ver forty plus years, the Bylaws have stood the test of time, with only ten changes, and they, like this proposed change, were all minor items such as changing the date of the annual meeting from May to June; adjusting the boundaries of the Davidsonville "area" to reflect where our members live as new communities were developed on the edges, and the like.

The current boundaries for voting membership eligibility are as follows:

Starting at the Patuxent River where Central Avenue (Route #214) crosses it,

follow the Patuxent River south to Stockett's Run; follow Stockett's Run east to Harwood Road;

southeast on Harwood Road to Solomons Island Road (Route #2);

northeast on Solomons Island Road to Central Avenue (Route #214);

west on Central Avenue to Rolling Road (Withernsea);

north on Rolling Road to Beard's Creek;

across Beard's Creek and follow the postal zip code boundary to Della Way;

northeast on Della Way to Homewood Road; northwest on Homewood Road to Riva Road; northeast (right) on Riva Road to left on Glen Isle Road as far as Broad Stream Lane;

follow Broad Stream Lane to the end, through its cul-de-sac to Flat Creek;

follow Flat Creek north to South River

follow the shoreline of South River north to Defense Highway (Route #450);

west on Defense Highway to Bell Branch; southwest on Bell Branch to Bell Branch Road; northwest on Bell Branch Road to Davidsonville Road (#424);

south on Davidsonville Road to Gershner's farm road:

west on Gershner's farm road to Gosheff Farm Lane to the Patuxent River:

south on the Patuxent River to Central Avenue.

Where a boundary line is a street or road, residential properties on both sides of the street are included as within the bounds.

#### Member vote on Bylaws change


DaCA was founded 42 years ago primarily in an effort to "keep South County rural," a continuing mantra and a struggle against intensifying commercial zoning and development. Its scope has broadened according to the interests of the board members. Each member brings the issues they care about and seeks support of the other board members to work toward goals to benefit the community.


The Bylaws established officers and one standing committee to manage the operations of the organization. The one standing committee, titled the Executive Committee, was to be comprised of nine to twelve members, and to "have the supervision, control, and direction of the affairs of the association; shall execute the policies and decisions of the active membership; shall actively prosecute the association's objectives; and shall have discretion in the disbursement of funds. It may adopt such rules for the conduct of its business as shall be deemed advisable, and may in the execution of powers granted, appoint subcommittees or agents to

work on specific problems or reports. The executive committee shall have a regular meeting at the time and place of the annual meeting and shall report to the membership on its activities. It shall meet at the call of the president or secretary. It shall also meet on demand of a majority of the active members of the association."

The rotating group of civic minded residents has done all this over the past 41 years, and has steadfastly referred to itself as "the board," "the directors," or "the board of directors." Only the Secretary and Villager Editor has been forced to used the cumbersome, spelledout, correct term "Executive Committee." Therefore, at its February 2015 meeting, the executive committee members unanimously agreed to recommend to the general membership that the governing body of DACA be referred to as the "Board of Directors." This Bylaws change requires a vote of approval by DACA's general membership attending the Annual Meeting. This item will be on the agenda of the 2015 annual meeting on June 4.

#### **Grants for Communities to Planting Trees**

oes your community have blank space where you want to see trees? The Anne Arundel County Forest Conservancy District Board and the Chesapeake Bay Trust announced a partnership to provide small community-based grants to Anne Arundel County neighborhood associations, community associations, non-profit groups and others to plant trees, increase tree canopy, remove invasive plants and engage citizens in those activities throughout Anne Arundel County.

The goal of these two agencies is to conserve and enhance the County's natural resources by good forest management practices and citizen awareness. The Community Planting Grant Program will fund planting, invasive removal, and community outreach requests for up to \$2,500 to cover plants, mulch, equipment, signage, outreach materials, supplies, contractual, personnel, and other costs. Since 1985, the Trust has awarded more than \$34 million in grants to schools, nonprofit organizations, and public agencies throughout Maryland.


Among the guidelines and criteria, all planting projects must include a native plant list, site plan, project design, photo of the planting/restoration site, and a detailed maintenance plan. Funds may be requested for native plant species only.

Projects can be completed on public property; property owned by non-profit organizations, community-owned property, and other property with conservation easements or signed long-term protection agreements.

The Board and the Trust welcome requests from the following types of groups: 501(c)3 private nonprofits. faith-based organizations. community associations. service and civic groups or clubs, as well as government agencies and educational institutions.

#### **Zoning Law Suit Decision Against Rural South County**

Russell Stevenson is the attorney who worked probono with the Alliance for the Chesapeake to represent plaintiffs in the suit brought by DACA, the Harwood Civic Association, and a number of individuals whose properties are adjacent to properties rezoned to a commercial or a denser residential zoning classification. The case was initiated after the County's Comprehensive Rezoning in 2011 in which County Council member Jerry Walker introduced a number of exceptions to permit commercial use on properties in Residential/Agricultural zones in west and south county. The majority of the Council approved their fellow member's requests for upzoning changes on the General Development Plan.

