
As you may or may not be aware, according to the liturgical church calendar, the first Sunday of Advent (which is November 29 this year) is the beginning of the Christian Year. So while chances are that you are reading this newsletter having just celebrated Thanksgiving, it's time to say "Happy New Year!"

As we begin the Christian Year, we also celebrate the Holy Season known as Advent. It is a time when we prepare ourselves for the coming of our Messiah. The word 'Advent', from the Latin word 'adventus', means "coming." We celebrate these days of Advent in expectation and preparation for Christ's arrival. Through the centuries, Christians have observed a time of waiting and anticipation before celebrating the birth of the Savior at Christmas. This Advent season is a time for reflection and preparation, but its mood is joyful. Advent has been enriched by Christian tradition to reflect its distinctive Christian meaning. It proclaims the revelation of God's love as expressed in Christ's birth in a humble stable, His sacrificial death on the cross, and His victorious resurrection! It points to the hope of Christ's coming again as the King of kings and Lord of lords.

The season of Advent comes to a close with the celebration of the birth of Christ ... Christmas ... a word originated from the compound of "Christ's Mass". This season, also known as Christmastide, begins on December 25th, although most scholars agree that this was not the actual date of Jesus' birth. Christmastide is celebrated for twelve days until the celebration of Epiphany on January 6th. The word 'Epiphany' means "to manifest" or "to show" and is the observance of the "showing forth" or revelation of God in human form. This holy day commemorates the visitation of the magi when Jesus was between one and two years old. Epiphany is also the day we remember and celebrate the baptism of Jesus as he entered his earthly ministry.

As we begin to observe these holy-days, don't get caught up in the commercialization of the season. Instead, let us do our best to focus on the 'reason for the season', starting with Advent.

Advent makes innkeepers out of all of us, asking each of us to make room for the arrival of Christ the King. As the familiar carol says, "Let every heart prepare him room!"



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From the Pastor ...

The term "In-Between" is a state or position in the middle between two other things: a middle place. And it seems that we have been "In-Between" many events during this year.

During this time of the pandemic, we have lived "In-Between." And our congregation has learned to deal with it. This season has brought us changes in our behavior and doing things even in our worship services. Our jobs have been "In-Between." Some have been working from home, others splitting their day between the office and home.



Students began the academic year online. Now some of them attend in-person classes. Our nation experienced a presidential election. There are two different offices, two different styles, two different views of ruling the country. All of these events have kept us also "In-Between."

Advent is an "In-Between" time of the year. It is not just between Thanksgiving and Christmas, though that is when it occurs. Advent is a time of preparation for Christmas; a time when we celebrate the first coming of the Son of God. Advent is also the time we anticipate and wait for the second coming of Christ that will take place at the end of time. Advent is a time of joyful and spiritual hope.

Soon we will experience another "In-Between" time. The transition from one year to another. 2020, a year that many would probably like to forget, and 2021, a year that brings new expectations. Some people will make "resolutions" while others will simply pray for a better year. No matter what the new year will bring, we must remember that God is always with us.

And as soon as we begin the New Year, we will find ourselves "In-Between" once again. It will be between Epiphany and Ash Wednesday, as we prepare ourselves for the coming of Lent.

As you see, we live our lives "In-Between." And we are called to live this time with an "Advent mood", always waiting for the best to come. Let us refresh our minds, hearts, and spirits in this tiring season that we have lived, and recognize that even in this time of "In-Between", know that **God is with us** – "Emmanuel." The Son of God made flesh, who lived among us, and who brought us hope, peace, joy, and love. So, amid this season of "In-Between," we can still see God working among us. Amen.

There is no doubt that this Advent and Christmas will have a different taste for all of us. We have lived all these months under a new norm. Schools are transitioning between online classes to hybrid classes and from hybrid courses to in-person ones. Companies and businesses have been challenging their employees to work from home instead of being in person. Others have also used a hybrid system. Some restaurants and stores are doing curbside pickup, take out, or just limit their space to a certain number of people. Churches are not the exception. We know that Charlton Church has been blessed by having in-person Sunday worship

services and streaming them for those who prefer to worship from home. New behaviors and new patterns are the reality of human beings around the world.

