33rd IUPAT General Convention: Uniting for the Future

The 33rd IUPAT General Convention took place in Orlando, FL, from August 26-30, 2024, under the powerful theme, "One Union, One Family, One Fight." Held every five years, this convention sets the direction and priorities for the International Union of Painters and Allied Trades (IUPAT).

The journey to this convention began months earlier, with each local union nominating delegates in April. The number of delegates is determined by the size of the local's membership. These elected delegates, chosen at the May General Membership meetings, carried the collective voice of their local brothers and sisters to Orlando, where we had the responsibility to vote on critical issues that shape the future of our union.

One of the most significant roles of the convention is the election of our union's leadership. This year, General President James A. Williams Jr. was re-elected, alongside General Secretary-Treasurer Gregg Smith. The convention also

saw the election of our General Vice Presidents: Paul Canning (Eastern Region), Mike Gutierrez (Western Region), Charlie Medows (Central Region), Simone Hazelwood (Canada), Liz

MacElroy (Government Affairs), Shane Smith (Organizing), and Mark Komaromi (Servicing).

Throughout the convention, delegates addressed a wide range of resolutions. Among the resolutions passed was an increase in administrative fees. This decision was not taken lightly, but was

deemed necessary to ensure the continued strength and effectiveness of our union.

The IUPAT is more than just a union, it's a family that includes painters, glaziers, caulkers, tapers, floor layers, convention and trade show decorators, sign and display workers, asbestos workers, and hazmat technicians. In some regions, our family also includes public sector workers such as bus drivers and cafeteria workers. This convention reinforced the idea that regardless of our specific trades, we are united under one banner, fighting for the rights and wellbeing of every member across the United States and Canada.

As we move ahead from the

33rd General Convention, let us remember that our strength lies in our unity. The decisions made in Orlando will guide us over the next five years, but it is up to each of us in every local across



Political Department Primary and General Elections

Thank you to all members who took the time to vote in the 2024 Primary Election! Your participation and support are always important in elections and can have an even greater impact in elections with low public participation, like the recent Primary Election.

Many of the candidates that District Council 50 endorsed in the Primary won their races and are now headed for the General Election in November. Recently, the Political Department reviewed the remaining candidates and chose the ones we believe will support our Unions. The list of DC50's General Election endorsements is included on page 4 of this edition of the Finisher. Again, please don't forget to register and vote in the November General Election.

Federal Project Labor Agreements

One example of how national elections can affect us here in Hawaii is Federal construction projects. As you know, more and more projects are coming to Hawaii because of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act signed into law by President Joe Biden in 2021. President Biden, who has been one of the most union-friendly Presidents in U.S. history, has issued an Executive Order requiring the use of Project Labor Agreements on Federal construction projects funded under the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. President Biden's Executive Order will help ensure that union contractors have a fair opportunity to compete against non-union contractors on public construction projects.

This summer, the Political Department has been working with contractors on developing a standard form Project Labor Agreement that we hope can be used on all Federal construction projects. We anticipate that the new Project Labor Agreement will be used on two large, upcoming Federal construction projects at Fort Shafter and Pearl Harbor.

Apprentice Floor Layers Contest

Anticipation is building for the Apprentice Floor Layers Contest set for November 2,2024, at Honolulu Community College. This prestigious event will not only showcase the exceptional skills of emerging Floor Layers, but it will also determine



which apprentice will represent District Council 50 at "Surfaces 2025" – the IUPAT Floor Layers Apprentice competition held in Las Vegas.

This contest is more than a showcase of talent, it's a crucial step for apprentices aspiring to make their mark

on a national stage. With its engaging schedule and high stakes, the event will highlight the dedication and expertise of the next generation of flooring professionals.


Young workers are proving that collective action is still powerful. As they continue to grow in influence, their fresh ideas and commitment to fairness will likely bring even more success to unions in the future.

First Aid/CPR & AED Defibrillator

Garrett Russell and Alex Magnuson, two of our Tapers instructors were certified in First Aid/CPR and AED at the

Finishing Trades Institute in Hanover, MD back in May 2023. These two instructors are now able to teach our apprentices at school and can offer journey person classes when needed or requested by our union contractors.

It was a very intense class. Garrett and Alex both needed to learn First Aid/CPR and then teach two classes to get their certification. They both completed all the requirements and got their First Aid/CPR certifications.



first semester apprentices on August 17, 2024. The apprentices got to use the new mannequins that are more human-like and the defibrillators walk users through the sequence of shocking the heart.

It's crucial that our instructors are certified in as many safety regulations as possible to keep our membership at the forefront of our industry.



The recent AGMT certification testing yielded great results that reflect the dedication and skill of our team members. A total of 12 technicians took the PBT (performance-based test). Eight



passed to become certified Glaziers, bringing our total to 51 AGMT-certified Glaziers.

This hands-on assessment tested the practical skills and craft-

manship required in the field, and the results demonstrate our team's capability in meeting industry standards. On the knowledge-based side, 25 applicants took the exam and 21 successfully passed – an impressive 84 percent pass rate. This portion of the certification tested the theoretical understanding of architectural glass and metal work and highlighted the depth of knowledge among our members. The next AGMT PBT and KBT testing will tentatively be held November 9-10 and November 16-17.





DC 50's Goal: Recruitment, Retention, and Inclusion

Despite the ages old question, "When will it end?" the construction industry is revving up and will keep on growing with no signs of slowing down for several years to come. With



increased construction on the horizon, several considerations come to mind. With economic growth, more construction projects typically indicate increased employment opportunities. With that in mind,

recruitment and retention is a priority throughout the construction industry.

District Council 50 requires skilled construction workers such as Painters, Flooring Installers, Drywall Finishers, and Glaziers. There is a higher demand for these professionals. District Council 50 is investing in Training and Education, a new training facility, providing accessible training programs and apprenticeships that will equip individuals – journeymen as well – with the necessary skills

to enter the construction industry. DC50 promotes career pathways and opportunities from entry level positions to specialized roles in the finishing industry. Grants from the IUPAT and through the Trades apprenticeship, teach the value of skilled labor, advocate for workforce development initiatives, and ensure industry standards are upheld.

Upgrade programs help existing members adapt to new technologies, methodologies and industry trends ensuring they remain competitive and relevant in the forever evolving construction industry. Prioritizing workers safety and health by enforcing strict safety protocols with their Safety Training Programs and creating a culture of safety awareness on construction sites. These ideas alone, would encourage diversity and inclusion in the construction industry, and attract individuals from all backgrounds and enhance the prospective prospects with a variety of perspectives and skills.

A skilled labor force is essential for meeting the growing demand for the construction projects. By implementing these strategies and investing in the development of a skilled and diverse workforce, in the construction arena, District Council 50 can address the current workforce shortage, meet the demands of the upcoming projects, and enhance the overall productivity and quality in the increasing construction market.
