiritual metaphor - adorning the wall at the rear of the KJCC sanctuary. For \$75 an individual golden leaf can be engraved with your message of memory or love. An example: "To our grand-children: May they always be in the presence of the Eternal Light."

**Garden Bricks:** \$125 buys a single brick and \$200 a double brick in our magnificent Meditation Garden walkway, engraved with your personal message. An example: "You were the best, Aunt Goldie. Well, you and those amazing cheese blintzes." For \$300 we will plant the native tree of your choice as the ultimate tribute, with an outdoor plaque included in the price.

### **Another Target for the Censors?**

Art Spiegelman, whose graphic novel about the Holocaustwon the Pulitzer Prize in 1992, is now working on one about the war in Gaza. (For those of us who were once ten years old, graphic novels are what we called comic books.)

You might remember a previous World Jewish Report entry when Spiegelman's iconic Holocaust novel for young adults, "Maus," was targeted by several conservative groups who worked to pulled it from school libraries, citing the book's eight curse words and a drawing of a naked mouse, with Spiegelman saying the efforts to ban his book is "a real warning sign of a country that's yearning for a return of authoritarianism." (In the book, the lews are depicted as mice and the Nazis as cats. It recounts the experience of his father, a Polish lew, in a concentration camp.). Spiegelman, 76, knows his new book on the Gaza war will generate controversy. "I've never had a bigger wrestling match inside my head," he said recently. "My superego says, 'You must do this if you're going to live with yourself,' and my id says, 'Who wants the grief [of] being canceled by everyone on the planet?"

Spiegelman has not offered details about the new book other than he plans to collaborate with Joe Sacco, a fellow graphic novelist who has previously written about the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

"Maus" is the only graphic novel ever to be awarded a Pulitzer Prize and has been translated into dozens of languages. It's how millions of young people first encounter the horrors of the Holocaust. And the 2025 "Jewish Nobel Prize" goes to... Argentina's President, Javier Milei. The Genesis Prize Foundation (commonly referred to as the "Jewish Nobel Prize") announced in January that Milei- who is not Jewish - will be the recipient of the prize, the first head of state to receive the

prestigious award.

Milei was the unanimous choice of nine judges on the committee. He was awarded the prize because of his "unequivocal support of Israel during one of the most difficult times since the founding of the lewish State. President Milei recently announced his decision to move the Argentinian Embassy to Jerusalem, deepening Argentina's alliance with Israel. In addition, he has reversed years of anti-Israel votes by Argentina in the United Nations, and has pledged to bring those responsible for the AMIA (1992) and Israeli Embassy bombings(1994) in Argentina to justice. (AMIA, Spanish acronym for Argentine Israelite Mutual Association) was a Jewish Community Centre. A van filled with bombs was driven into the AMIA building and detonated, killing 85 people and injuring over 300. To date, the bombing remains the deadliest terrorist attack in Argentine history. In 1994, Argentina was home to a Jewish community of 200,000, making it the largest in Latin America and the sixth-largest in the world outside of Israel.

"President Milei is a true hero of the Jewish people," said Stan Polovets, co-founder and Chairman of the Genesis Prize Foundation. "Unlike leaders of many other countries, Milei has unconditionally backed the Jewish people and their state. This award expresses appreciation of the State of Israel and the gratitude of the people of Israel toward the president and the people of Argentina."

Upon accepting the honor, Melei said, "I am deeply honored to receive the Genesis Prize. I will give the monetary prize to causes that support freedom and the fight against antisemitism, whether in Argentina or worldwide."

Milei recently learned he has Jewish roots through his grandfather and has become more open about his Jewish identity. He studies Torah, attends prayer services, and has vowed to convert after he leaves office.

The Genesis Prize is an annual award of \$1 million honoring exceptional individuals for their professional accomplishments, contributions to humanity, and support of Israel. ### Happy Birthday, Rose!

Rose Girone celebrated her 113th birthday on January 13th, 2025. According to The Claims Conference, she is believed to be the oldest living Holocaust survivor. Born in Poland, she escaped Nazi Germany with her then-husband and only child, fleeing to Shanghai, China, before moving to the United States in 1947. Shanghai opened its doors to 20,000 Jewish refugees during World War II.