So, how do we prepare ourselves for Advent and Christmas this year when these two liturgical seasons seem to be so different from our previous years?

If you think that waiting for Jesus and his birth was not difficult, I think you should reread the scriptures. The advent of Jesus was in the middle of a census; his parents had to travel a long distance to participate in it. Mary was pregnant and about to give birth. The tradition says that Joseph had only one donkey to transport her. They went to Bethlehem without having a place to stay. They found nothing but a stable among animals where Mary could give birth to baby Jesus. The prophesied Messiah and King had the visit of humble shepherds and their sheep. Shortly thereafter, his parents and little Jesus had to flee as refugees to Egypt. Do you think this was a normal Advent and Christmas for Jesus and his parents?

Advent is a time of preparation and waiting. With Advent, we begin the church year and anticipate the coming of Jesus Christ at Christmas. To put it in simple words: Advent means Jesus is near. On the other hand, Christmas means Jesus is here. Advent is also the season when the church listens to Holy Scripture and hears words of hope, peace, joy, and love. These are focused on the baby born in the little town of Bethlehem – Emmanuel.

This Advent and Christmas sermon series is a refreshment to our stressed and anxious minds and souls during this season of the pandemic. A reminder that Jesus, the Child of Bethlehem, brings hope, peace, joy, and love. God is with us, Emmanuel.

Sunday, November 29: First Sunday of Advent: Emmanuel: Bringing Hope (Mark 13:24-37)

The season of Advent is a season of anticipation and expectation. And on this first Sunday of Advent, the invitation is to have hope. But what is it that we are hoping for? What is it that we are anticipating? Many people were hopeless during this year 2020, wishing for this pandemic to end and experience a better future. In our Bible text, Jesus invites us to reflect on the shared hope for the coming of God, usually connected with the eschatological times (the study of the last things to happen on this earth in this present age.) Most of the time, we just think of Advent as we anticipate the birth of Jesus. And we prepare ourselves by decorating our homes, homes and public places. We await Emmanuel (God with us), a shared experience with the shepherds, wise men, and

the people in Bethlehem. But how much of that anticipation, expectation, and waiting is with hope for the second coming of Christ? Do we hope for that? How do you

expect that? Keep Awake!

Sunday, December 6 :: Second Sunday of Advent Emmanuel: Bringing Peace (Isaiah 40:1-11)

We've always heard that "peace is the lack of war and violence." Or that "peace is what happens between wars." But is that God's peace? Amazingly, the prophet Isaiah encouraged and proclaimed hope, comfort, and peace to Babylon's exiles. The people of Israel needed peace as they were experiencing God's absence as punishment for their sins. In response, the people prepared themselves for God's coming presence. The Promised Messiah, Emmanuel (God with us), brings that peace. When we have sinned, there are burdens in our lives that keep us away from God, but when God gives us that comfort and forgiveness through Jesus Christ, we can feel God's peace in our hearts after repentance. During this second Sunday of Advent, let's prepare the way of the Lord, the way for the Prince of Peace.

Sunday, December 13:: Third Sunday of Advent: Emmanuel: Bringing Joy (Isaiah 61:1-4, 8-11)

"Joy to the world, the Lord has come" is one of the hymns that we sing during this season. But how much joy that we announce with our lips is real in our hearts? The Bible text tells us that God has anointed the prophet to proclaim the good news of release, favor, and justice to those who mourn or experience captivity and oppression in Zion. After many years later, Jesus read the first two verses of this chapter from the scroll of Isaiah in the synagogue in Luke 4:16-21 and used them to announce the nature of his ministry. Emmanuel (God with us) brings joy to those suffering, to those who are experiencing injustice and burdens in their lives. We have experienced challenging moments during this year so that our moments of joy have been less than usual. May Advent be for us, as Christians, a reminder of the joy that Jesus brings to us.

