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

On our roads: Muddy Creek Road is due for resurfacing and painting of stripes, this spring, according to the County Department of Public Works.

On February 27, traffic on Davidsonville Road was backed up because only one lane at a time was available as trees on the east side were being trimmed and cut back from the power lines. That allowed ample time to notice a car parked on the grass on the southwest corner at Governors Bridge Road, posted with a large sign: "Traffic Count in Progress." The signal at the intersection continued its steady blinking.

For years residents and commuters have pleaded with the State Highway Administration to convert it to a full stop signal, as rush hour traffic makes left turns there difficult and dangerous. SHA always responded that the amount of traffic there does not justify a full stop, but they promised to repeat the traffic count. Can it be, can we hope for a full stop light there? Back when the Patuxent River Bridge on #214 was closed, the full stop signal was well received and cheered by drivers at rush hour and between times. Is SHA considering reinstating the safer stop signal? Let us hope so. Gail



All the exhibitors will await you eagerly and deal out lots of good information. Come out and enjoy some green, clean fun!





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
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Steuart Pittman (June 6, 1919 ~ February 14, 2013) by E.B. Furgurson III



Steuart L. Pittman, a champion of land preservation and the environment, a former assistant secretary of defense, and patriarch of a family that has been at Davidsonville's Dodon Farm for nine generations, died Sunday, February 14, 2013. He was 93.

The family said he died while going to Sunday dinner at his son's house on the farm.

In addition to a successful international law practice and public service career, Pittman was involved in causes including farm and forestland preservation and environmental concerns, particularly the Chesapeake Bay and its watershed.

"He was a man of good judgment and good humor," his wife Bobby Pittman said. "But it was his judgment I admire most. He had a unique view of the world."


"He was just a fantastic person," said former Del. Virginia Clagett, a family friend of more than 40 years. "And he was so involved in his community. He was a super advocate for the best things in this county. And a great help with legislation to help preserve agricultural land. He understood it [the environment] intellectually,

he understood the science. And he cared about it," she said.

He was an early member of the Chesapeake Environmental Protection Association, only recently having retired from 40 years as a trustee. "He always provided wise counsel," said Lee Greenbaum, a CEPA board member and regular lunch partner of Pittman's. "Some were trigger-happy and wanted to take bold action. But he would say, 'Let's think this through,' just like a good lawyer." Greenbaum and others noted Pittman's sense of humor and quiet demeanor. "He was a true gentleman," Greenbaum said. "I never heard him use a four-letter word. I never knew him to be unkind to anyone."

For years Pittman was a member of the Marlborough Hunt Club, and he hosted the pony club and the hunt club at Dodon. He offered his farm as the site of the Dodon Run, a cross-country riding event held for more than two decades. It was a precursor to the hunt club's steeplechase races at Roedown Farm.

Christy Clagett, master of the Marlborough Hunt Club, saw firsthand Pittman's dedication to the land and equestrian life. "He had a vision that he needed to protect the land," she said. "He *(next page please)*

Horse racing was not new to Dodon. Pittman's ancestor, Dr. George Steuart — the first of the family to own Dodon in 1725 — won the first recorded horse race in Maryland. He won the Annapolis Subscription Plate in a head-to-head race against Lord Charles Carroll's mount at Parole in 1743. During the Civil War, horses bred and trained at Dodon were smuggled south to Confederate forces, and Union troops often raided the farm.

Steuart Lansing Pittman was born in New York City on June 6, 1919, and grew up on the East Side of Manhattan, where his father was a chemical engineer. After high school he attended Yale, graduating in 1941. His early adult life cemented a desire to work in international affairs. He immediately went to work for Pan American Airways, managing an airport in Kenya — a vital link in a hush-hush supply chain to the Middle East. Later he helped operate the China National Airline Co., which famously flew "over the hump" from India to China, supplying vital war material to the Chinese resistance that was battling Japanese occupation.

