

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### Bill 21-14 should be passed by the County Council, not vetoed by the County Executive

rowth Action Network of Anne Arundel County GAN), under the leadership of Ann Fligsten, is working for passage of County Council Bill 21-14, introduced by Council members Jaime Benoit and Chris Trumbauer. The purpose is to protect county residents from additional landfills for rubble and land-clearing debris, specifically to keep them from being allowed as a special exception in a residential zoning district. The Council held its public hearing on the bill on Monday, May 5; Will Biddle testified on behalf of DACA in support of the bill, along with Mike Lofton of Harwood, Rob Smith of Crofton, Ann Fligsten of GAN, as well as many others. The Council postponed the vote on the bill until April 19. You have this opportunity to contact the Council members and the County Executive to ask them to support passage of Bill 21-14.

GAN provided the following information to tell you why you should want this bill passed.


For over 20 years two companies have sought to open new private landfills (Chesapeake Terrace) and to reopen a closed land fill (Tolson/Cunningham). The Tolson landfill was closed by the State after 95 viola-

tions by the owners (Tolson). There are no private rubble landfills operating in Anne Arundel County.

Ten years ago, the County tried to terminate rubble land fills in Anne Arundel County or get them under better control. The Halle Corporation, which owns the proposed site at Chesapeake Terrace. sued the County and the County was forced to retain both sites in the Solid Waste Management Plan (SWMP).

The County must provide for zoning at the location of a private rubble landfill in the County and list the site on the Solid Waste Management Plan. Both of these steps were taken by the County 20 years ago, but neither site has received Maryland Department of Environment permits. MDE looks at the environmental issues and the County looks at traditional zoning criteria.

For 20 years the owners of these two sites have repeatedly asked for extensions to the Special Exceptions granted long ago by the Board of Appeals. The Board of Appeals until very recently has given the requested extensions without allowing any testimony about the vast changes in the neighborhoods adjoining these sites. Many communities containing thousands of residents will be severely impacted by either of these sites should they get MDE approval. Rubble landfills have become industrial in scale and impact and they do not belong in residentially zoned land. Bill 21-14 would not allow private rubble landfills on any residentially zoned land.

The most recent Solid Waste Management Plan was filed with the State at the end of last year. Despite the fact that the AA County Department of Public Works says **neither of these landfills are now needed,** that plan included these two sites, based on the position taken by the Office of Law.

Special Exceptions granted 20 years ago are out of date and should not be valid at this time. Much has been learned about the damage to the environment even using "best practices" for landfills. There are no failsafe ways to bury rubble that will not contaminate or threaten underground water.

Fortunately, because of the change in citizen behavior and the stellar accomplishments of our Department of Public Works with its recycling program, there is no need currently or in the next 20 to 30 years for these facilities.

If either of these private landfills is built they will take in rubble from outside Anne Arundel County, will be managed privately, and will have minimal oversight on what is dumped in the landfill. Anne Arundel County will have the largest private rubble landfill in the state of Maryland **that County residents do not need.** Increased traffic of rubble-filled trucks will cause noise and dust diminishes the air quality.

Water leeching through the rubble contaminates groundwater, wells, and the aquifer. Ten years after it was closed, the former PST landfill in Harwood is still being monitored to measure seepage into the groundwater flowing through the Patuxent River watershed and Chesapeake Bay. To allow any more rubblefills is counter-productive to efforts to clean up the rivers and the bay.

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### Riva Park expansion correctly identified

The Villager apologizes for mis-identifying the property to be added to Riva Area Park. In September 2013 the Anne Arundel County Department of Recreation and Parks purchased a property on Riva Road owned by members of the Carr family. The 36acre parcel adjoins Riva Park and extends from Riva Road to the BGE power line and will increase the park to 96 acres.

The Villager improperly identified the parcel as located on the corner of Riva Road and Beards Point Road. That property remains in the hands of the Carr family.

The additional land offers South County residents additional open space which will not be consumed in residential or commercial development. The County is pleased to be able to protect the open space while expanding an existing park. Recreation and Parks officials are talking with consultants on how best to use the additional land, including a walking trail.



### Anne Pearson's Quest: We belong to the earth!

Tt is time to celebrate our long-forgotten heritage: We Ineed to change from being owners of the land to participants in the patterns of life. One way to do so is to surround our houses with a richness of native plants, shrubs, trees, and grasses that provide food and homes for insect-loving birds whose songs are lost to us.

Humans have converted 95 to 97 percent of all land to our use, roughly half to farms and half to cities and suburbs. We have lost 95 percent of the species that greeted the Pilgrims. Restoring suburban gardens to native plantings and lawns to meadow can prevent the loss of all species of wildlife native to this land. Thirtyseven percent of animal species are herbivorous insects that can thrive as food for birds in restored habitat.