Sunday, December 20 :: Fourth Sunday of Advent :: Emmanuel: Bringing Love (Luke 1:26-38) Mary, a young virgin woman, received an angelic visit announcing that she would be a mother of the Son of God. How could that be possible? We can imagine her surprise and fear after this unexpected news. She was not yet married to Joseph. Therefore, she was facing disgrace and dishonor with her family and society. But she trusted the Lord and became a vessel of God's love for humanity. Mary shows love, courage, and faith in a moment of uncertainty. Emmanuel (God with us) comes to us, bringing us love. How do we manifest love during undefined times? May Advent be a season for us to meditate on the multiple expressions of love so we can give and

receive from God and others.

Today, we come to the climax of the Christmas story, when Christ the child is born. The Promised Messiah, announced in prophetic books, is now with us and among us. The One who people waited for so long. He is not fiction anymore. He is at hand: "the Word became flesh." All the familiar characters converge on this one scene to give honor to the Christ Child. The King of kings and Lord of lords is born in a humble manger, a manifestation of God's love. As the song says: "God is here today, as certain as the air I breathe, as certain as the morning sun that rises, as certain when I sing you'll hear my song."

Sunday, December 27 :: First Sunday after Christmas Day :: Emmanuel: Bringing Salvation (Luke 2:21-40)

Today, we get a glimpse into the life of Jesus as a child. We are in that inbetween time of Christmas and New Year with a change of perspective and focus, especially after a challenging pandemic season. This has been a time in which we have learned about social distancing and wearing masks, among many other new norms. Many of us are probably waiting for a new year, new resolutions. We reflect on what has happened in the past year, try to resolve our regrets, and look forward to the coming year, with the hope of having new opportunities. Our story tells us about two elderly people, Simeon and Hannah, who were waiting to meet the Messiah, the Savior. They were old and tired, but Jesus brings them a new opportunity to be spiritually refreshed. May this Sunday, the last Sunday of the year, also be a time to remember that Christmas is not over, and that Emmanuel (God with us) is bringing salvation to all, with new opportunities, and new beginnings.

Revealing

a faithful step for a new year

A writer begins writing a book with the expectation of a good ending. This ending is uncertain because there are many chapters to write, many words to say, and many opinions to give. However, the only way to know the final result of this writing is by writing it first. This needs to be done with confidence, sincerity, and personal truth, understanding that the readers will like or dislike our writing depending on their own expectations.

> We are all called to write our own book of life. Some of us decide to live our lives close to God and be guided by God's grace in every single decision. Others believe that this is "their life," and they are the ones who make all decisions and the ones who build their destiny.

> > A New Year is a time of "resolutions," when many people begin writing a new chapter in their lives. We don't know what the new chapter will bring to our lives or how it will end. Most of us are finishing 2020 with a myriad of different feelings. COVID-19 is regulating our life norms, there is a newly elected president in our nation, and there are many other uncertainties for this new year. But what we do know is that God will be with us in every written word of the chapter. How are we planning to write this new chapter in our lives? Is God part of our book?

There is no better time for us to begin a new chapter in our lives more than the season of Epiphany. The term epiphany means "to show" or "to make known" or even "to reveal." In Western churches, it remembers the coming of the wise men bringing gifts to visit the Christ child, who, by so doing,

"reveal" Jesus to the world as Lord and King.

"Revealing" is the main word for this season of Epiphany. During this sermon series we will reveal our intention to experience new things. We will reveal our desire to remember the past but be hopeful for a unique present and future. This means we need to be always open to new opportunities, to be aware of the presence of the Lord in everything we will do and experience. And we will keep pressing on in our faith in Christ until we are able to reveal ourselves and understand what it means to be children of God. "Why you do not even know what will happen tomorrow. What is your life? You are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes." (James 4:14)

Sunday, January 3 :: Epiphany Sunday :: Revealing Newness (Isaiah 43:14-19a, Rev. 21:5b) John refreshes Jesus' words in the book of Revelation when He says: "I am making everything new!" Then he said, "Write this down, for these words are trustworthy and true." Beginning a new year means writing another chapter in our lives. It means that God is giving us a unique opportunity to start over because "all things are new." But it also means new things will be revealed during this new journey of faith. We will experience similar things, but it is a new year, new ideas will come with it. However, there is only one requirement in this new beginning. And this is to be guided by God from the beginning to the end. Are we willing to begin this New Year 2021 in God's Name?

