Beverage Container Recycling

With few exceptions, any time you purchase a beverage, you are charged a California Redemption Value (CRV) fee. You can get this fee back when you take your empty containers to a recycling center or participating retailer.



CRV Containers Include:

- aluminumplasticglass
- bimetal
- wine and liquor boxes, pouches, and cartons

By law, you can request to be paid by the count for CRV containers - up to 50 aluminum, 50 glass, 50 plastic, 50 bi-metal, and 25 wine and spirit boxes, pouches, or cartons in a single visit.

Embracing Community, Safety and Change

ince the late 1970s, our nation has observed the month of May as Asian American and Pacific Islander Month. Let us take an opportunity to celebrate the many rich contributions that people of Asian and Pacific Islander ancestry have made to our nation and communities. As we reflect on these contributions, let

us also commit to fostering understanding and unity among all cultures in our diverse society.

While we are only a few months into the year, there is much to look forward to in the coming months. In February, the City Council approved new 10-year franchise agreements for trash, recycling, and organic waste collection. Valley Vista Services, Inc., which currently services the City's commercial accounts, was awarded a con-

tract for residential services. Similarly, Waste Management, which currently services the City's residential accounts, was awarded a contract for commercial services. These new agreements reduce rates for the first year – nearly 11% for residential accounts, and 7% for commercial accounts.

The two waste haulers, which have provided waste hauling services to Diamond Bar since 2000, will still serve the City, but the sectors they currently serve will switch beginning on September 1, 2025. As the City and waste haulers prepare for this transition, I want to ensure you that information on what to expect and how to prepare for the change will be shared over the next few months using all City communication channels. These channels include the City's monthly newsletter, the City's website and social media platforms, and mailed correspondence from the City and the waste haulers. As summer approaches, I want to remind everyone of the importance of maintaining defensible space around your properties. Recently, the Los Angeles County Fire Department sent notices to property owners in designated fire hazard severity zones, and here in Diamond Bar, more than 3,500 parcels fall within these high-risk areas. Adhering to state-mandated defensible space requirements is essential for mitigating fire risks and enhancing our community's safety.

Defensible space is the buffer zone extending up to 100 feet from your home or to the property line. Within this space, it is vital to clear away brush, debris, and other combustible materials. By doing so, not only do you increase your home's chances of surviving a wildfire, but you also create safer conditions for firefighting efforts. City of Diamond Bar Acquires Steven's Fields

Background

For more than 50 years, Steven's Fields was owned by Diamond Bar Little League then PONY Baseball. Located at 22601 Sunset Crossing Road (directly across the street from the YMCA Early Learning facility and immediately adjacent to a city-owned undeveloped park site), the 10.23-acre site features four unlit baseball fields (one of which is abandoned & unmaintained), batting cages, seating areas, and a number of outbuildings.

Over the years, there has been a consistent decline in league enrollment. A program that once had 1600 players was down to 110 in 2024. Due to the decrease in participation, the volunteers who ran the baseball program through Diamond Bar Pony, were no longer able to maintain the property.

In spring 2024, the organization began discussions about the future of the program and facility, and the potential for City ownership. On June 3, 2024, the PONY Baseball Board of Directors submitted a formal offer to transfer the property to the City at no cost by way of a Transfer Agreement Facilities Use Agreement.

Site Development Plans

Once acquired, the Stevens Field property combined with the adjacent City-owned 2.78-acre site will create a 13-acre park site that has the potential to be developed into a community park with amenities for residents of all ages, interests and activity levels. However, funding to construct a new park on the property has not been secured, and the cost is estimated to exceed \$20 million.

Upon completion of the property transfer, the City's priority will be to invest between \$750,000 and \$1 million to improve playability on three of the four existing fields, remove existing hazards, and complete basic maintenance of existing trees and landscaping. This work is anticipated to start in spring 2025 and take approximately six months to complete.

Expanded Athletic Fields

By restoring the site's playability, the City will be able to provide additional capacity for a variety of Diamond Bar youth and adult sports, including baseball, softball, soccer and football, among others, ultimately reducing existing allocation impacts on community facilities such as Pantera and Peterson parks.





Mental Health Awareness Month - May

A n estimated 31% of Americans will experience anxiety at some time in their lives and one out of every six adults will have depression in their lifetime.