Rose opened two knitting stores in Queens when she and her family arrived in New York. She continued knitting up until her 102nd birthday. (www.fox5ny.com, 1-23-25)

### Really???

Google Calendar has removed International Holocaust Remembrance Day (January 27th) and Jewish American Heritage Month (May) from its default display in the United States, part of a wider removal of cultural and ethnic observances from the app. Companies across the U.S. are rolling back a range of diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) measures following the Trump administration's directives against DEI. But Google told tech news outlets that the changes to the calendar go back to mid-2024 and are due to workload and not government policy. Google further stated, "Some years ago, the Calendar team started manually adding a broader set of cultural moments in a wide number of countries around the world. We got feedback that some other events and countries were missing - and maintaining hundreds of moments manually and consistently globally wasn't scalable or sustainable." In addition to the two Jewish calendar observances, Black History Month and Pride Month will also no longer be listed. Due to the crackdown on DEI, some official commemorations of International Holocaust Remembrance Day have been cancelled. These changes to Google Calendar came the very same week when Google Maps changed the name of the Gulf of Mexico to the Gulf of America. (www.jta. org. 2-12-25)

#### In Memoriam

We continue to mourn the brave Israeli soldiers and members of security forces who have died al kiddush hashem, a term which has many applications, one of them being a Jew who gives his life to save his people. Amid the ongoing war which began on October 7 with the Hamas terror group's onslaught in southern Israel, approximately 891 soldiers (including members of security forces) have been killed. Zichronom l'vracha (May their memories be for a blessing.) We continue to pray for the wounded, both in body and in spirit.

-Marion Wiesel, wife of Nobel Laureate, Holocaust survivor and renowned author Elie Wiesel, died at the beginning of February. She was 94. Her passing was announced by the Elie Wiesel Foundation for Humanity, founded with the money he received from his 1986 Nobel Prize.

Marion translated fourteen of her husband's books from French to English saying she was most proud of her 2006 translation of "Night," perhaps Elie's most well-known book which came out in 1960 before they were married and according to the New York Times, was translated at that time by Stella Rodway. Marion also wrote and narrated "Children of the Night," a documentary film about children murdered during the Holocaust. She also produced many TV programs.

Born Mary Renate Erster in Vienna, her family escaped when the Nazis took over. They fled to various places in Europe and eventually, thanks to a relative who had Swiss citizenship, they managed to smuggle themselves to Switzerland in 1942. Seven years later, they arrived in New York. Married once before, she married Elie in 1969.

Marion is credited with helping raise her husband's stature. Upon learning of her death, Israeli Ambassador to the United Nations Danny Danon said, "I am deeply saddened by the passing of Marion Wiesel. Her presence at the UN's International Holocaust Remembrance Ceremony each year was a testament to her unwavering commitment to memory and truth...May her memory be a blessing." Elie Wiesel passed away in 2016. (www.thejc.com, 2-3-25)

-Jacqueline van Maarsen, known to be Anne Frank's best friend, died in mid-February. She was 96. In June of 1942, just a few days after receiving a diary for her 13th birthday, Anne Frank wrote that a classmate she had only recently met "is now my best friend." That friend was Jacqueline van

Maarsen. They had promised to write each other letters of goodbye in the event that they would be forcibly separated which came to pass just weeks later. The Frank family went into hiding in Amsterdam in July. Anne wrote van Maarsen her farewell letter in the diary in September, stating that, "until we see each other again, we will always remain 'best' friends." We know of course, that meeting never occurred. Anne was murdered in 1945.

Van Maarsen was the daughter of a Jewish father and a mother who was raised Christian but converted to Judaism. In 1942, her mother managed to get her and her sister declared as non-Jews, enabling them to survive the war. Most of her father's family did not survive.

In 1986, van Maarsen began lecturing on the Holocaust and writing about her friendship with Anne. She stayed in touch with Anne's father Otto, and with the Anne Frank House in Amsterdam. In 2020, van Maarsen laid the first stone of a Holocaust monument in Amsterdam. (www.jta.org, 2-14-25)

-Peter Yarrow, one of the trio 1960s folk music group Peter, Paul and Mary, died in early January at the age of 86. A Cornell graduate, Yarrow was playing in Greenwich Village clubs during the early 60s folk revival when musical impresario Albert Grossman – who also steered Bob Dylan's career – suggested he team up with singer Mary Travers. Travers in turn proposed they reach out to Paul Stookey. The trio went on to record several hits, some of their own "Lemon Tree" and "500 Miles") and compositions by others including Pete Seeger ("If I Had a Hammer," and Dylan's "Blowin' in the Wind." Their debut album, "Peter, Paul and Mary," reached Billboard magazine's Top Ten for ten months.

In 1970, Yarrow served three months in prison for taking "improper liberties" with a 14-year-old girl who came to his Washington, D.C., hotel room for an autograph. In 1981, he was granted a presidential pardon by Jimmy Carter on the last day of his presidency. Yarrow apologized for the incident, saying that "it was an era of real indiscretion and mistakes by categorically male performers. I was one of them. I got nailed. I was wrong. I'm sorry for it."

