



### Webmaster Poet Emily Kraemer gives the next RCA Artist Talk





#### **Blackout Poetry**

Like most things in literature, blackout poetry—also known as erasure poetry, redacted poetry, and a form of found poetry—has a complex history. In fact, the earliest known blackout poetry examples hail from Benjamin Franklin's days. Ben's neighbor, Caleb Whiteford, would publish redacted versions of the paper, using puns flowing across the text to create new meaning in the pages.



## \$500 Cash Prize for RCA's Rodeo Poster Contest!

Artists buckle up and create your designs for a rodeo poster contest! The size of the poster is required to 24" x 36". Use any medium and any support you would like. Do not frame so that your work is camera-ready. Oriented vertically (meaning 36 inches tall and 24 inches wide), the artwork must leave room for rodeo information. Design your work so that these words have room to be very visible:

#### 142<sup>nd</sup> World's Oldest Continuous Rodeo August 14-17, 2025

At the bottom leave room for the presenters' titles with their logos.

#### **Presented by Rim Country Artists, Payson Pro Rodeo Committee**

The Pro Rodeo Committee will judge the competition. No RCA Board members may compete. After the winning artwork is selected, RCA will create the lettering in appropriate fonts, and work with a printing company to prepare the poster for printing. Both the Rodeo and RCA Boards will approve the poster before production. The Pro-Rodeo Committee will select the number of posters, pay for them, sell them, and retain all profits.

The winner and all other artists will be allowed to keep their original artwork. The winner will sign a contract that says he/she will never create posters from the winning entry, nor reproduce the art for sale. The artist may, however, sell the original. The Pro Rodeo Committee will keep all rights to the

poster itself, in perpetuity, as well as its reproduction and all profits from sales. There is a \$25 entry fee for competing artists and \$500 prize money for the winner.



# June 2025 Member Feature




Sue is originally from Ontario, California where her grandfather started a family ceramic tile business for custom homes, businesses and mosaic showroom floors. She had just finished working on several dam and tunnel projects where she met Joel, her future husband. Sue says fortunately, she escaped to Payson in 2003 and started a new life. She first worked for Roy Haught Excavation and then hired on with the Arizona Department of Transportation Payson Construction Office, where she retired in 2018.

Sue says she does not consider herself an artist, but enjoys working in many different mediums including glass, silver, beads, wine corks, and tumbled rocks but her favorite is using ceramic tile creating pieces that incorporate elements that relate to the individual's personality or history, i.e., antique typewriter keys for the recipients initials, naval insignia for WWII service, or even mementos from their travels.

Most of Sue's work is given as gifts for friends and family. Her tile material supply mainly comes from going through boxes of tile from the 50s, 60s & 70s when her father retired and sold a ceramic tile shop. She has put together three pallets of tile, granite, and glass tile sample sheets and moved them to Payson not knowing at the time what she would make with them.


She says she has hiked with the Payson Packers since 2018. They have explored many beautiful locations in Rim Country and she appreciates the excellent leaders who plan the hikes.

Sue really enjoys learning about the culture of Native American tribes in Arizona and has spent quite a bit of time on the Hopi and Navajo Nations.

# Juneteenth Celebration & a Snapshot of its Art

Juneteenth, officially Juneteenth National Independence Day, is a federal holiday in the United States. It is celebrated annually on June 19<sup>th</sup> to commemorate the ending of slavery in

the United States. The holiday's name blends the sound and meaning of the words "June" and "nineteenth", as it was on June 19, 1865 when Major General Gordon Granger ordered the final enforcement of the Emancipation Proclamation in Texas at the end of the American Civil War. In the Civil War period, slavery came to an end in various areas of the United States at different times. Many enslaved Southerners escaped, demanded wages, stopped work, or took up arms against the Confederacy of slave states. In January 1865, Congress finally proposed the Thirteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution for national abolition of slavery.



The holiday is considered the "longest-running African-American holiday" and has been called "America's second Independence Day." Although Juneteenth falls on June 19<sup>th</sup> it is often celebrated on the third Saturday in June. Historian Mitch Kachun considers that celebrations of the end of slavery have three goals: "to celebrate, to educate, and to agitate."

It's often associated with a keen sensitivity to sensory details, a strong imaginative capacity, and the ability to solve problems through creative means. Essentially, a mindset allows individuals to connect with their inner world and translate it into external forms of expression. Key characteristics of an artistic mind include:

#### Sensitivity to sensory details:

 Individuals with an artistic mind are often keenly aware of colors, shapes, sounds, and feelings, and can use these details to inspire their work.

#### Imagination and creativity:

They possess a strong ability to visualize and create new ideas, often drawing upon their own experiences and emotional responses.

#### Problem-solving through creation:

• Instead of relying solely on logical or analytical methods, they may find that creating something new is a natural way to approach challenges.

#### Emotional expression:

 Artistic individuals frequently use their work as a means of expressing emotions and connecting with others on a deeper level.

#### Positive approach to feedback:

They are generally open to constructive criticism and view it as an opportunity for growth and refinement.

#### Independence and intuition:

- They often rely on their own instincts and may prefer to work autonomously, following their own unique vision.
- The artistic mind can manifest in various forms:
  - Visual arts: Painting, drawing, sculpture, photography, and other forms of visual expression.
  - **▶ Performing arts:** Music, dance, theatre, and other forms of live performance.
  - **Literary arts:** Writing, poetry, storytelling, and other forms of written expression.
  - **Design and architecture:** Creating functional and aesthetically pleasing environments and objects.
