Our next Arrangement Workshop will be Wednesday, February 5, 2 p.m. at the Elks Lodge, 11605 SE McGillivray Blvd., in Vancouver. The photos below are examples of Reflective floral design to inspire your arranging talents. Review the definition (below) and bring a Reflective arrangement (or a design of your choice) to the workshop.

Reflective Floral Design: A creative design containing material(s) that reflect, give back images of light or other components to the viewer. Reflective components must be essential to the design and must appear throughout the design. Typically, the designer must rely on non-plant materials to produce the necessary reflective impact. Appropriate materials might be shiny metal objects, opaque and translucent Plexiglas, metallic paper, aluminum foil, broken pieces of mirror, CDs, etc.



200 Years of Roses

When Julie Goggin and Sally Rossetto announced our 2025 Rose Show theme—"200 Years of Roses at The Fort"—I was curious. Researching if roses have been here for 200 years, I found it to be true. Not in the sense of roses as we know them today, but roses just the same. Searching for roses native to the Pacific Northwest, I found that roses did grow here much before then.

The original Fort Vancouver garden covered five to eight acres. It included vegetables, fruit trees and flowers, including roses and dahlias.

Native American interest and use of roses has been well documented. Rose hips were eaten fresh or dried. Dried or boiled they were used for tea, jams and jelly. A concoction of rose roots was used to treat sore throat, ease labor pains and even syphilis. Before burial, rose branches were used as good luck charms to sweep out grave sites.

Wild roses, in the form of rose hips, provided food for birds and other wildlife through the winter. Blooms attracted pollinators from bees to butterflies, and thickets provided shelter for birds and wildlife. Roses played a vital role in the Pacific Northwest ecosystem 200 years ago and still do! Our stewardship of these important native plants is paramount.

Washington has three native roses: Baldhip Rose, Nootka Rose and Clustered Wild Rose. Woods' Rose can also be found in Washington but primarily east of the Cascades. Dog Rose and Sweetbriar Rose can be spotted in the Pacific Northwest but are not native. Although similar in appearance, there are marked differences.

BALDHIP Rose

Usually found in forests or shady edges. Normally under 4 feet tall but can reach 6 feet. Two inch blooms. Fine, numerous prickles. Leaflets are small and rounded.





NOOTKA Rose

Found on forest edges or part-shade. Up to 7 feet tall. Straight prickles, curved on larger branches. Largest prickle of all native roses. Hips are large and persist in winter.





CLUSTERED WILD ROSE

Habitat is usually west of the Cascades, often in wet soil. Grows up to 9 feet tall. Blooms in clusters, pink and smaller than Nootka Rose. Medium sized prickles. Pear shaped hips.





WOODS' ROSE

Found east of the Cascades, in well-drained soil. Will grow up to 10 feet tall. Single or small cluster blooms in white to deep pink. Leaflets can have fine hairs and more of a curved tip.



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


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
