Ulana Ward Village

n December 2022, the Howard Hughes Corporation broke ground on its ninth planned residential housing project in Kaka'ako. Called the Ulana Ward Village, this project is unique because the developer put the balance of its mandatory affordable workforce housing units in this one tower.

In accordance with the Reserved Housing guidelines of the



Hawaii Community Development Authority (HCDA), all developers of multi-family dwelling units on lots greater than 20,000 gross square feet in Kaka'ako are required to construct at least 20 percent of the total number of residential units in that development as reserve housing units. These reserve affordable workforce housing units are designed for persons or families that make too much money to qualify for federal assistance programs but not enough to afford to buy a unit at market price.

Instead of having these reserve housing units in every high rise, Howard Hughes decided to satisfy the requirement for all their future developments in Kaka'ako by putting all of its required reserve affordable workforce housing units in just three of their projects: 150 in A'ali'i, 375 in Ke Kilohana, and 697 in Ulana Village.

Hundreds of Hawaii residents applied for these affordable workforce housing units because it was unknown whether Howard Hughes would offer any more affordable workforce housing units in the future. All 697 units in this project were offered below market prices to first-time buyers. To qualify, the purchaser must be a resident of Hawaii whose income and assets cannot be more than 140 percent of Area Median Income (AMI). The purchaser must place a minimum downpayment of 10 percent to the lender of this project and shall be the owner-occupant for the specified length of time. The timing of this project was a blessing for those lottery winners that were able to secure a unit because they were able to lock in interest rates just before they started climbing.

Hawaiian Dredging was awarded the task of building this project. Union subcontractors on site include: WE Painting, Kalu Glass, Jayco, Caulking Hawaii, Group Builders, and BMK. Currently, Hawaiian Dredging, Kula Glass, and Caulking Hawaii are doing the glass mockups in Singapore. Hawaiian Dredging expects that the Glaziers will be on site in the early part of the first quarter of 2024.



Embracing Technology, Sustainability, and Training

The Autodesk Construction Blog's recent article, "2023 Construction Trends: Embracing Technology, Sustainability, and Training," explores the latest trends in the construction industry. loha! We are halfway through 2023 and the Floor Layers have been fortunate to have had a steady flow of work. Some of the key projects are Koa Ridge, Hoopili, Mauna Olu Cottages and Ewa by Gentry homes. These projects will continue to provide work for the next five to 10 years.

Other projects already underway on Oahu will take us into 2024. These include: Victoria, Hale Waiolu, and Quads/hanger on Schofield. There are also housing projects on Kaneohe Marine Base, Camp Stover, Peninsula and Palm Circle on Fort Shafter. On Maui are the Grand Wailea, Kihei High School, Wailuku Apt and Airport terminals. On Lanai, we have Hokuao. On Kauai, there is the Kauai Beach Resort, Kauai Shores, and I Hotel Hanalei Bay. Big Island projects include Waikoloa Hotel, Villages at Laiopua, and Holualoa Elementary School.

With all the current and future projects ahead of us, please stay healthy and make sure that you update all your certifications. Safety is our number one priority, so if you need to schedule a class, please contact our union office.

2023 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

The 2023 Legislative Session adjourned on May 4, 2023. This year was a challenging Session due to the number of new legislators in both chambers of the Legislature. Many of these new legislators were not familiar with union or construction issues. Despite these challenges, your Political Department successfully opposed bills that would have hurt our unions. New legislation was also passed this year that will help prevent the owners of construction companies who repeatedly fail to pay their employees proper wages from evading responsibility for their acts.

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF BUILDING TRADE UNIONS

In April, representatives from the Political Department attended the National Association of Building Trades Unions (NABTU) annual convention in Washington, D.C., where they participated in discussions about union issues in construction.

The guest speaker at this year's convention was U.S. President Joseph Biden. President Biden had just announced that he would be running for re-election in 2024 and reaffirmed his strong commitment to support construction unions.

As you may recall, in 2021 President Biden signed a \$1 trillion bi-partisan Infrastructure Bill into law to repair and improve infrastructure throughout the United States.

Hawaii is expected to receive almost \$2.8 billion of new federal money. Included in this sum are \$25 million for a Waiale road extension project on Maui, almost \$31 million for renovations at the Daniel K. Inouye International Airport, and almost \$25 million to the County of Kauai for improvements to Poipu Road. These are just a few of the Hawaii projects that will benefit from the bi-partisan Infrastructure Bill. While in Washington, D.C., the Political Department also met with all four members of Hawaii's Congressional delegation to discuss issues of concern here in Hawaii. We are pleased to report that both President Biden and our Congressional delegation remain firmly committed that federal monies allocated under the bi-partisan Infrastructure Bill will go to union construction companies.

Reimagining the Ambassador Hotel

Oahu's Construction Mascot: Towering Cranes Make a Comeback


t's been over six years since construction cranes dominated the Hawaii skyline. At one time construction projects and jobs were so plentiful that the cranes were called the state bird. Well, projects are on the rise, creating more opportunities for many workers.


For the first quarter of 2023 there are 14 cranes compared to 10 in the first quarter of 2021 and six in 2022. Despite concerns over the supply of skilled workers and other economic uncertainties, construction is still going strong. Painters, Drywall Finishers, Flooring, and Glazing trades are especially experiencing a shortage of skilled workers and apprentices. The "out of work" list has dwindled down to very little. Journeyperson, apprentices, and recruitment are major concerns for these trades. Ads in the newspaper, Craigslist, Instagram, and Facebook are not producing the numbers to meet the demand.

Geo-fencing from the IUPAT was incorporated to drum up recruitment and career fairs are being staged by the Training Department. They have been reaching out to high schools for future recruitment. Still, there is a lack of potential workers. And, as the months go by, several more cranes will be soaring the sky lines.

There are six cranes In the Kakaako-Downtown area, and the City has approved several more developments. There are 15 more high rises slated to be erected within the next three to four years and the cranes will announce the start of the high-rise frenzy. There will be a lot of work opportunities for construction workers as it was during the previous construction boom.

Hopefully, developers will not raise the cost of homes, which will in turn raise interest rates on home loans. Affordable homes, rental units, and the long-awaited Transit-Oriented Developments might help to curb the num-





Safety and Health Certification

From May 16-19, 2023, two of our Tapers instructors – Garrett Russell and Alex Magnuson – earned their certification in



First Aid/CPR and AED at the Finishing Trades Institute in Hanover, MD. These two instructors are now qualified to teach our apprentice and journeyperson classes when needed or requested by our union contractors.

It was a very intense class – especially considering

the six-hour time difference between Maryland and Hawaii. The two instructors needed to learn First Aid/CPR and then teach two classes to receive their certification. They both successfully completed all of the requirements and received their First Aid/CPR certifications.



With these certifications under his belt, Alex Magnuson is now certified in AMES automatic tools repair, Fall Protection, Forklift and Aerial Lift (MEWP), and First Aid. Garrett Russell is certified in EIFS (Exterior Insulation and Finishing Systems), AMES automatic tools repair, OSHA 502 (OSHA 10 & 30), Hazard Communication and Fall Protection, Forklift and Aerial lift (MEWP), and First Aid/CPR.

It is crucial for our industry that instructors are certified in as many safety regulations as possible to keep our membership safe and moving forward!