Sunday, January 10 :: Baptism of Jesus ::

Revealing and Remembering (Ezekiel 36:24-32 / Revelation 2:5a)

God promised to restore Israel, not physically but spiritually. To accomplish this, God would give them a new heart for following him and put his Spirit within them to transform them and empower them to do his will. A new year brings new experiences, which include decisions to make. It is always important to "remember" what we have done previously, to be sure that we are not going to commit or make the same mistakes. As we examine our lives, we may find that we, too, have lost our sensitivity to specific errors. But if we measure ourselves against God's standards of right living, we will be ashamed. To regain sensitivity, we must recognize our wrongdoing for what it is, feel sorry for displeasing God and ask his forgiveness. The Holy Spirit will guide us, making us responsive and receptive to God's truth.



Sunday, January 17: Second Sunday after Epiphany: Revealing Openness (Rev. 3:7-13)

Jesus declared (John 10:9), "I am the door; if anyone enters through Me, he shall be saved and shall go in and out, and find pasture." and "I am the way, and the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father, but through Me." We must preach that Jesus is the unique Son of God and Savior of the world. The message that Christ is the only way of salvation has never been popular with the world. It is even less popular today. Jesus is the only way because He is the only one who could atone for sin. After all, Jesus, the Son of God, died in our place. A new chapter in the book of our lives means "to be always open." This openness is based on recognizing Christ as our Lord and Savior. There will be moments during the year in which we will be lost, insecure, and doubtful, but it is there when we need to believe in Jesus and put our trust in Him, and, as servants of the Lord, to proclaim this message with full confidence and faith.

Sunday, January 24:: Third Sunday after Epiphany:: Revealing Awareness (Genesis 28:10-21) Jacob has a unique promise from God to bring him back home. It is a promise that speaks to Jacob's exceptional circumstances of being a man on the run. When Jacob awoke from his dream, not only the place has been changed by God's presence, but also he is a changed man. A new chapter in our lives means to be "aware." It means to be conscious that God is ever-present, no matter what. However, it also means being willing to seek him. And to be aware that even in the most challenging times of the year, when we feel hopeless or running away from God, God is present with us.

Sunday, January 31: Fourth Sunday after Epiphany: Revealing Consistency (Phil. 3:12-21)

Paul's goal is to know Christ fully, and he will experience this only in the resurrection.

Paul also shares in his sufferings, and by doing so, he will, in some way, attain the resurrection. Not that he will earn salvation through his sufferings, but that through faith, he is united to Christ, including his crucifixion and death. As a new chapter is revealed in our lives also means to "keep pressing on."

Knowing that we will be blessed during the year not because we deserve it, but because of God's grace. Our goal is to be like Christ more and more, despite our humanness.

Sunday, February 7:: Fifth Sunday after Epiphany:: Revealing Fearlessness (Deuteronomy 31:1-8)

When Israel arrived at the Promised Land, they sent out twelve spies. Two of them came to give an excellent report on the land. Still, the other ten of the spies were fearful. They gave a bad report because they were dismayed at the inhabitants. Their fear was highly contagious and caused the nation to not cross over and take it. Anyone who has ever moved or made a major change in life has experienced this type of fear. The underlying principles of God's being with you, and even better, "the Lord...goes before you," should give you more peace of mind about this new chapter in life. Just think about it; He already knows the future and has "spied out" what's ahead in time.

