
Marissa has been called up to the US National Women's Beach Soccer team

rarch is a dedicated month to reflect ■ On the often-overlooked contributions of women to U.S. history. From Abigail Adams to Susan B. Anthony, Sojourner Truth to Rosa Parks, women have been part of our history in the United States.

Women's History Month grew out of a weeklong celebration of women's contributions to culture, history and society organized by the school district of Sonoma, California in 1978. Presentations were given at dozens of schools, hundreds of students participated in a "Real Woman" essay contest and a parade was held in downtown Santa Rosa.

A few years later, the idea caught on within communities, school districts and organizations across the country. In 1980, President Jimmy Carter issued the first presidential proclamation declaring the week of March 8 as National Women's History Week. The U.S. Congress followed suit the next year, passing a resolution establishing a national celebration. Six years later, the National Women's History Project successfully petitioned Congress to expand the event to the entire month of March.


Golfing Fore the Kids

Raising Emotionally Healthy Children

From the day a baby is born, parents want their child to be healthy and focus primarily on their physical health. Often overlooked is our children's emotional health. As parents in to-day's culture, we center our daily lives around our kids but often we are distracted from what's most important: how our children feel. While we focus on day-to-day activities, sometimes we may not realize that our kids are hurting.

Being aware of the following can help raise emotionally healthy children.

- 1. Don't ignore signs that your child is struggling. Be aware of behavioral changes that could indicate a child is struggling. If a teacher tells us our child has had trouble getting along with other kids in class, we shouldn't just shrug it off. It is often an indication something is bothering your child. What may start off as small behavioral patterns can expand to more concerning behavior if not addressed.
- 2. Don't trivialize how your child is feeling. When we notice an emotional change in our children, it's important to try to understand what specifically is impacting them. When we let our children know we are interested and concerned about their specific struggle, it encourages them to open up about the what is causing their difficulty. By being open and nonjudgmental, we encourage our kids to be honest and open. When they do share, it is important to react with both compassion and strength.
- 3. Be sensitive not reactive. From the moment our children begin to talk, it's essential to encourage our kids to talk to us. Your reaction to what they tell you will affect their openness to share. If we invite our children to talk to us honestly and then we are defensive or erratic in our response, we give them very good reason not to tell us what's really going on in their lives. As parents, we should do our best not to react defensively to our children or try to talk them out of their reality.
- 4. Invite them to spend time with you. When it comes to spending time with our kids, quality is much more important than quantity. Make time to engage in activities your children choose. Give them your uninterrupted attention.

Parents who take the time to sit with their young children, while they play with dolls or action figures, are often surprised to hear Barbie saying the very things that Mommy does or Spiderman acting in ways that Daddy does.

- 5. If they won't talk to you, help them find a someone they trust. Many parents wonder what to do when their kids will not open up to them. This is especially true of parents with teenage children. Letting our kids know they can also talk to someone besides us can help secure their trust in us and will encourage them to deal with whatever they are feeling with a trusted family member or friend.
- 6. If they are in real trouble, get them the help they need. If a child shows an unusual amount of anxiety, fear, anger, stress or pain, it is important to get the help they need. As parents, we must not be too prideful when it comes to raising our kids. The best thing we can do for our children is to be selfless in our commitment to meeting their emotional needs.
- 7. Take care of your emotional health. Taking care of our own mental health is a key factor in helping our kids feel happy. Although it's important to prioritize our kids' needs, it's equally important to remember our emotions affect them, too. Children are naturally very aware of their parents' moods. Pretending or denying our frustrations will still impact them.

What's New in Public Safety

n November 5, 2024, voters in California overwhelmingly approved Proposition 36. The initiative was a bundle of new laws to address retail theft, drug addiction and homelessness. Here's a brief description of how Proposition 36 and other newly passed laws work to reduce retail theft.

Crimes can be punished in two ways: as a felony for a serious crime, and as a misdemeanor for a less serious crime. Under Proposition 36, some crimes that were classified as misdemeanors are now felonies. For example, since 2014 and the passage of Proposition 47, it was a misdemeanor if a person stole items worth less than \$950. Now, that crime could be a felony if the person already has two or more felony convictions for crimes such as shoplifting, burglary, or carjacking.

Proposition 36 lengthens some felony sentences. Thefts committed by groups of three or more individuals working together, such as "smash and grabs" that are seen on retail security videos, can now be sentenced up to an additional three years.



Other laws were passed that held thieves accountable: officers can now arrest a person for shoplifting based on probable cause (such as a video). Also, persons arrested for "smash and grab" thefts can no longer be released by signing a promise to appear in court.

Also, if a person stole property from different victims or in different counties, the value of thefts can be added together to reach the felony grand theft threshold of \$950. If a person was in possession of more than \$950 worth of stolen property, they could be charged with a felony if they intended to re-sell, exchange or return the merchandise to the store. In the serious case where the stolen property was worth more than \$50,000 (think about a car, for example), the sentence could be further lengthened from one to five years, depending on the value of the stolen property.

Now, there is a measure of protection for businesses and employees: a court can issue a restraining order against a person who has been convicted of theft, shoplifting, vandalism, or assault and battery of an employee. The restrained person must stay away from the business for up to two years.

In the next installment, we will talk about Proposition 36 and other laws concerning auto burglaries, drug addiction and homelessness.






This year, Diamond Bar's very own Vera Kwan (6th grade) and Evelyn
