Oahu Construction Career Day

fter a two-year hiatus due to COVID-19, Hawaii Construction Career Days was able to hold the Oahu Career Construction Days on September 29 and 30 at Aloha Stadium.

Hawaii Construction Career Days is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization whose mission is to provide Hawaii's youth with insights into career opportunities in the multi-faceted construction industry.



This year's event drew over 1,200 students from over 23 middle and high schools. The event offered the students exposure in two areas: 1) heavy equipment, where students could operate heavy con-

struction equipment and 2) educational exhibits and trades areas consisting of displays from construction companies, educational institutions, and trade associates.



District Council 50 was able to have students use the virtual Aerial Lift program where students could virtually operate a boom lift. The activity garnered lots of attention and a line of students formed to try the VR program.

The event was a great success and a number of counselors, teachers and students expressed interest in having the construction trades visit their schools to create career pathways directly with the schools.



Kauai Construction Career Day

After two long years of pandemic restrictions, Kauai held its Construction Career Day on November 3 on the grounds of Kauai Community College.

It was great to have in-person contact with the students and to answer their questions about becoming a union member and the ben-



efits that our unions offer. It was a long, hot day, but it was well worth it to see how the students wanted to know how much money they would be making per hour if they became a union member.

The students showed a lot of interest in becoming union members in our four trades. The girls show a lot of interest in becoming Painters or Tapers and I explained to them that a number of women have been successful in those trades. They also liked the idea of working Monday-Friday, earning money, and going to school one day a week

on Saturdays. We also explained that our union would pay for their tuition at any of the University of Hawaii colleges that they choose to attend as long as they are an apprentice registered with one of our four trades. They loved the idea of not having to pay for their own tuition and our hourly rate was very appealing.

The students loved all the stickers and gifts we gave out, and some instructors asked if we would be able to give more information to their students at their schools. We exchanged contact information and will be able to schedule future visits.

Mayor Derek Kawakami and now Lieutenant Governor Sylvia Luke attended and interacted with the students. It was nice to see the students challenging the mayor at some hands-on activities.
