Waipahu Intermediate School Career Fair

n November 9, District Council 50 participated in the annual Waipahu Intermediate School Career Fair day. All Waipahu complex schools share a K-12 commitment to prepare students to be globally competitive, but locally committed. It is an integral part of our efforts to prepare students to be college, career and citizenship ready.



Waipahu Intermediate School has aligned with Waipahu High School's Academy school model and has begun implementing a pre-academy school design focusing on two areas called Design & Innovation and Helping People, Saving Lives.

The fair was divided into two sessions, with approximately 20 to 25 students per session. Instructor Alex Magnuson and Tapers Training Coordinator Mario

Manrique, Jr. received good feedback when the students learned about how much money they would be making at the start of their career

and the great benefits that came with being a Union member. It was made clear that all trades had men and women that were very successful.

Training Coordinator Mario made taping modules with a drywall hole to be patched, while instructor Alex showed the students how to fix an electrical cut



out, and how to fix the patch. The students had fun trying to fix the hole and to be able to use real taping mud and taping tools, they all said that taping and painting is something that they would be interested in.

The Waipahu Intermediate staff was pleased with the presentation and the hands-on projects. District Council 50 is recruiting on all the islands and asks all existing members if they know anyone who wants to earn wile they learn and make a good career choice to send them their way.

Tarkett Sheet Vinyl Certification

istrict Council 50 Floor Layers in partnership with Tarkett will now offer a Tarkett Sheet Vinyl Select certification to all floor layer members. This will be a pass or fail certification course. The certification will last two days and consist of class instruction and an exam, as well as hands-on exposure and testing. Members taking the certification class must have the ability to install a custom inset, three wall scribe pattern scribe and heat welding vinyl. Installers that pass the course will receive a certificate from Tarkett.

District Council 50 is proud to present its floor layers with more opportunities for training and certifications to stay competitive in a fast-changing industry. Please look for a scheduled date for the certification as the series will be limited to 10 participants for the two-day series.

Important End of Semester Reminders

As the fall semester draws to a close and the year 2023 comes to an end, we would like to remind all apprentices of the importance of adhering to the University of Hawaii's medical requirements. To register for school, it is mandatory to have the UH immunization form either filled out by your doctor or provide the proper records of your immunization history. If you need to take shots again, please note that some shots require two doses and that after the first dose there is a minimum waiting period of at least 3 – 4 weeks before taking the second dose.

As a reminder, for all apprentices attending apprenticeship school there is a minimum amount of instruction hours that must be completed each semester. Failure to complete the minimum instruction hours will result in failing the semester. Honolulu Community College strictly prohibits any smoking on campus, including vaping. Apprentices must be sure to purchase a parking permit and display it prominently on their dashboard to avoid parking tickets. Campus security at Honolulu Community College has issued hundreds of tickets for no valid parking permits.




> "I've always had a passion for music since I was a child," Jeff says. "It's been one of my biggest stress relievers in my most trying times."

Koa Vista at Koa Ridge

oa Vista I is a seven-story structure that will have 95 affordable rental units for seniors and one two-bedroom manager's unit. The structure will be nestled in the Koa Ridge community, conveniently located in central Oahu near shopping centers and restaurants. The 95 one-bedroom units will be rented out for about \$700 to \$1,400 a month. The units will come with disposals, range, refrigerator and window coverings. Amenities will include a community meet-



ing room, laundry room, computer with high-speed Internet access. an open park, and a victory garden.

Koa Vista will help the elderly in the area get affordable residence in a growing community. The fee owner is Castle & Cooke Homes Hawaii, Inc. The general contractor is Mitsunaga Construction, Inc. The finishing trades contractors that are signatory to District Council 50 are Alfa Glass, Inc., Guy's Superior Interior, Inc., WE Painting, Inc. and Island Flooring. Members and contractors

will be able to showcase their skill and productivity in turning over quality units for seniors to live in. Members will have steady work for the duration of this project that will take them into the New Year.
