





























Advertiser Spotlight: Ty Wallace

Tello residents of Diamond Bar. Let me introduce I myself and give a brief history of my ties with this great City of Diamond Bar. I was born in 1964 and grew up in Diamond Bar since day one. My parents purchased a brand new home in "The Heritage" tract in 1963. My home was five doors down from the location of the future Diamond Bar High School, on Birch Hill Drive. As kids, my brothers and friends rode our bikes or walked to the future school site, which was a large hill, covered in wild oak trees, with a view from the plateau. We made underground forts, shot BB guns, caught lizards and horny toads.

Growing up, we would go to the creek along Diamond Bar Boulevard at the base of "The Country Estates" which was just starting to develop in the late 60's. We played with crawdads and minnows. There were no traffic signals in the early 1960's when Diamond Bar was unincorporated. Alpha Beta once sat where H- Mart is,

along with a Thrifty Drug Store with 3 scoop ice cream cones for 25 cents a scoop. In 1976 Chaparral Middle school opened when I became a 6th grader. In the mid to late 70's to early 80's, I delivered the Progress Bulletin newspaper, painted addresses on curbs, and mowed neighbor's lawns, socking away the money to buy my first car, a 1973 El Camino. I have a passion for cars to this day with Corvettes, Chevelles, Impalas, and trucks I've collected.





In 1980 Safeway Market opened (now the Walmart grocery) and I was an inaugural employee. My first real job. In the mid to late 70's on the corner of Diamond Bar Boulevard and Grand Avenue before that area was developed, I launched Estes rockets with no worry of hitting any buildings since the land was vacant and wide open. In 1983 I graduated from Walnut High School. I missed Diamond Bar High by one year. The district didn't want to separate

> the senior class, so I remained at Walnut High. I attended Cal Poly Pomona, still living at home, and graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Finance, Real Estate, and Law in 1989.

> Later that year I became a realtor with an office at Coldwell Banker Tri Counties, near the intersection of Diamond Bar Boulevard and Grand. I have been at the same location, serving Diamond Bar and surrounding communities for 35 years. I have fond memories of Diamond Bar and am grateful for a wonderful childhood. It is a prized city to live in and I know why firsthand!



Growing Support for Diamond Bar High School's Environmental Science Project

ringing FreeFreshCo's vision into re-Dality, our AP Environmental Science class successfully obtained a new hydroponic system and funding through the immense support of our community. Malaia's Microgreens, an indoor hydroponic farm based in Irvine, generously provided us with a hydroponic system necessary to carry out our goal of teaching the Culinary Science classes how to grow their own organic foods.

All of Malaia's Microgreens' grow systems are designed to be vertically scaled with technology to maximize their ability to reuse resources. In fact, the systems save up to 90% more water than traditional farms. The water is always re-captured, filtered, treated, and supplied with nutrients for another use. The hydroponic system will help address several modern agriculture challenges by supplying plants with nutrient-rich water

solutions instead of traditional soil, coupled with LED lighting that's adaptable and consumes up to ten times less water.

This new hydroponic system will be integrated into the Culinary Science classes, providing students with hands-on experience to cultivate organic food. It encourages them to learn about the entire process of food production, from seed to harvest, fostering a deeper understanding of agriculture and self-sufficiency.

Our collaboration with the culinary science class is geared towards enhancing students' essential gardening and hands-on skills for the future. FreeFreshCo aims to foster a greater sense of environmental responsibility and an increased awareness of sustainable farming within youth.

About FreeFreshCo

FreeFreshCo is a student-run organization

created by an AP Environmental Science class at Diamond Bar High School. Our goal is to transform unused furniture into hydroponic gardens, using soil-less farming techniques where plants grow in nutrient-rich water solutions, which can provide free and fresh produce for the Culinary Science classes at DBHS. One day, our hope is for FreeFreshCo to become a permanent, impactful program in the community of Diamond Bar.



Diamond Bar Golf Course Reopens



n April 20, The Diamond Bar Golf Course reopened after being closed for 2.5 years. Located at 22751 Golden Springs Dr, Diamond Bar, the course was temporarily closed on September 1, 2021, as part of the freeway improvements to the SR-57/SR-60. The renovations will enhance the overall operations and golfing experience. Key highlights of the project include redesigned layouts of all 18 greens and sand bunkers; replacement of all tee boxes with 5 sets of tees for golfers of all skill levels; a new





practice pitching green; driving range landing area; as well as state of the art irrigation system upgrade, significant turf reduction and storm drainage improvements. The Diamond Bar Golf Course offers both golf and special event facilities.

The Diamond Bar Golf Course was redesigned in partnership with the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, the County of Los Angeles Department of Parks and Recreation, the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) and the San Gabriel Valley Council of Governments (SGVCOG). The renovations were possible due to a \$23 million investment from Metro.



The County of Los Angeles owns the course, while the Los Angeles County Department of Parks and Recreation administers and leases the operations to American Golf Corporation under a long-term lease agreement.

The improvements were a critical aspect of State Route 57/60 Confluence Chokepoint Relief Project, which aims to ease one of the nation's most congested freeway interchanges.
