Paulette had to prove she was Navajo and took a DNA test to show she was worthy of portraying her character. She is 50% Navajo and 35% Basque. Paulette was born and raised in Los Angeles. She married Greg Horton in 1987 and moved to Diamond Bar in 1988. Both Greg





#### DIAMOND BAR COMMUNITY FOUNDATION GRANT AGREEMENT FORM

The purpose of the Diamond Bar Community Foundation is to preserve, protect and enhance the quality of life for residents of Diamond Bar by establishing or funding programs that address the cultural, recreational and social needs of this community.

In this effort, the Diamond Bar Foundation will award grants to non-profit organizations, public schools and libraries that serve the community of Diamond Bar and focus on the cultural, recreational or social needs of the community. Grant amounts will vary with the maximum award being no more than \$1,000. Grants are not awarded to individuals, or for political lobbying, political campaign or voter registration purposes.

Please ensure you submit your application at least 2 months in advance of your event so the Committee and Foundation have sufficient time to review and respond.

The grant applicant must complete the attached application and state the case for the request, including a description of the project, the dollar amount requested, the population served, the desired outcome and its relationship to the City of Diamond Bar.

If a grant is awarded, the Diamond Bar Community Foundation Treasurer will mail a check equal to the amount of the award within 30 days of the postmarked notification letter. If the grant request is denied, the applicant will receive a notice of denial which will include a brief statement identifying the reason for denial.

By signing this form, you acknowledge that you are aware of the guidelines of the Diamond Bar Community Foundation as listed above. You also understand that to remain eligible for the grant you will comply with the following terms:

- 1. To be considered, application must be submitted 2 months in advance.
- 2. If a grant is awarded, the dollars will be used as stated in the grant application.
- 3. If the project/program is delayed, the organization will be responsible for submitting a status report until the project or program is complete.
- 4. The Grant will be awarded to the project or program organization listed on the grant application.



# Cal Poly Pomona Named a Top Producing Institution of Fulbright U.S. Scholars

al Poly Pomona has been recognized as a 2023-24 U.S. Fulbright Scholar Top Producing Institution for STEM Fields and a Top Producing Institution of U.S. Fulbright Scholars among master's-granting universities, with the special distinction of having the highest number of U.S. Scholars in this classification this academic year.



The Fulbright U.S. Scholars program is an international academic exchange of scholars and professionals founded to increase mutual understanding and to support friendly relations between people from the United States and other countries. It is administered by the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs.

Cal Poly Pomona's four current U.S. Fulbright Scholars and their host institutions are:

- Mechanical Engineering Professor Yong Xue Gan -University of Regina (Canada). Mr. Gan is a Diamond Bar resident. His research/expertise is sustainability in the fields of clean-energy generation and wastewater purification.
- · Accounting Associate Professor Mohamed Gomaa -Egypt-Japan University of Science and Technology (Egypt)
- Mathematics and Statistics Professor Ioana Mihaila -Universitas Negeri Yogyakarta (Indonesia)
- · Chemical and Materials Engineering Associate Professor Huseyin Ucar - Mohamed Bin Zayed University of Artificial Intelligence (United Arab Emirates)


"Our Fulbright Scholars champion a unified world, and Cal Poly Pomona is proud to help make their dreams a reality," said President Sorava M. Coley. "These faculty members bring more compassion and understanding into our lives. There's is no better way to unite people than through this kind of work."

Gan, Gomaa, Mihaila and Ucar are all first-time U.S. Fulbright Scholars. Their projects span the fields of clean-energy generation and wastewater purification; the application of experimental psychology in negotiation strategy; mathematics education; and the design and discovery of magnetic materials with biomedical applications in cancer therapy.

"My classrooms will certainly be more enriching thanks to my immersion in a new cultural context, and to establishing a stronger network of professionals from around the world," Ucar said. "I will be able to leverage these connections to enrich my teaching materials, develop new curricula, and facilitate exchanges, thereby enhancing the global dimension of my classrooms."

Forty-four Cal Poly Pomona faculty have participated in the scholar exchange program since the 1953-54 academic year, and the university has hosted 14 visiting Fulbright faculty from Europe, Asia, Africa and South America.

The 2023-24 Top Producing U.S. Colleges and Universities of Fulbright Students and Scholars list honored 52 institutions across five categories: doctoral; masters; baccalaureate; associates; and special topics with subcategories of STEM fields, visual and performing arts, education, and medical and health sciences.

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## Students Dish Up Delicious Food & Bakery Items in New Culinary Program at DBHS

or over five years, Diamond Bar High explored the idea of adding a Culinary Science class to the Career Technical Education (CTE) program. The opening of the school's new Science building last year provided an opportunity to secure and redesign an appropriate classroom to host such a program. The Culinary Science program boasts a traditional classroom for learning with adjacent lab where students can spread out during cooking activities.

"It has been an exhilarating experience to create and implement a brand-new culinary program and the students have been so much fun to work with! Diamond Bar High School teacher Marcy Hail exclaimed. I'm looking forward to designing more projects for the students in this course, and we will finish up with a food truck competition for our final," she said.

Ms Hail likes to have students learn how to design events along with everything that

goes with it. She was a wedding planner before she became a home economics teacher, taking over the class when her mother retired. "I taught in the exact same classroom!" Now, in her first year as a Brahma, Hail teaches five periods with about 180 teen chefs.

On a recent day in the class, student teams raced to decorate three-tier cakes that would be unveiled and judged during Open House. The four-day

assignment included designing the sweet confection offerings on posters, sculpting bases from Rice Krispies or Styrofoam, and finally making the cakes come to life. For the cake decorating assignment, Hail had students think of themselves as working in a bakery with clients coming in to place an order. "They have to make their cake look like the poster which is the hardest part," she explained. "They're not winging it!"

All hands were on deck, as the teens tinted, kneaded, and rolled out the fondant "frosting" before applying finishing decorations.

"I like the creative part of this class," shared junior Michelle Grenados while learning how to pipe icing between the cake layers. "This is an early morning class and I'm always excited to eat what we make. My favorite were the crepes!" added junior Nick Madrigal. The pair were crafting a safari golden anniversary cake for the competition.

At another cooking station, a team was building a red and black Venom Spiderman cake. "We wish the red (fondant) was darker," said senior Amad Jazzar showing

the reference photo on his cell phone. "It's pretty good for our very first cake!"

Meanwhile, junior Dara Quezada was carefully applying gray fondant on a Snow White-themed cake. "We're thinking of putting some rock candy (made in class) inside for the mine," she said. Another layer would be covered in blue fondant with a bow to represent Snow White and topped with a red apple. "It's a work in progress!" she said.

"I came into this class to learn the basics which I have accomplished, thankfully," shared junior Chris Phillips whose group was creating a Minecraft cake. "My dad and my mom cook so I want to help out."

DBHS staff are excited to see students developing tangible skills that not only prepare them for careers in the culinary and hospitality sectors, but also allow them to feel confident in navigating their own kitchens.

So far this year, students have done everything from caviar-tasting, sushi-rolling, Twinkie teambuilding, and more.

Northbound SR-57 connector bridge widening over Golden Springs Drive














### Diamond Bar Woman's Club
