
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A Message from the Pastor ...

Doing Things Out of Your Comfort Zone

Stepping outside our comfort zone may seem intimidating, but it is a part of our growth and spiritual development process. The Bible is full of examples of individuals who were called to embark on journeys that challenged their comfort and stretched their faith. These are reminders that God works out of the discomfort of our existence, compelling us to trust Him in the unfamiliar, in the unknown.

For example, Moses. When God called him through the burning bush, Moses hesitated, saying he did not have experience speaking to



Pharaoh (Exodus 3:10-12). God's response was simple: "I will be with you." Moses, like us, felt unprepared and fearful about assuming the task God had set for him. Although he was reluctant at first, he eventually obeyed and led the Israelites out of Egypt, becoming a crucial figure in biblical history. Moses did not just step outside of his comfort zone; he leaped into a world of miracles, divine revelations, and monumental challenges that transformed a nation.

In the New Testament, we find similar stories, such as the one about Peter, who went from being an ordinary fisherman to a disciple. In Matthew 14:22-33, Peter walks on water to reach Jesus in the midst of a storm. He was bold at first, but when the wind blew past him, he became scared and started sinking. Jesus rescued him and said, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?" This is the tension between the call to step out in faith and the fear with which that step is often taken.

Peter's experience reminds us that even though stepping out of our comfort zones can be scary, it is in our times of weakness that we get to witness God's provision and power in action. Stepping out in risk for faith's sake generally leads to times of enormous growth." I recall participating in a community service activity that took me far out of my day-to-day routine and comfort zone. Initially, I was apprehensive about communicating with others who were different from me, fearing that I might offend them or misunderstand their needs. But once I stepped out of my comfort zone, I appreciated learning from them and listening to what they had to say.

My heart was melted, and I realized that God was using this as a tool to teach me compassion, empathy, and the value of community. Throughout scripture, we can see that stepping outside our comfort zone is not just for our own benefit; it is about advancing God's plan in our lives and serving others. In Isaiah 6:8, the prophet hears God calling him, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?" Isaiah responds, "Here am I. Send me!

Stepping out of our comfort zones is a journey of faith. It may be challenging, but it often leads to unexpected blessings and deeper relationships with God and others. Whether it's sharing our faith, volunteering, or simply being present for someone in need, each step taken in faith is a step towards realizing the potential that God has given us. Considering the lives of Moses, Peter, and Isaiah, we are challenged to respond to God's call with faith and courage. Let us step out of our comfort zone and discover what the Lord has for us. We'll be surprised!

IMAGES

Lessons from the Potter, the Shepherd, the Unjust Manager, and the Poor

Our September sermon series explores profound biblical images that illuminate God's character and the call to live out our faith in a complex world. Each week, we will explore a different image, drawing connections between these ancient symbols and their relevance to our lives today.

Sunday, September 7 - The Potter

Jeremiah 18:1-11. The prophet Jeremiah continued to preach and prophesy the word of the Lord as he watched the Kings of Judah lead the kingdom to its downfall. God sent Jeremiah to watch a potter at work and learned that Judah was in the hands of God just as the clay was in the hands of the potter. How does the image of "The Potter" speak to your life?

Sunday, September 14 - The Shepherd

Luke 15:1-10. Jesus told a parable about a shepherd who had one hundred sheep. When one of the sheep got lost, the shepherd searched until he found it. Every sheep was important to the shepherd. A second parable says that a woman turned the house upside down for one small coin. How does the image of "The Shepherd" speak to your life?

Sunday, September 21 - The Unjust Manager

Luke 16:1-13. Jesus tells a parable about a manager who defrauds his employer in an attempt to receive security from the people who benefit from his dishonest acts. After the parable, Jesus tells his followers to use money in ways that will ensure their own eternal security. How does the image of "The Unjust Manager" speak to your life?

Sunday, September 28 - The Poor and the Rich

Luke 16:19-31. This odd parable is unique to Luke. It warns readers that the messenger of God will come to them in the form of a poor in their path (Lazarus in the parable). If they ignore them, as did the rich man, there will come a time when they will recognize their error, but it will be too late. How do the images of the poor and the rich speak to your life?

