





















Take A Peak Into My Universe / Melted Wax and Acrylic on Plywood / 61 x 91 cm, 2019








FALL IN AND OUT

















































Glimpse / Textile and Mixed Media on Canvas / 20×40 cm, 2024








I AM IN TRAINING DON'T KISS ME








I'll Erase Your Taste And Let You Go / Mixed Media on Canvas / 100 x 120 cm, 2023


























Integrating Disintegration / Mixed Media on Canvas / 100 x 120 cm, 2023





I draw no lines in between, I see life and death bound with each other, I think that happiness and despair as necessities to exist, and I view poverty and prosperity as just mere concepts; and it goes the same way on how I view genders, nationalities and status, which for me are merely intersecting threads of life, just seamlessly detached yet intertwined with one another. It is never just black and white for me, and through my works, I am able to portray the colorful world of internal and external perceptions such as struggles and success, social dilemmas, a bit of political hints, individualism, philosophical etymologies, cultural ethnicities, femininity, nature with hints of sarcasm, and absurdity.

My artworks are portrayals of my emotional and mental psyche which is a balance of concepts with a nod to reality. I aim for my art to be something that makes you think twice and gives you time to decide if you want to live in that world. I'd like for my viewers to give their own interpretations and see themselves in the fantasy. I create and somehow make them feel as if they can get lost in it but understand it at the same time. It is conceived from the duality within us, and the other extras ever affecting our mindfulness and stability.