If you are struggling with anxiety or depression, a good starting point may be to consider how your lifestyle choices may play a role in your mental health.

While changing these habits may not treat a mental health disorder completely, they may help to manage your symptoms.

Five ways to help manage anxiety or depression:

1. Prioritize Sleep

Sleep is interconnected with mental health. A lack of sleep can exacerbate mental health issues — and vice versa. Adults should be getting seven to nine hours of sleep each night.

A sleep routine can help ensure you are making consistent sleep a priority. This means going to bed at the same time every night, waking up at the same time every morning and minimizing naps during the day.

If you have trouble falling asleep, taking a hot shower or bath two hours before going to bed may help. The drop in your core body temperature when you get out of the warm water helps stimulate melatonin release, which is the hormone that regulates your sleep.

2. Stay Active and Go Outside

Daily exercise alone can help you manage anxiety and depression. This is because your body may produce more serotonin and endorphins, which can have a positive effect on your mind and your ability to manage stress. Working out may also help reduce fatigue, decrease tension and elevate your mood. Looking for a place to start? Yoga has been found to help relieve stress and anxiety through controlled breathing and physical focus.

Consider scheduling 30 minutes or more of exercise at least three to five days a week.

3. Focus on Good Nutrition

Eating balanced meals throughout the day can help im-

prove your overall well-being. Include protein, complex carbohydrates (foods like oatmeal, quinoa and whole-grain breads are great options) plus fruits and vegetables. Complex carbohydrates are synthesized by your body into serotonin, which is the calming chemical that our brains need to help mitigate depression and anxiety. Protein is also important because it helps keep you full for longer, which may help stabilize your blood sugar.

4. Avoid or Limit Alcohol

After drinking alcohol, you may notice the next morning you feel anxious or on edge. This may be due to mild detoxification, which may make you feel jittery or anxious. Alcohol may also affect your sleep. Even one drink may disrupt your natural cycle and leave you feeling restless the next day.

If you are taking an antidepressant, mixing alcohol may worsen your symptoms and may cause unwanted side effects.

5. Practice Meditation

Meditation may help bring a sense of relaxation and a more tranquil mind, which may reduce stress and help calm anxiety. When you meditate, even for just a few minutes, you help clear your mind from daily stressors. This may be a key component to reducing symptoms of anxiety, depression and other medical conditions.

There are many kinds of meditation from breathing techniques to walking. Whatever method you choose, it's important to focus your attention, be free from distractions and relax your breathing.

Consider these lifestyle changes to help you cope and better manage your symptoms. If you find yourself struggling, talk to your primary care provider and consider checking out your health benefits for support. You may be surprised to learn that some insurers offer digital tools to help with mild behavioral health needs.

Bridging the Gap: Honor Roll Schools Recognized for Excellence in Education

Tn a celebration of academic excellence and collaborative innovation, the Regional Chamber of Commerce - San Gabriel Valley, in partnership with Educational Results Partnership (ERP) and Rowland Unified School District, hosted the Honor Roll Schools Award Ceremony. The event recognized high-performing schools across the region for their achievements in student success, equity, and career readiness.

Centered around the theme "Strategies for Bridging Education and Employment,' the event brought together educators, school leaders, business professionals, and policymakers to discuss effective strategies for aligning classroom instruction with workforce demands. The program aimed to highlight and encourage practices that help students transition successful-

ly from education into real-world careers.

One of the program's key segments was a panel discussion exploring models of education-to-career pipelines. Topics included integrating real-world applications into classroom teaching, expanding access to career and technical education (CTE), and establishing strong school-industry partnerships. The panel also discussed the value of mentorships, internships, and dual enrollment programs in helping students prepare for postsecondary education and future careers.

The event culminated in the Honor Roll School Award Ceremony, where schools were recognized for their commitment to academ-

These schools were celebrated for their dedication to advancing student achievement and closing opportunity gaps within diverse communities.

The Honor Roll designation is based on a

data-driven analysis of school performance, considering growth in student achievement in English language arts and math, long-term progress, and effectiveness in serving socioeconomically disadvantaged populations. Schools that earn this distinction demonstrate a consistent track record of academic success and equitable practices.

Beyond honoring individual campuses, the event underscored the broader importance

of community investment in education and cross-sector collaboration. By spotlighting schools that are making measurable progress, the Honor Roll Awards aim to promote the adoption of proven strategies that support all learners.