Occasionally, the conviction led to cancellations of concerts where he was scheduled to appear.

After the folk revival faded, the group continued to perform on a regular basis. In a 1982 concert at Carnegie Hall, they sang "Light One Candle" for

the first time, Yarrow's song celebrating Chanukah. He said he wrote the song to express his opposition to Israel's war that year in Lebanon (the trio performed it the following year in Jerusalem to a large and enthusiastic audience.) Yarrow was a supporter of the Israeli left-wing group Peace Now, which advocated for a two-state solution to the Israeli- Palestinian conflict.

Peter Yarrow was born in New York City. His mother was a high school teacher; his father, who emigrated from Ukraine at age 16, was a lawyer who helped create Radio Free Europe, a U.S. propaganda channel launched during the Cold War. His parents divorced when he was five. He had no contact with his father until he hit his mid-30s. He credits his mother with instilling progressive values in him.

Yarrow attended the Interlochen School of Music and Art, part of what is now LaGuardia High School. At Cornell, he majored in physics before switching to psychology. He married Mary Beth McCarthy, the niece of Eugene J. McCarthy, the Minnesota senator who ran for the Democratic nomination in 1968 on a platform opposing the Vietnam War.

Mary Travers died in 2009. Paul Stookey is 87. (www.forward.com, 1-7-25)

### Did You Know...

-According to a recent report published by the World Zionist Organization (WZO) and the Jewish Agency for Israel, 2024 was a peak year for anti-Semitism with a 340 percent increase in total anti-Semitic incidents worldwide compared to 2022. The report used 2022 as its benchmark because it was a relatively normal year, unlike 2023, when Hamas launched its horrific assault against Israel on October 7th. The report came a week after a survey by the Anti-Defamation Leagued found that "nearly half of all adults worldwide hold significant anti-Semitic views." (www.time-sofisrael.com, 1-22-25)

-According to Israel's Central Bureau of Statistics (CBS), in 2024 the population in Israel grew by 1.1 percent bringing the total population to 10 million. Of these, approximately 76.9 percent of them (7.707 million) are Jewish, 21.0 percent (2.104 million) are Arab and two percent (210,000) identify as "other." The CBS indicated that the "other" category includes non-Arab Christians and those not classified by religion in the state's registry. (www.jpost.com, 1-1-25) \rightarrow



## Where the Desert Blooms

u B'Shevat has come again: the New Year of the Trees. Israel honors its trees as part of the divine creation of the Garden of Eden and treasures them as givers of fruit and shade, whose roots hold together the earth over which we walk. Trees also provide for carbon dioxide absorption and oxygen release and, in the dry areas of the south, help prevent re-desertification. In fact, Israel is one of only a few countries which has more trees today than a hundred years ago. For this we may thank at least two visionaries and one vital organization.

### A Brief History of the Trees.

The growth from a few saplings to forty forests took a dream, a plan, an organization, and time. The first known to proclaim this dream, at the First Zionist Congress in Basil, Switzerland, was Dr. Zvi Hermann Schapira, in 1897. A decade earlier, he originated the "Blue Box", a tzedakah box to remind people to share their spare change with the cause of land for trees. Perhaps some of us remember the blue and

white rectangular box from

Hebrew school days.

Dr. Schapira's passing, Theodore Herzl promoted that goal at the Fifth Zionist Congress, and Kerem Kevemeth Lelsrael-Jewish National Fund (KKL-JNF) was founded. The first land purchase, 50 acres in Hadera, took place in 1903. In years to come, additional land was purchased for farms, schools, and kibbutzim, By 1921 the organization had 25,000 acres under its care. Recognizing the need for support from Jewish people in other countries, in 1926 the KKL-INF incorporated in the United States. Today it is responsible for approximately 13% of Israel's land. In each of the 40 forests, the types of trees planted depend upon the local climate and the soil.

### Where the Trees Grow.

In a country about the size of New Jersey, where do all these forests grow? The KKL-JNF divides its work among five administrative districts reflecting different

types of climates, ranging from the Mediterranean, with hot, dry summers and mild, wet

winters to the dry southern area. As to where the forests are: the Galilee in the north has 17 forests. The Central District has nine. There are eight forests in the Jerusalem District. The Southern District has three, and the Negev three. As an added bit of information, the coastal area of Israel receives approximately 20" of rainfall a year, while the southern are receives around 10". (Miami has about 55"). And yet, the largest forest, the Yatir, first planted in 1964, is in the Negev. Approximately one million trees grow there on 8,000 acres.

