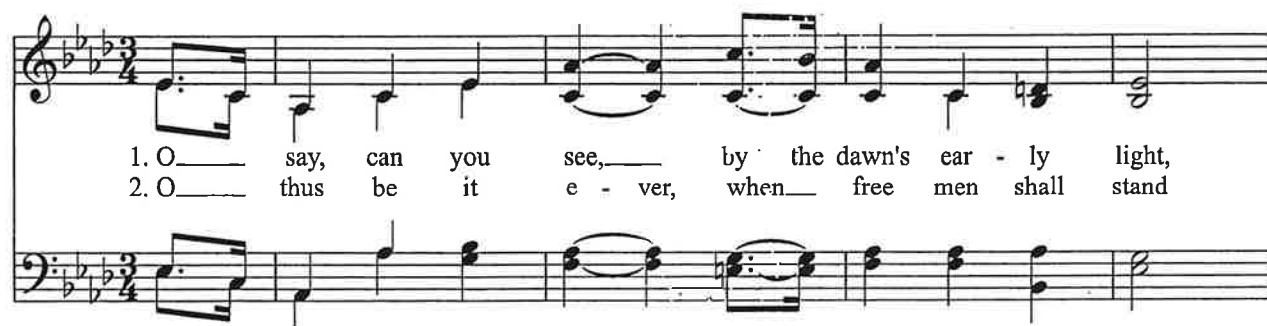
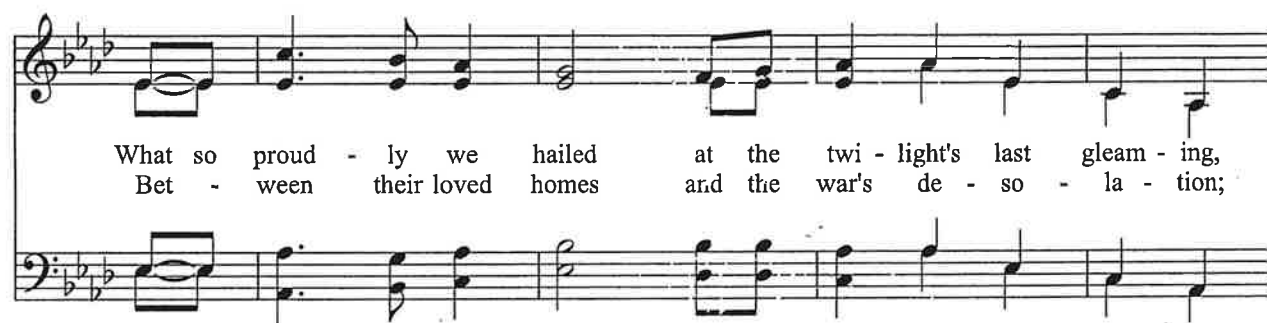


The Star-Spangled Banner
