**REQUIRED** Excellent Sheep by William Deresiewicz

While you will not be submitting an assignment with regards to notes or annotations, you will want to keep track of the important claims that the author makes in each chapter and how he supports them with evidence and examples. For each chapter, make a note of the 3-4 main claims and then how he exemplifies them.

Examples of terms and concepts you will be responsible for on the reading test you will have within the first two weeks: *excellent sheep, Amy Chua – tiger mother, finance and consulting, the liberal arts, inner self, the book <u>Middlemarch</u>, <i>etc.* In each case, you are not responsible for the general meaning of these terms, but how the author uses them in the book to support his various claims.

Important Note: We have chosen this title because it should have relevance to most if not all of you. It is a good example of rhetoric: a persuasive text that presents arguments and support in a variety of ways, drawing on ethos, pathos, and logos. We are not trying to convince you of anything specific, but we simply hope that you find it thought-provoking. You may agree with a lot of what the author presents, some of it, or none at all. These are all valid responses. We hope to present you with something important to think about and perhaps a new perspective on your educational journey.
