

# **New Training Center Coming Soon!**



▲ /e are pleased to introduce the new Training Center to all District Council 50 members. The project has been talked about at our monthly meetings and we just wanted to make everyone aware of the changes that we are making to improve our union.

District Council 50 has been working to maximize the footprint of the building for workspace and to meet City and County requirements for the building permit. After clearing the permitting process, the plans and specifications will go out to bid and move forward.

We know that parking will be limited, so we are looking into options nearby to meet our needs. Although the new training center could be considered small, we plan to use it to our advantage by keeping class sizes down and increasing instruction time members have with instructors.

We plan to use the facility mainly for upgrade training for members of all trades that will be on a rotating schedule between all trades.

## **American Red Cross**

The American Red Cross released a new version of the First Aid/ CPR/AED program that took effect on September 1, 2022. The new program designated as Adult and Pediatric First Aid/ CPR/AED - equips students to recognize and care for a variety of first aid, breathing and cardiac emergencies.

The Red Cross program is designed for students who need certification that satisfies OSHA, workplace, or other regulatory requirements. Upon successful completion



of the course, a valid two-year certificate is issued. District Council 50 safety instructors have been recertified and are prepared to instruct members on the latest lifesaving information and techniques.

Currently, apprenticeship classes are held at Honolulu Community College and those will continue as scheduled.

We were also awarded a grant from the International Union's Finishing Trades Institute that will allow us to almost cover the cost of four large pieces of equipment - a telehandler, forklift, boom lift and a scissors lift - that we will be able to use to certify members. We will be making announcements in monthly membership meetings on the development of the building so attend your local meetings to stay updated. 🕰

## Glaziers & Caulkers **Work Forecast**

This year is turning out to be a lot like last year for the Glaziers and Caulkers. Work hours for this year started off strong in the beginning of the first quarter and started to slow down towards the middle of the third quarter. However, we anticipate work hours to pick up dramatically at the start of the fourth quarter and finish strong going into the new year.

Some of the larger projects in progress for the Glaziers and Caulkers include: Sky Ala Moana, Waiea renovation project, and Hilton Hawaiian Village Tapa Tower renovation. The Koa Ridge and Ho'opili housing projects will extend for years down the road.



Projects that will start up in 2022 and roll into 2023 are: Hale Wai'olu Senior Residence, Victoria Place, Kokua Senior Living, Ala Moana Plaza, and Schofield Barracks Bldgs 2075 and 2076.

Also starting in 2023 are a number of projects in the three-to-fivemonth range. Slated to start this year are state projects, military base projects, and neighbor island projects. Some of the more prominent ones are the Ililani, The Park at Ward Village, and Hokuala, to name a few. Upcoming projects without definite start dates include the Grand Vacations Project and The Residences Mandarin Oriental Honolulu.

All in all, we should be extremely busy in 2023! 🝣



# From the Political Department

he recent 2022 Primary Election was unlike any normal election cycle for a number of reasons. First, numerous state and county district lines were redrawn as a result of data gathered in the 2020 United States Census. Second, a surprising number of incumbents chose not to run for office. Finally, many new, firsttime candidates ran for office.

District Council 50's Political Department and your local unions worked hard to find the right candidates to support and to lay the groundwork for success in the political battles that are sure to come in the next few years. This work included interviewing scores of candidates, determining which ones to support, and then going out into the community to support those candidates that were chosen for endorsement.

A list of all candidates supported by DC50 was published in last quarter's edition of the Finisher. Though they still must win in the General Election, many candidates supported by DC50 won their primary elections. Your Political Department will continue to work to support those politicians that support us.

The Primary Election this year demonstrated yet again how significant even one vote can be. A recount in the race for State House District 35 showed that Cory Chun (who was endorsed by DC50) defeated Nathan Takeuchi by five (5) votes! Mr. Chun graciously called the Political Department immediately after the recount to thank us for supporting him. Remember, every vote matters, and we strongly urge you to participate in the November 8, 2022 General Election.

# Floor Layers to Compete for Title?

Aloha everyone! Once a month, IUPAT flooring business representatives across the United States meet on Zoom to discuss matters affecting the flooring industry, Information about new

and upcoming products, and flooring news about what's happening in other states.



Among the topics touched upon during this meeting is the proposition of bringing back the Installer of the Year Competition. This would crown one journeyman and an apprentice who compete in the installation of covup sheet vinyl and pattern carpet in the mock-ups. The competition will be judged on workmanship and following blueprints within a time limit.

To start off this event, a competition would be held locally to determine one journeyman winner and one apprentice winner. Then, contestants will be sent to a second competition where they will compete with the other councils in the IUPAT. That winner will then go on to compete in the final contest called the Installer of the Year Competition in Las Vegas where they will represent their local as well

as the IUPAT by competing against floor layers from across the world. The contest will last three days and will be graded by several judges. The winner will be recognized as being the best of the best in flooring and will also receive tools.



Journeymen and apprentices who wish to compete should have experience in installing sheet vinyl covup and patterned carpet, be able to read blueprints, and have a good attitude. In addition, apprentices are able to compete in the contest even if they are no longer in the apprenticeship program. If you are interested in participating, please contact our Training Coordinator and Business Representative. Notices for contest dates will be announced once they are confirmed.