He returned home in 1943 and joined the U.S. Marines. He was dispatched to China to train and operate with guerrilla groups deep behind Japanese

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
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lines. Two days after the war was over he was involved in the last naval battle of the war. Pittman commanded one of two junks that encountered a large Japanese junk with a cannon aboard. The Japanese, who did not know the war was over, fired on them. Pittman's junk and the other craft fired bazookas and Tommy guns to knock out the Japanese cannon and defeat the enemy ship.

Once home he attended Yale Law School, determined to become involved in international affairs. After graduating he worked as chief counsel for the Marshall Plan to rebuild Europe after the war.

In 1961, he was tapped by President John F. Kennedy to lead the nation's Civil Defense program and served as assistant secretary of defense until 1964. That year, he returned to a successful law practice and the firm he founded in 1954 — Shaw, Pittman, Potts and Trowbridge. He continued his international banking and corporate practice.

Though born and raised in New York, Mr. Pittman and his father spent much time at Dodon Farm in Davidsonville, which had been in the family for nearly 300 years. In his later years, one of his great satisfactions was knowing some of his children had built homes and started families on the 550-acre farm.

Mr. Pittman was buried in the family cemetery at Dodon. A public celebration of his life will be held on March 15 at the Metropolitan Club in Washington and 11:00 on March 16 at the Marlborough Hunt Club.

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Anne Arundel County Bill 2-13 - Watershed Restoration and Protection Act Stormwater bill fact sheet, by Kincey Potter, Growth Action Network

Bill 2-13 sets up a funding mechanism to meet the County's obligations under the federal stormwater permit (NPDES) and resulting from EPA's Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) requirements. Fees will go into a dedicated fund that can only be used for stormwater management practices and stream and wetland restoration activities to reduce pollution. This legislation would generate \$26.5 million initially.

Over half of the streams in Anne Arundel County are severely degraded and, as a result, dump tons of sediment and nutrients into our rivers with every rainfall. The County is required to reduce this pollution under Federal and State law. The estimated cost of meeting pollution goals for stormwater by 2025 is \$900 million. State legislation passed last year mandates that the County create a stormwater fee, but does not specify the amount.

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1) Single family homes in R2 and R5 zoning have approximately 2,800 square feet of impervious and make up the largest number of residences in the county. The fee for this base amount of impervious was set at \$85 per year. 2) Town homes and multifamily dwellings have about 40% of the base square footage of 2,800 so the rate for these homes was set at \$34 per year.

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Stormwater Management Bill 2-13 (from page 12) 3) R-1, RLD and agricultural properties average about twice the amount of the base impervious amount and the fee is therefore \$170 per year.

Non-residential fees will be based on the actual amount of impervious on each property. The property's total square footage of impervious area will be divided by the base of 2,800 and then multiplied times \$85.

Fee Credits: Residential communities and nonresidential property owners would be eligible for a credit of up to 50% of the annual fee if owners can demonstrate effective stormwater management controls.

Fee exemptions: Residential owners who can demonstrate substantial financial hardship would be exempted from the fee.

The bill will finally provide some modest funding to begin repairs of over a \$1 billion needed to correct the many stormwater-related intrusions into our creeks and waters. The longer we wait to get started, the more it will cost and the longer our rivers and streams will be impacted.

This bill was recommended by a working group with representatives from commercial and residential homebuilders, the Chamber of Commerce, the Maritime Industry, environmentalists, the County Council and representatives from the Maryland Environmental Finance Center. The Capital Gazette endorsed the bill.

voted on at the March 4 Council meeting and another hearing, possibly a vote, on March 18.

Critical Area Bill 93-12 was introduced to the County Council on November 19 by Council Chairman Derek Fink at the request of the County Executive, and by Councilman Chris Trumbauer. After being amended, it was passed on February 19 by a vote of five to two, opposed by Derek Fink and Jerry Walker. It will take effect 45 days after it was enacted. This is not new law; Critical Area law came in 1985 and changes are required from time to time.