Sunday, February 14:: Transfiguration Sunday:: Revealing and Being Amazed (Mark 9:2-9)

The story of the Transfiguration is located almost exactly at the mid-point of this Gospel. Along with Peter's confession (8:29), the Transfiguration is the turning point of Jesus' ministry. Until now, Jesus has been teaching and healing. Now he will begin his journey to Jerusalem, where he will die. This is the last sermon of our sermon series, the end of the season of Epiphany. It is in the transfiguration experience that Jesus reaffirms his identity, reveals his glory, and calls the disciples to listen to him. As Christians, we are also invited to be exposed, exposed to announce to others who Christ is to us. It is not until we do this that we will be recognized for what we say we are.

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness— on them light has shined. (Isaiah 9:2)



Dear Sisters and Brothers of the Susquehanna Conference,

Grace to you in the name of Jesus Christ, Prince of Peace, Healer of our Brokenness, and Hope of the World!

As we experience every year, Advent is a season of waiting. When Luke tells the story of Christmas, he first reminds us of John the Baptist's birth. Zechariah has waited many years for a child. He is an old man when he learns that he will have a son, one with a special mission. Soon thereafter Mary hears that she, too, will bear a child, who will be called the Son of the Most High (Luke 1:32). And then follows more waiting.

This entire year has felt like one endless wait. For many it has been spiritually draining. Yet God's people have been here before, and each time, God has brought us to a new place of promise and hope.

We are all keenly aware that the numbers of COVID-19 cases are still increasing rapidly. Many of the hospitals throughout Pennsylvania and our country are experiencing a serious rise in admitting COVID patients. Our district superintendents are reporting that more and more of our pastors and laypeople have tested positive for COVID. As health officials strongly believe that even more people will succumb to COVID during this post-Thanksgiving season, the full Cabinet and I are deeply troubled and greatly concerned for the health and safety of our people.

This is a very grave situation that requires a sacrificial response. For your safety and that of your friends, family, and neighbors, I, as bishop, along with the full Cabinet urge you to not conduct indoor in-person worship or gatherings for the rest of the year.

My sisters and brothers in faith, I know this is very difficult to hear. I know that not everyone wants to pause inperson worship, especially during Advent. Calls for a temporary break from public gatherings may feel like a threat to our religious freedom. But now we must put our preferences aside and do what is best for our faith communities and the larger communities in which we live.

We must work together to stop the spread of this disease. We must do all that we can to make sure that more people do not fall victim to COVID. I firmly believe this is our calling, for such a time as this.

You have done ministry in wonderful ways during this pandemic, such as through online worship, Bible study, and ministry, as well as outdoor opportunities for worship and ministry. Please continue those excellent expressions of faithfulness while not meeting in person indoors.

The Psalmist says, "Weeping may tarry for the night, but joy comes in the morning" (Psalm 30:5). It feels like we are in a dark night of COVID. However, our God has not abandoned us. God is providing new and different ways to be in ministry. The joy of gathering together will come again. But for now, I implore you to suspend indoor in-person worship and gatherings.

God's light through Jesus Christ our Savior shines bright on us. May our light so shine to all people that they see that we care for them deeply; so deeply that we are willing to pause in-person gatherings as a sign of our love of God and neighbor as we keep whispering hope.

"Mary gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and




laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn." – Luke 2:7

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 18, 2020





MONTHLY MISSIONS of CHARLTON CHURCH

DECEMBER 2020: The recipient of the December 2020 mission offering is Bethesda Mission. For over 100 years, Bethesda Mission has been making a difference in the lives of homeless men, women and children in the Harrisburg area.

JANUARY 2021: The recipient of the January 2021 mission offering is the Central PA Food Bank. It is important to note that the organization is not a food pantry, where people in need go to get food assistance. Food banks are organizations that gather and collect food that is provided to local food pantries for distribution. As a food bank, their purchase power will allow our donations to buy more food than a local organization would be able to.

FEBRUARY 2021: The recipient of the February 2021 mission offering will be our own Giving Grace program that provides basic household goods that local food pantries do not provide. Giving Grace currently serves around 75 families from our community each month.

I work with a friend who is Seventh Day Adventist and is rather religious. I was surprised to hear that they do not celebrate Christmas. Why is that?