WITH A GRATEFUL HEART

Thanksgiving is not just a holiday; it's a vital posture of the Christian life. As we journey through the themes of gratitude revealed in scripture, we will explore how being thankful transforms our hearts, deepens our faith, and strengthens our community. The intention of this sermon series is to encourage each of us to cultivate a practice of thankfulness, recognizing God's presence in our lives regardless of our circumstances. We will draw from the lectionary readings that remind us of God's faithfulness and call us to respond with gratitude and service.

In the midst of life's challenges and uncertainties, the call to give thanks resonates profoundly within our faith journey. NOTE: A new sermon series will begin on Sunday, November 30, as it is the first Sunday of Advent.

World Communion Sunday began as World-Wide Communion Sunday at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania in 1933. The Rev. Hugh Thompson Kerr and his congregation sought to demonstrate the interconnectedness of Christian churches, regardless of denomination. They chose the sacrament of Holy Communion to symbolize this unity.



"The term 'Holy Communion' invites us to focus on the holiness of our communion with God and one another," states <u>This Holy Mystery</u>, The United Methodist Church's official statement on the sacrament.

Today, The United Methodist Church celebrates World Communion Sunday with congregations all over the globe on the first Sunday of October. Followers of Jesus Christ in large churches and small, on farms and in cities, in ornate buildings and under tents, gather to receive the bread and cup of Holy Communion.

Prayers and songs will be offered in virtually every language spoken around the world.

Clergy will dress traditionally, formally, and casually.

Some will receive cubes of bread. Some will tear from a common loaf. Some will receive a wafer.

Some will drink from a common chalice. Some will dip a piece of bread into the cup. Some will have individual glasses.

Some will use wine; some juice. Some will offer both.

Despite the differences in our denominations and traditions, we celebrate our unity in Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior.

Be sure to join us for a very special service of Holy Communion at 10:00 am on Sunday, October 5. We will be joined by members of the Nepali and Egyptian churches who meet at Charlton Church for their worship services.

Everyone is then invited to join us for a covered-dish luncheon after the worship service in the multi-purpose room. Bring a dish to share that reflects your cultural heritage. Let the office know what you will be bringing in advance, so that we can make a name card for your dish so that people know what they are eating!

THE DISCIPLESHIP HOUR

The term 'Sunday School' evokes memories of small children singing fun songs and learning some of the most iconic Bible stories. But there is much more to Sunday School than that! At Charlton Church, we have 4 groups specifically designed to meet the spiritual needs of adults of all ages. Whether you are just beginning to raise a family, getting ready to send your kids off to college, navigating major life changes like a divorce, preparing to learn what the life of an 'empty nester' is all about, discovering that you have no free time in retirement, experiencing the loss of your loved ones, or finding yourself unable to do the things you used to do ... there is an adult class where you can find fellowship, support, and spiritual nurture. If one of these groups is of interest to you, please reach out to their contact person.

The **Faith & Fellowship Class** share, explore and deepen their faith through Biblical study. All ages are welcome but are mostly a 60+ group. The class meets on the upper level in room 15, directly across from the nursery. Class contacts are Gloria Chmiola and Harry Derby.



The **Joy and Foundation Classes** meet together in room 14 for a time of study and discussion centered on scripture and other spiritual formation writings. While primarily comprised of persons 50+, everyone is welcome. Class contacts are Deb Livingston and Paul Swangren.





The **Journey Class** explores topics of interest in culture, discussing them from a Christian perspective, enriched by both progressive and conservative viewpoints. They meet in the conference room next to the office. Class contacts are Marjorie Martin and Marcy Miller.



The **Gathering** is Charlton's young adult class, although people young-at-heart are invited to join. The group shares their life experiences and discuss how their faith informs their daily living. They meet in the church parlor. Class contacts are Carrie Livingston and Chuck Kaufmann.

Richard Alpert is an American spiritual teacher, academic and clinical psychologist who now goes by the name Ram Dass.