Residents had hoped the lawsuit would keep future development in line with the county's General Development Plan and "Keep South County Rural." Mr. Stevenson argued that the General Development Plan was created to prevent officials from acting on political favors. This ended a fight that began four years ago when the County Council voted in favor of changing properties in west and south county that were rezoned from residential rural areas to higher density residential and commercial areas.

You can see the results of the Court's decision on local property for sale signs advertising commercial zoning uses on land once seen as agricultural.

Seven judges on the Court of Appeals, Maryland's highest court, ruled four to three that residents could not sue the county because they did not have standing because the comprehensive rezoning decision would not affect all the taxpayers in a given jurisdiction. Attorneys argued the residents had standing based on their property being adversely affected. Mr. Stevenson said the court set a precedent making it more difficult for

citizens to challenge changes in zoning classifications.

Over the past four years, Mr. Stevenson reported to all the plaintiffs on every step of the process through wins and losses in the Circuit Court and the Court of Appeals. In April he wrote:

Dear clients and supporters,

... In deciding our case, and a case raising the same standing issue, Anne Arundel County v. Bell, the Court created a new rule of standing applicable to challenges to comprehensive zoning ordinances. According to this rule standing in such cases can be based only on "taxpayer standing." That means that the plaintiffs must show that they, and all other taxpayers in the jurisdiction, will all suffer the same kind of injury as a result of the comprehensive zoning decision. That is a showing we could not have made in our case, so we relied on the theory that owners of property near rezoned parcels had standing if they showed that their property would be adversely affected. That theory had substantial support in prior case law, and it was the theory on which all of the proceedings in the case by both sides had been based. At no point in the proceedings—not in the Circuit Court, not in the Court of Special Appeals, and not in the Court of Appeals—was it ever suggested that the case should be decided on the basis of the rule laid down in the majority opinion. Indeed none of the briefs or oral arguments ever addressed the possibility of such a rule. The Court's decision thus came as a complete surprise.

Obviously, I am very disappointed in the outcome of our case. I take only slight comfort from the fact that the decision was four to three, the minority pointing out that the effect of the majority opinion would be to leave citizens without a practical remedy in cases such as ours.

Unfortunately, however, we are stuck with the new rule unless the legislature decides to overturn it by statute.

Thank you for your support, both financial and moral. Let me assure you that we will keep on doing everything in our power to restore and protect the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries. I hope we can count on your continuing support in that effort.


Ever hopeful, Will Biddle asked if it could be argued that rezoning the properties at the intersection of Riva and Central Avenue would require a new stop light that will lengthen the commute and travel time of virtually every citizen using Central Avenue, thus negatively impacting the entire community.

Russ replied, I'm afraid this is the end of the road. For "taxpayer standing" the Court says there must be some financial injury. Waiting at a stoplight, as annoying as it might be, won't qualify.

Many thanks and great praise for Russ who did a brilliant job representing citizens rights in the matter.

And that ain't all, folks!

In the same week, came another decision against residents' best interests. After twenty years of extensions, the Tolson/Cunningham Landfill received still another time extension for their effort to open a rubble-fill in a mined-out sand and gravel pit near Crofton. Douglas Hollman, the Administrative Hearing Officer, extended the special exception needed by the operator until Dec 31, 2015. This was a big disappointment to thousands of Piney Orchard and other nearby communities.





#### Where Can We Go from Here? Growth Action Network

Ann Fligsten, Executive Director of the Growth Action Network (GAN), reported to members on both these issues.

The important case that Russ Stevenson, founder of the Chesapeake Legal Alliance, took to the Court of Appeals (Harwood Civic Association et al [DACA] v. AA County) has been decided in favor of virtually unbridled authority of local legislative bodies in making zoning decisions. A new type of standing—"taxpayer standing"—was cited by the court to be required, rather than "proximity standing" which had been argued about throughout. The decision was four to three, with the three writing a dissenting opinion. The remedy is for the Maryland Legislature to clearly articulate limits of this authority when it comes to zoning that is contrary to the GDP, etc. and basically to overturn this decision, which the General Assembly did in the case of Turtle Run.


This could be a top priority next legislative session, to get a law that will that will give comprehensive status as "more than a guide."



#### Stormwater remediation fee survives repeal efforts

On April 6, the County Council voted to uphold the state-mandated Watershed Protection and Restoration Fee stormwater remediation fee despite County Executive Steve Schuh's efforts to repeal the "rain tax."

Both Russ Stevenson and Ann Fligsten wrote congratulations to the citizens who attended the public hearing on the repeal bill and spoke successfully to support the Watershed Protection and Restoration Fee.

Repeal was supported by Jerry Walker, Michael Peroutka, and Derek Fink. Council members who opposed repeal of stormwater bill were Chris Trumbauer, John Grasso, Andrew Pruski, and Pete Smith, whose swing vote helped pass the bill opposing the repeal.

On May 4, Jerry Walker introduced Bill #25-15 that would reduce stormwater fees over three years. The County Council again voted four to three against this attempt to phase out the stormwater remediation fee.