Seventh-Day Adventists do not celebrate Christmas for


two main reasons: First, the date of December 25 is not biblical. That is, it does not appear in any account in the Bible. Everything would indicate that Jesus was definitely not born on December 25. It is highly unlikely that Jesus was born at the end of December. According to Luke 2:8, the shepherds were spending the night in the field, which was not done in winter. Second, they consider this holiday to be rather pagan. It is interesting to note that December 25 already existed as a birth holiday before the coming of Jesus. It corresponded in the Julian calendar to the winter solstice. Hence the Romans celebrated the day of the birth of the undefeated Sun on that day.

Consequently, Christmas is not celebrated by Seventh-Day Adventists. By the way, the "Seventh Day" means keeping SABBATH as the Lord's day, according to Jewish ordinance. In fact, the Sabbath is the only holy day that the Seventh Day Adventists will officially celebrate. Interesting, right?

How is it with your soul?

This is a very busy time of the year for many people. And while it is a time of year that many people enjoy, it surely does seem to bring out the worse in some people. This year, the stress of decorating, buying and wrapping gifts, baking and other chores is mixed with the frustration of not knowing how "to do" Christmas in the midst of a pandemic. I have been reflecting on how all of this stress has been affecting those around me.



Most drivers understand how easy it is to lose control of a car when you're driving very fast. The faster a car goes, the greater the chance that the slightest error can be catastrophic.

Perhaps it's the same with our own lives. We get so busy that we're speeding through life, and it doesn't take much for us to lose control.

Your child spills something. Your spouse forgets to do something. A co-worker says something in an email. Something doesn't go the way we want it to. And we lose it.

Our life becomes like a pressure cooker, with all these little things in our life that just continue to build and build until we erupt. We lose our temper. We say something rude, insulting, or profane. Perhaps we even do something we will regret.

This is a perfect example of why it is so important for us to spend time with God ... and I'm not talking about going to church on Sunday. How would your spouse or child respond if you only gave them your attention for one hour each week? I don't think that would work very well, would it?

Just as we must nurture our important relationships on a daily basis, we must also respect, honor and nurture our relationship with God each day as well. Start your day off by taking 5 or 10 minutes and just "be still" in God's presence. Perhaps you can use that time to read and pray our Advent daily devotional that is included in this newsletter. You may also want to find another 5 or 10 minutes later in the day to reflect on your day. Where did you see God at work? What are you thankful for? What can you learn from today's experiences that can make you a better person tomorrow?

Spending time with God on a daily basis can make all the difference in helping you keep focused on what's important when life seems to get out of control.

Before you buy a bunch of 'stuff' for family and friends this holiday season, try asking them what they really NEED.

Maybe they need help with a utility bill, or a car payment, or the rent.

Maybe they need a kid-free night, and could use a free babysitter.

Maybe they could use a homemade meal.

Maybe they need help with gas for their car.

Maybe they need a cup of coffee, and someone to listen.

Maybe they need help making the holidays bright for their children.

Maybe they need help in some other way, but they don't know how to ask for help or are embarrassed to ask.

Maybe YOU could be the one to give them what they really need this year rather than more 'stuff'.

Mexican Shepherd's Pie

As found in Allrecipes.com—Makes 8 servings

1½ pounds ground beef

1 onion, finely chopped

Garlic powder to taste

Salt and pepper to taste

1 (14.5 ounce) can diced tomatoes

1 (1.25 ounce) package taco seasoning mix

¾ cup hot water

1 (11 ounce) can whole kernel corn, drained

1 (8.5 ounce) package corn muffin mix

1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese (Optional)

1 (2.25 ounce) can sliced black olives (Optional)

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Spray a 9x13 inch baking dish with cooking spray.

Place the beef and onion in a skillet over medium heat. Cook until beef is evenly brown and onion is tender. Drain grease. Season with garlic powder, salt, and pepper. Mix in the tomatoes, and cook 5 minutes. Stir in the taco seasoning and water. Bring to a boil, reduce heat to low, and continue cooking 5 minutes, until thickened. Transfer to the prepared baking dish, and top evenly with corn.