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### About the Future Supply of Drinking Water in Maryland

The Chesapeake Environmental Protection Association (CEPA) will present a forum on Sustainable Drinking Water Supplies in Maryland

Friday, May 30 at 7:00 pm, at the Calvary United Methodist Church, 301 Rowe Blvd., Annapolis (just east of the Navy-Marine Corps stadium)

Do you know where your drinking water comes from when you turn on the tap, or how clean and safe it is to drink? Do you think it will always be plentiful and safe for your children and grandchildren and generations to follow?

In Maryland the drinking water supply is drawn both from surface water and groundwater sources. Each is currently stressed as a sustainable, safe source. In the coastal plain, roughly east of I-95, water is drawn from groundwater by municipal wells or private wells, in about 50-50 proportion. Water levels in the confined aquifers that are being pumped are dropping by about two feet per year. The state recently conducted a study of water age in the upper Patapsco aguifer. It was determined that the age of the water ranged from a few years old to over a million years old. This indicates that we are mining a natural resource that was deposited below the subsurface during the last ice age, and that the recharge mechanism is much slower than the rate of withdrawal. As we are forced to draw water from deeper aquifers the quality of the water declines. Increased levels of iron and other mineral compounds are encountered. Local concentrations of radium, radon, and arsenic are currently present in some areas. At lower aquifer levels hydrostatic pressure decreases, and hydrostatic pressure is what keeps salt water from backflowing into the source water supply. Aquifers on Kent

Island, Annapolis Neck, and Ocean City now show signs of salt water intrusion.

Add to this picture two additional considerations:

- Maryland's population is steadily growing; an additional ten percent is expected by 2030.
- Climate change is real and is already affecting rain events, droughts, and water demand.

Clean water is a necessity for all. It should be considered as a natural resource. The State should exercise the doctrine of public trust over water and manage it for quality and sustainability. As in such cases the public needs to be informed to provide oversight. Absent public involvement, decisions that will affect us all will be guided by special interests.

The Chesapeake Environmental Protection Association is concerned about these issues and thinks you should be too. We invite you to attend our forum on Friday, May 30, 2014, to hear from experts and the individuals who are responsible for managing and protecting groundwater resources in Maryland. ### Senator Ed Reilly and Delegate Cathy Vitale summarize the 2013-2014 State Legislative Session


On April 7 we ended another session of the Maryland General Assembly. Even during the government shutdown, the lights were on and we were in session. Although Mother Nature did her best to try and keep us from meeting, the members met every day regardless of weather and road conditions. Despite the never ending winter, legislators still found time to propose 2,693 new bills and resolutions and as of midnight on the last night, had passed 814 different bills.

Legislation varied from the mundane to the highly charged. Corrective legislation, like increasing the number of members of a commission, precisely defining what constitutes an "electric bicycle" or extending sunset deadlines for a multitude of laws, boards and commissions, are examples of the less glamorous and mundane. In addition to the state budget, which involves many days of committee hearings and debates, the General Assembly finally took up the issues of breed-specific dog bite liability, transgender rights, and decriminalization of marijuana. Unusual for this year were the voluminous proposals for increased tax credits and incentives proposed by members of both parties. We discussed whether the film industry should get a \$31 million tax credit (the answer was no). For the first time

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in many years, Marylanders will be able to better plan their estate distributions and will be able to transfer assets between spouses to avoid certain State and Federal taxes. As one colleague said during the debates, "It is sad that you have to die in the state of Maryland to get a tax break."



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

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### My Quest: Anne Pearson (continued from page 8)

I was successful in several different careers, living as many people strive to do. In 1975, I left my home in Annapolis and took my children to live in a log cabin on the narrow tip of a wooded 75-acre peninsula, a mile and a half walk from the road, near enough to the Bay of Fundy to experience immense tidal flows which sweep through narrow channels on either side of the peninsula. I hoped to offer my children an understanding of the basic values, which would guide their lives.

We lived there for eight years, without phone, power, or plumbing. We grew our own vegetables and raised animals for food. We depended on wind, tides, and weather to travel safely by boat.

I discovered a profound sense of belonging to the earth. By relinquishing the common drive for individual power, I gained a deep and far-reaching power in that sense of place. So great a joy filled me, I was compelled to share it with others.

We need to change from simply owning the land to participating in the patterns of life. I cannot do so alone, though I have led an effective effort toward sustainability for 25 years, with allies who recognizes the changes necessary to survive.

A nationwide network of people—innovators, community members, educators and others who can prepare and distribute educational materials—is needed to join those who are already aware of the changes needed; people who can create such as songs, cartoons, DVDs, Power Point presentations, written handouts and interactive use of the Web. If we inspire a way of being based on cooperation it will have a far-reaching effect.

Such a change will make communities aware of their place within the millions of species that make life on earth possible. It will allow us to make changes in our practices and in the laws that govern human existence. It could save us from our current rush toward extinction.

It will require a dedicated urge to continually expand the active network of people rooted in a communality of all life. What can you do? I invite to join me in this quest. Search the Web to learn abou raingardens (bluethumb.org); rainbarrels, wildflower meadows, and backyard habitat; and please tell me what you've undertaken!