#### Water.

Different areas require different types of watering. Water management, including collection of run-off, varies by location. For example, a method called liman irrigation is used near the deserts; this depends on creating small dams to collect water and harvesting any run-off. There is a lot of technical information on the subject, and the references at the end of this article may be helpful to anyone wishing to find out more. The amazing fact is that for 122 years, Israeli foresters have found ways to deliver sufficient water to grow so many different trees across the different areas of Israel.

### Rebuilding Where Needed.

With the news bringing stories of more forest fires around the world (whatever the causes may be), and the acts of fire terrorism by enemy rockets and incendiary balloons, the need to care for Israel's forests has increased. In addition, KKL-

JNH is working to restore the agricultural areas near the border with Gaza, areas from which a significant amount of Israel's agricultural products come. The residents depend upon the land for their livelihood, and consumers depend upon the residents for the food that they produce.

#### What the Forests Offer the Public.

Forests are open to the public 24/7 and entry if free of charge. Depending upon each forest, people may enjoy hiking or bike trails, or just a place to relax and alleviate stress. There may be a program for at-risk youth or for young people with physical injuries. One survey reported that nearly 91% of city dwellers have taken advantage of what the forests offer. To maintain the forests and to prevent damaged areas from the possibility of being "repurposed," the KKL-JNF wants to continue to develop recreational and visitor facilities as well as the ongoing reforestation activities that have become urgent in recent years.

### A Suggested Top Ten.

If you're planning a trip to Israel and would like to visit one or more of the forests, a list of ten recommendations has been drawn up by Anat Gold, director of KKL-JNF's central region.\* In the article footnoted, you can find photos and sum-



maries of each of their main features:

- 1. Sataf (Jerusalem Hills, 1980's)
- 2. Jerusalem Forest (planted in 1956)
- 3. Hulda Forest (central Israel, first trees were olives, planted in 1904 in honor of Theodore Herzl)
- 4. Ben Shemen (central area, first planted in 1907)
- 5. Ilanot Forest (central Israel, dates to 1950's, a botanical garden)
- 6. Carmel Forest (Haifa; recovering from 2010 fire)
- 7. Haruvit (coastal)
- 8. Heruham Park (south)
- 9. Hatir Forest
- 10. Be'eri Forest (temporarily closed since 10.7.23)

#### So That We Remember.

It is our custom to plant trees to remember a person or an event. The planting of trees, the regeneration of forests, both symbolizes and reflects the resilience of the people of Israel. Last year at Tu B'Shevat, and together with families of the 364 victims of the Nova massacre, KKL-JNF planted hundreds of trees at the parking lot there. This is close to the Be'eri Forest and the kibbutz of the same name where brutal attacks took place. This year the planting of 2,000 trees was, as of this writing, planned in the Biriya Forest on the slopes of the northern Galilee two days before Tu B'Shevat. Thousands of people were expected to attend, including representatives of border communities, members and commanders of the IDF, pre-military academy cadets, and schoolchildren.

We speak of the "Tree of Life." The dedication of the people of Israel and the Jewish people to the trees in Israel is strong across many years. The re-dedication of the forests, to nurture the undamaged parts and regenerate those that have been harmed - to make them rise again from the earth like legendary phoenixes - is symbolic of the story of the Jewish people. We are determined, as Moses urged us, to "choose life". May the trees always bloom, may the gardens always grow. Am Yisrael Chai.



Forgiveness allows each of us to move forward in our lives in more positive and creative ways.



## Not All Trees Are **Created Equal**

u B'Shevat, known as the "New Year" of Trees," is the time in the Jewish tradition to honor the natural world and reflect on our role as caretakers of the Earth. This year, Tu B'Shevat falls on February 13. It's a common practice to plant a tree on Tu B'Shevat. Thanks to the Jewish National Fund, Israel was the only country in the world to enter the 21st century with more trees than it had when it entered the 20th century.

Trees are an essential part of a balanced ecosystem. They absorb carbon and emit oxygen, but not all trees are created equal. Mangroves are trees that grow in salt water, and are found in tropical and sub-tropical climates. Their exposed roots are a wonder to behold. More importantly, mangroves absorb 10 times more carbon than terrestrial trees and 5 times more carbon than the Amazon Rain Forest. They are a foundational component of the Blue Carbon ecosystem. Unfortunately, about 50% of global



mangroves have been lost in the last hundred years due to pollution, development and extreme weather.

To celebrate Tu B'Shevat and to raise awareness about these magnificent trees, Repair the Sea is partnering with WELL/ BEINGS to plant mangrove trees. For \$36 you can plant a mangrove, or for \$360 you can plant a whole thicket of mangroves. Every penny you donate for this project will go toward planting and maintaining these incredible trees.