Prepare the corn muffin mix according to package directions. Spread evenly over the corn layer in the baking dish.

Bake 20 minutes in the preheated oven, or until puffed and golden. Garnish with olives and cheese.





From the PASTOR STAFF RELATIONS COMMITTEE

As many of you know, Chuck Kaufmann worked here at Charlton Church from 1987 to 1998 as the part-time Director of Music/Worship Arts. From 1998 to 2020, he worked as the full-time Director of Worship Arts and Christian Education at Emmanuel United Methodist Church in Enola.

In 2010, Chuck was invited to return to Charlton on a full-time basis. Though his title has been Director of Worship Arts, a large part of his duties included administrative support for our pastor and the various committees of the church. Some of those responsibilities included preparing the end of year reports for the conference, reviewing financial reports and making recommendations for the yearly budget, and caring for the technical infrastructure of the church (sound and visual equipment, computers, membership and accounting software, church website, etc.)

When Pastor Miguel joined us in July of this year, he was happy to find that Charlton had a strong team of office staff who cared for the mission and ministry of the church. After working with the staff for these last several months, he proposed that the Staff Parish Relations Committee change Chuck's title to officially recognize the work that Chuck does beyond the worship aspect of his position. The Committee concurred and have changed his title to Director of Worship Arts and Administration. This does not add any additional duties to his job description; it is simply a matter of clearly identifying the work he has been doing these past 10 years.

From the FINANCE COMMITTEE

We would like to thank each of you for your continued and faithful support of the mission and ministry of Charlton Church. Even in the midst of these uncertain times, your financial support of our church remained strong. In fact, your giving during the first five months of the pandemic were stronger than they had been for many months. We have noticed that the giving over these past two months has decreased, but we feel certain that with your continued support during December we will be able to end the year in good standing.

We are currently working on preparing a snapshot of this year's finances that will be available in the next few weeks. We are also working at creating a budget for 2021 that will support the ministry of our church while being respectful stewards of your financial offerings. A full financial report, including the 2021 budget, will be available in January.

FINANCIAL UPDATE



GENERAL FUND GIVING

When the pandemic hit in March of this year, church finances became the great unknown. But the Charlton family responded once again with a sign of faithfulness as they sent in their financial support. Our weekly offerings have remained constant throughout the year.

Another thing that has remained constant are our bills. The majority of our financial responsibilities were unaffected by the pandemic, such as our Shares of Ministry (formerly known as apportionments), insurance, utilities, and payroll. Some of our programming costs, such as fellowship dinners have halted completely. Other costs, such as children's activities, have decreased. And other costs, such as mailing and other office-related costs, have greatly increased as we have strived to keep our church family connected during this time.

We can report that, as of the end of November, the financial support of our congregation has covered our monthly expenses. With your continued support during the month of December, we will be able to end the year having paid all our bills, including our Shares of Ministry, in good standing without having to dip into our reserves.

DEBT REDUCTION GIVING

Although we have not stressed the support of our debt reduction in this past year, the Charlton family has continued to chip away at this debt. As of November 30th, your financial support of our debt reduction has allowed us to pay our yearly interest and to apply \$10,000 to the mortgage principal.

MISSION GIVING

Charlton has always been a mission-oriented church. And 2020 has been no exception. Your support of the monthly missions is in line with previous years. Thanks be to God!

Well done, thou good and faithful servant!

LOOKING AHEAD

The Finance Committee would normally create a budget for the new year based upon the spending of the current year. It is important to note that a yearly budget is a framework for church finances and not a spending plan. After considering various options for a 2021 budget, the committee decided it would be in the best interest of the church to set a budget based upon the 2020 budget, with the only changes being those we have definite figures for, such as our 2021 Shares of Ministry and payroll costs. The new budget also reflects the changes needed now that we have transitioned from a pastor's housing allowance to providing a parsonage.

The Administration Council has approved the Finance Committee's proposed budget of \$383,480.00, which is a modest 1.6% increase from 2020. Once again, this budget is a framework for our finances and not a spending plan. 