Consider these words he has written:



When you go into the woods and you look at trees,

you see all these different trees... and some of them are bent, and some of them are straight, and some of them are evergreens and some of them are – whatever. And you look at the tree, and you just – allow it. You appreciate it. You see why it is the way it is, you sort of understand that it didn't get enough light, and so it turned that way, and you don't get all emotional about it, you just allow it. You appreciate the tree.

The minute you get near humans, you lose all that, and you're constantly saying, "You're too this," or "I'm too this," and that judging mind comes in.

And so I practice turning people into trees, which means appreciating them just the way they are.

There is great wisdom in these thoughts. What would it be like if we kept these words of Ram Dass in mind? As we work with one another and reach out to our community, can we begin to see each other as trees ... and appreciate one another just the way we are?

As we head into the fall season, let us be acutely aware of every time we have to share God's love and compassion with every person we encounter. From the moment we rise in the morning to the time we lay our head back down at night, we have many opportunities to be the heart and hands of God to those around us, whether they be someone we know well or someone we've never met before.

Let us pray that God will give us the wisdom to accept one another and to learn to appreciate our differences as well as our similarities.





Typically, we are usually able to rebound from that during the second quarter. Unfortunately, we have not been able to do that this year. While we are able to pay our monthly bills, we have not been able to make any payments on our Shares of Ministry, which is our obligation to our denomination.

The Leadership Council is closely monitoring our finances, and is working on a financial plan to be shared this fall. In the meantime, we would like to highlight the 3 ways that you can make your donations.



OUR WITHESS

Charlton is blessed with many individuals of all ages who are eager and unashamed to use their lives as a witness of God's love, forgiveness, and grace as they go about their daily lives. In many instances, their actions speak louder than words as they act as the hands, heart, and voice of Jesus in the world today.

Several weeks ago when our worship focused on Psalm 23, two people came to me after worship to share their appreciation. The first person said "The song the choir sang was awesome. I couldn't help but clapping and had to stop myself from giving a standing ovation!" And the second person said, "I really enjoyed the choir's song so much. It really touched my heart and brought a tear to my eye." Two persons, same experience, different responses.



This has been something I've often been asked about in my 38 years of church ministry: to applaud or not applaud. It is important to recognize that people have different ways of responding and conveying their emotions, and it's never our intent to stop people from being able to fully express themselves as part of our worship services.

When asked about this at a recent meeting, I shared that it's important to remember there is a difference between worship and performance. When the choir sings during a worship service, it's not a performance. However, if the choir offers a concert, that would be a performance. How we respond to each of these settings can be different from one another.

We do not typically applaud acts of worship. We do not applaud when the pastor prays. We do not applaud when the scripture is read. We do not applaud when the pastor preaches a sermon. In the same manner, we should not applaud the choir when they sing an anthem. Take note that I just used the phrase "applaud the choir", for that is the key to this issue.

What we should encourage is making space for people to respond when the Spirit is stirring their heart during a time of worship. And music often does that. Music is often a catalyst for the movement of the Holy Spirit during a time of worship.

Earlier this year, I attended a conference in Atlanta with 500 other church leaders from across the country. The first formal experience scheduled was a worship service. As the host welcomed and greeted everyone, he was excited about the great worship services that were planned throughout our days together, as they had invited a group of highly talented speakers, instrumentalists, singers, visual artists, poets, and dancers.

And before the worship began, the host invited people to find alternative ways to express themselves during the worship services other than applause. As he explained, applause can be an authentic response from one person's heart, but it can also inhibit another person who may need to respond in silence. The host encouraged people who needed to respond to the Spirit moving within them to raise their hand in praise ... or to use the American Sign Language movement for the word 'applause', which is to raise your hands and shake them in their air ... or to simply try snapping their fingers which provides a softer, yet still audible, response of affirmation.

I must admit that I really enjoyed this last suggestion. The snapping of fingers created a truly holy moment, whether it was when the speaker made a really inspiring comment, or the poet shared a deeply moving piece, or the musicians led either a peaceful song that touched the heart or a rousing number that brought people to their feet. This is something we may want to try at Charlton Church. The next time the Spirit moves you in worship, whether in response to an inspiring comment from the pastor or a song from the choir or soloist, try snapping your fingers to express your praise to God!

Chuck's newest go-to side dish is easy and delicious.
